Implementation of Revisions to Program Admission Criteria

Because the admission window for a semester opens so far in advance of the start of that semester (e.g., admission for fall 2023 opens 1 July 2022, admission for spring 2024 opens 1 April 2023), the implementation date for revisions to a program's admission criteria cannot follow the same deadlines as other program revisions.

Therefore,

- A revision to a program's admission criteria will be implemented for the next admission window unless a later term is requested.
- Revisions will be implemented only after approval by the Educational Policies Council (EPC).
- Revised admission criteria will be noted in the next-published University Catalog after current admission criteria (e.g., *Effective for spring 2023, admission criteria will be the following...*).

III. Subcommittee Reports

A. Establishment of an ad hoc subcommittee to review the NF (Never Attended–F) mark Therese Tillett, presenter

View the presentation

Therese stated that this topic was presented last spring to EPC. EPC believed it would be a good ad hoc subcommittee. Kent State has had the Never Attended (NF) and Stopped Attending (NS) grades, which equal an 'F,' for almost 20 years. They came from the Department of Education and how KSU calculates student financial aid. Students who never attend or stop attending and never withdraw, it counts as an 'F' grade in their GPA. Through the years, there has been a lot of issues from the student perspective. Specially for the Never Attended (NF) grade, students are paying for the course that they never attended and receiving an 'F' for the course they did not attend. Registrar's office has seen many appeals for this issue. This subcommittee would review the NF grade. Why is it done this way? What are the options? How does this effect students? What are other colleges doing? How does KSU still align with federal policies?

Stina added that students have an avenue to appeal to the NF grades and that there are hundreds each semester. Some students are not able to appeal the grade.

Chris said that it sets students up for a low GPA which is hard to overcome; especially for students who experience this in the first semester. The financial burden it carries is also a concern.

Therese said that the NF mark has a scare factor. It alerts the student that they are still registered, and many will go back into the class. If there are any benefits, the committee can consider those and ask if that is the way it should be done. Faculty are needed for membership. Therese asked members to e-mail her to participate. The work is anticipated to be complete by the end of the fall 2022 semester.

IV. Program Proposals Review

A. Action Item

Ambassador Crawford College of Business and Entrepreneurship Department of Economics

(presented by Chair Michael Ellis and Associate Professor Dandan Liu)

1. Quantitative Methods in Econometrics - Graduate Minor—Establish minor to be offered in person on the Kent Campus (fall 2023)

View the discussion

Michael stated that the need of minor comes from the mixture of skills involving data analysis in econometrics. It provides a basis a strong foundation for doing empirical research at the doctoral level and will be useful across a wide range of disciplines. In addition, students will gain a working knowledge of a wide range of software including Python, Stata, Sass and EViews. Currently, there is no minor with these skills being offered at the university. There are no resource implications. The set of courses is already offered in the econometrics track in the Ph.D. program. No conflicts are anticipated with any other program.

Dandan added that the new minor gives students as opportunity to have systematic training in econometrics.

Therese asked what type of graduate student they see this benefiting and why at the doctoral level and not at the master's-level.

Michael said that students will be studying choice and behavior which will be helpful in the social sciences. Political Science and Sociology would be some obvious ones.

Dandan added that there are a lot of students doing empirical work, so those students will benefit from this minor. Right now, there are students from Public Health, Political Science, Sociology and Education enrolled in the econometrics courses.

Michael stated that this is at the doctoral level, because they feel that this is helpful with research.

Dandan said that the there are also master's-level students enrolled in the courses.

Therese said that almost all the courses are slashed with master's-level courses. She

asked if they would ever consider created a master's minor. Dandan replied that they would consider that.

Michael added that they will see how enrollment goes with the doctoral minor and consider a master's minor.

Manfred stated that the math support letter did not read as support. He asked if there had Been more consultation.

Michael said there has not been anymore consultation.

Manfred asked that for a letter of support from Math to be included.

Associate Dean Warren stated that there have not been any known issues with the proposal.

Associate Professor Piontkivska made a motion to approve, and Associate Professor Ensley seconded.

Without any further questions, comments or concerns, the item passed unanimously pending a letter of support from Math.

B. Discussion Item

College of Arts and Sciences School of Multidisciplinary Social Sciences and Humanities

(presented by Director Julie Mazzei)

1. Integrative Studies – B.I.S.— Revise delivery to fully online in addition to continuing in person at all eight campuses; revise admission requirements to decrease minimum number of credit hours to declare, from 60 to 30 (fall 2023) View the discussion

Julie stated that the B.I.S. is for students who have left Kent State or some other institution and have accrued credit hours. Students can re-enroll in Kent State and choose the B.I.S. program to finish their degree. This program is designed to be a completer program. The program can currently be enrolled in with 60 credit hours. Since they have had a great deal of interest in the program, the school would like to lower the credit hours to 30. The second proposal item is an acknowledgement that the program can be completed online since it is tailored to each student. The school would like that to be listed in the catalog so that they can advertise it to students.

Therese said it is not clear in the description that this is a completer program. She asked what would happen if a student came in and wanted to match an existing program or courses completely out of the College of Arts and Sciences.

Julie stated that students cannot enroll in the program as a freshman. Admittance is based on a student who stopped their coursework and would like to re-enroll. The credit hour limit helps so that a student could not create an existing program. The idea is to complete

the balance.

Therese asked if students could declare this major and take courses completely outside of the college.

Julie said that she has been dissuaded from using the term "completer" when describing the program. This, however, tells students that have credits that cannot be applied to something specific, that they can salvage their credits in this program and help them graduate. There may be a way to communicate more clearly that this program is for stopout students.

Associate Dean Warren asked if the questions are coming from the descriptions. This initiative is for stopout students from KSU and other colleges to complete a degree at Kent State.

Therese said that the description makes it sound more like a self-designed program rather than a return to complete a degree. She asked if it is College of Arts and Sciences focused or could students take all courses from another college.

Julie stated that there is a requirement that students must take courses from multiple disciplines.

Therese asked if that was in the proposal or if there was a restriction on students taking all courses from outside the College of Arts and Sciences.

Associate Dean Warren said that the college will have more discussion on restrictions.

Julie added that they will also work on the description.

Chair Dauterich suggested discussing and making the changes and bringing back to EPC.

With no further comments, questions or concerns, Chair Dauterich concluded the meeting at 4:32pm.

Chair Edward Dauterich called the meeting to order at 3:20p.m., on Monday, 19 September 2022, via Microsoft Teams.

I. Approval of Minutes

A. Meeting on 22 August 2022

Associate Lecturer Marshall made a motion to approve the item, and Professor Earp seconded the motion.

With no questions, comments or concerns, the item passed unanimously.

II. Presentation

A. Flash Credit Estimator for Transfer Students

Ted Mckown, senior associate director for transfer enrollment Misty Sommers, transfer operations analyst View the presentation

Ted stated that the <u>Flash Credit Estimator</u> is located on the <u>transfer website</u>. It is a recruitment tool that students can use to plug in their own credits. It is specific to Kent State and will allow them to see how credits apply directly to a Kent State program. The information is pinging off DegreeWorks. Students can request to speak with an advisor and have the information they put in reviewed. The program also allows students to schedule a visit, apply, send transcripts, view scholarships and learn more about financial aid and file a FAFSA. The tool allows students to review how their credits will transfer without contacting anyone. Since the tool captures the student's information, the transfer team will follow up with the student afterwards.

Misty explained that sometimes students input courses that are not yet in the transfer table. Students can manually add courses to their Flash Credit Estimator list. This triggers the system to e-mail the transfer team to review the course and, if acceptable, add it to the transfer table. While the course(s) are being reviewed, they will stay in the "pending courses tab" for the student. When the course is added to the table, the student will get an e-mail saying that the course has been added and they can go back into the estimator to see how it will transfer.

Therese asked if students could put in their credits and the system tell them what majors their credits would apply.

Ted said that it does. The system will recommend programs in addition to the ones they have chosen and show how far along the student is within each program.

Therese asked if the system would let the student know a certain grade would need to be met for a course.

Ted explained that they are not able to plug in grades into the system. There is, however, program information and links so students can determine if there are certain grades needed.

Misty added that there are defaults that will alert students that there may be additional requirements and to refer to the university catalog for more information. There are also times when the title in GPS states the minimum grade requirement. This will show on the estimator.

Chair Dauterich asked if there was any feedback from students on the estimator.

Ted said that students have been excited to use the estimator. If the students fill out the profile, they will get an e-mail 24 hours after requesting to have a meeting. The next step is a virtual appointment with a transfer enrollment specialist. The specialists can then explain about minimum requirements, course sequencing and more. They also help the student determine the best time to transfer based on their chosen major.

A. Academic Calendar Advisory Committee

Deborah Knapp and Therese Tillett, co-chairs View the report

Therese stated that the committee has reconvened for the fall semester. The recommendations to the calendar from the committee were approved. The next step is to review the summer term.

Summer has always been setup as 13 weeks with part of terms (i.e., 3-week intercession, 5-week summer I, 5-week summer III). The new changes decreased the summer term by one week. Parts of term will need to be reconsidered. The committee is very robust and ready to commence work this week. There are many faculty on the committee that utilize the summer term. The committee will be reviewing data including student data, what other universities do and best practices. The goal is to make a recommendation by the end of the semester.

An EPC member asked if spring break would be coming to the committee as an issue.

Therese said that it has not been given to the committee as a charge, but the committee will review and make recommendations if requested by Faculty Senate.

Senior Associate Provost van Dulmen added that the spring break issue would be going back to Faculty Senate. Faculty Senate can send it back to the calendar committee.

B. Transfer Credit Committee

Edward Dauterich and Joanna Liedel, co-chairs View the report

Joanna stated that the committee had their first meeting, and they have a lot of new faculty members joining. Faculty are a very important voice on the committee, and they wanted to make sure they were well represented. The committee met to set the tone for the semester and decide on projects. One project will be a one-page document of best practices and tips for faculty that are reviewing courses. Another project will be to create a document of state initiatives to keep faculty and advisors informed. These documents will be made easily accessible. The committee is open to any transfer issues and concerns that need reviewed and encourages to bring those forth.

IV. Program Proposals Review

A. Action Item

College of Education, Health and Human Services—School of Health Sciences

(Presented by Associate Professor Jennifer Roche)

1. Speech Language Pathology – Ph.D.: Revise major name to Communication Sciences and Disorders; revise course progression requirements (View the discussion)

Associate Professor Roche said that the program is looking to change the name of the Ph.D. program, because R1 and R2 programs typically their doctorates are going to be in communication sciences and disorders. Not in speech language pathology. The revision also included changes to the curriculum. The language in the graduate handbook was also changed to reflect some of the changes.

Therese asked if it is the norm in this field to have a specialized pathway for each student at the Ph.D. level.

Associate Professor Roche replied, yes. Across the board, the faculty are very mentor focused. Each student that comes in is working with a faculty member. Each faculty member has a different focus. Some focus on swallowing, cognition, autism and other areas.

Therese asked if it is the trajectory for the students to go into teaching and/or research.

Associate Professor Roche said that is correct. The Ph.D. is not practice or clinical. It is research-based only.

An EPC guest said that the School of Communication and Information would be sending some trends and other information to be attached to the proposal as Associate Professor Roche had reached out for consultation.

Senior Lecturer Laux motioned to approve the item, and Associate Lecturer Marshall seconded.

With no further questions or comments, the item passed unanimously.

B. Lesser Action Item

College of Arts and Sciences

School of Multidisciplinary Social Sciences and Humanities

1. Liberal Studies – L.S.M.: Revise program requirements by replacing AS courses with new LSTU courses ($fall\ 2022$)

(View the discussion)

An EPC member asked about an approval from the chair of the faculty advisory body.

The school director, Julie Mazzei, stated that it was approved, and a letter could be attached.

An EPC member asked for evidence of consultation with the school advisory committee (i.e., meeting minutes).

Julie said that a letter will be written and attached to the proposal.

An EPC member asked for documentation of advisory committee consultation part of the curriculum process.

Jennifer Kellogg, Assistant Director of Curriculum Services, explained that when CIM was implemented, colleges, schools and departments were able to customize their approval pathway. Units, eventually, have wanted to represent more people in their approval pathway and have, thus, added approvers to the approval flow. Some of the colleges have put in a comment and/or meeting minutes saying that it has been approved by the faculty approving body on a certain date. More units may be recommended to document approvals, in the future, for those not represented on the approval flow. Jennifer gave examples of how to leave a comment on a proposal saying that the advisory body approved the proposal on a certain date (i.e., "Approved by [advisory committee name] on month/day/year.") Minutes from the advisory body can also be attached.

With no further comments, questions or concerns, Chair Dauterich concluded the meeting at 4:16pm.

Chair Edward Dauterich called the meeting to order at 3:20p.m., on Monday, 17 October 2022, via Microsoft Teams.

I. Approval of Minutes

A. Meeting on 19 September 2022

Associate Professor Fisch motioned to approve, and Senior Associate Provost van Dulmen seconded.

With no questions, comments or concerns, the item passed unanimously.

II. Presentation

A. Establish a standing subcommittee to review and approve new micro-credentials

Peggy Shadduck, vice president for regional campuses and dean of College of Applied and Technical Studies

VIEW THE DISCUSSION

Vice President Shadduck stated that the microcredentials are opportunities to bring together credit learning experiences. These are courses that are offered and organized as a set that is associated with a particular focus area of skill or knowledge. This also allows for the student to be recognized when they successfully complete the microcredential. The idea is to propose that there is a standing EPC subcommittee that would review proposals for the sets of credit learning experiences and be labeled as a microcredential. This would not be for new courses. New courses would go through the regular curricular approval process. This would be the packaging of existing courses into a set that would make sense for learners. A proposal form would be filled out, sent and reviewed by the microcredential EPC subcommittee.

An EPC member asked if the draft proposal form that had been previously presented would still be used and if CIM would be used for the proposals.

Vice President Shadduck said that draft form is ready for the subcommittee to review and decide if it will go forward for use. The process should be quickly adaptable and should not slow anything down.

An EPC member asked if members of this subcommittee represent their college on the full EPC.

Chair Dauterich said from his understanding, no.

EPC members asked when they would be able to start submitting proposals.

Chair Dauterich stated that as soon as members are assembled, work could commence.

Senior Associate Provost van Dulmen added EPC Exec could nominate and call for members. The subcommittee could get started in a couple of weeks.

B. Establish an ad hoc subcommittee to develop a post-implementation review of new programs

Therese Tillett, associate vice president for curriculum planning and administration VIEW THE DISCUSSION

Therese stated that this will not be a standing committee and will have a deadline. Outside of the normal seven-year review that the office of assessment, accreditation and learning does, there is no consistent process to evaluate the health of a new program including major, minor or certificate. This would be for an additional review of new programs. An ad hoc committee would come together to decide on a timeline, process, tools for assessment and who should be part of the review committee. The ad hoc committee would then bring their recommendations back to EPC. An inquiry will be sent out seeking membership. Ad hoc members do not have to be a member of EPC.

III. Program Proposals Review

A. Action Items

1. College of Arts and Sciences—School of Peace and Conflict Studies
Peace and Conflict Studies – M.A.: Establish major in-person on Kent Campus with two concentrations: Applied Conflict Transformation; and Peace and Conflict and Development (*fall 2023 pending final approvals*)

VIEW THE DISCUSSION

School Director, Neil Cooper, said that development of the program emerged from longstanding discussions within the school about the need for a new MA in peace and conflict studies (SPCS). Degrees in peace and conflict studies recruit better at the master's level than at the undergraduate level. Faculty has grown 4.5 FTE in the past few years. This means that the school can comfortably staff the program. Additionally, the university is committed to upgrading and expanding the SPCS office space. This will better accommodate students. A program of this kind is timely as issues of war, conflict and structural violence have risen to the top of the political agenda. According to the global peace index, the measure of violent demonstrations has risen 50% since 2008. In 2020, the state-based arm conflicts were the highest recorded since World War II. Political violence and polarization are seen in the U.S. while the war in Ukraine has given renewed concerns about nuclear war. These kinds of trends speak to the likelihood of growing student interest in the field. The original plan was to run two separate programs, but the university advice was to merge them into one overarching program with two concentrations. Furthermore, advice was taken from three external advisors by adding in a new elective in peace psychology. One key goal is to offer a practice-oriented program. A program that can provide training for people who want to enter the field. Reviews of the field have highlighted the need for practice-oriented programs. A review of competitive programs and labor market data showed an increase in job availability with requirements in what the program would be teaching. The praxis courses will train in the needed skills. The concentrations are designed to reflect different aspects of the field and appeal to different cohorts of students. The center for conflict management will be having discussions with the University of Rwanda on how to deepen collaboration across a range of areas. After making the concentrations distinct, a balance was created to provide common foundations in the field within the courses. Only two other programs were found in Ohio that could compare—Ohio University and University of Toledo. The focus of these programs are different. The school believes their program will be much more comprehensive and reflective.

An EPC member asked if this would go through the college advisory committee.

Senior Associate Provost van Dulmen said that body would only look at curricular actions that would go through the graduate college.

Therese added that with all graduate proposals, the graduate dean signs off.

Senior Lecturer Laux made a motion to approve, and Associate Lecturer Marshall seconded the motion.

Without any further questions or comments, the item passed unanimously.

2. College of the Arts—School of Art

Art Education – B.A.: Revise degree, from a Bachelor of Arts (B.A.) to a Bachelor of Fine Arts (B.F.A.) (*fall 2023*)

VIEW THE DISCUSSION

School Director, Jillian Sokso, stated that the change came from the accrediting body. The accrediting body let the school know they already had a B.F.A. even though it was listed as a B.A. There was conversation at the division level with art education about what it would mean to make the changes. There are no curriculum changes. All the requirements are already met through the curriculum that exists. The proposal is for the name change. The program will also be moving from 121 credits to 120 credits with the electives moving from three credits to 1-3 credits. There is no faculty or load impact. Preapproval has been given from the accrediting body.

An EPC member asked what makes a program a B.F.A. compared to a B.A.

Jillian explained that the distinction is a B.A. is a liberal arts degree with more theories and a B.F.A. is more practice-based. It also has to do with the number of credits. The B.F.A. is a larger program than the B.A.

Associate Lecturer Marshall moved to approve, and Associate Professor Barber seconded.

With no other questions or comments, the item passed unanimously.

Entrepreneurship – Undergraduate Certificate: Offer program onsite at Trumbull Correctional Institution in Leavittsburg, Ohio (*fall* 2023)

2. Technical and Applied Studies – B.T.A.S.: Offer program onsite at Trumbull Correctional Institution in Leavittsburg, Ohio (*fall 2023*)

VIEW THE DISCUSSION

Assistant Professor Robison stated that the two items are existing programs and the proposal requests to offer these programs at Trumbull Correctional Institution. The proposals have gone through multiple entities and have been approved and supported. The college has pre-chosen some specializations since there is no internet access at the prison right now. These are driven by their interest and employability with a felony.

IV. Course Proposals Review

A. Action Item – University Requirements Curriculum Committee (fall 2023)

1. New Student Orientation

UC 10097 Destination Kent State: First Year Experience to: UC 10001 Flashes 101

VIEW THE DISCUSSION

Dean Pringle said that the first-year experience course was last revised in 2009. In 2017, President Warren charged a small group of faculty, staff and students to explore opportunities to enhance sense of belonging across our system. This charge was based on survey responses to the climate survey that was administered in 2016. The data is a little old, however, the findings have

also come up in recent surveys. The climate survey data identified undergraduate students who considered leaving Kent State and usually did so within the first year. The first reason was lack of sense of belonging, second reason was academic concerns and the third was cost concerns. The groups identified in the climate survey who were most at-risk or reported this most often were Black, Hispanic, multi-racial, students with one or multiple disabilities, students who face financial challenges and first-generation students. The committee worked with students, faculty and staff to identify opportunities to address the data. Students asked for the revision of the FYE course. The new curriculum was designed to foster a university sense of belonging, promote engagement in the curricular and co-curricular life of the university, articulate what students can expect from and how they can contribute to the Kent State community and assist students in clarifying their purpose. This will be accomplished by the five learning outcomes highlighted in the proposal. The learning outcomes were designed to facilitate group learning. Goals will also be accomplished by an enhanced instructor selection and development process.

Therese asked if the proposal should be changed to S/U graded as it currently says letter graded.

Dean Pringle said yes it should be S/U graded.

Therese will make the change on the proposal. She added that a policy will need to be changed which Dean Pringle is working on. It will come forward to EPC. The type of student who gets waived from this requirement will be revised in the policy.

Chair Dauterich asked what specifically would change.

Dean Pringle stated that the data from transfer students do not have a strong mechanism to develop community. When the course was revised in 2009, it was most appropriate for first-year students. This course will develop community.

I. Approval of Minutes

A. Meeting on 17 October 2022

Associate Professor Piontkivska made a motion to approve, and Associate Professor Barber seconded.

Without questions or comments, the item passed unanimously.

II. Presentation

A. Re-Envisioning the Kent Core Steering Committee Alison Smith and Manfred van Dulmen, co-chairs VIEW THE PRESENTATION

Associate Provost van Dulmen stated that a steering committee with a number of faculty members and former provost of Kent State, Paul Gaston, was created this past spring. This semester began the formation of three subcommittees focused on distinctiveness, general educational design and budgetary reform. Listen tours also began with academic units. A topic of focus is the importance in better understanding what the community is looking for, educating the community on what is possible, what have other successful universities done and what kind of experiences should students have. The focus in year one is listening and a foundation of a process going forward focusing on design, distinctiveness and budget. This spring semester, the listening tour will extend to student groups and organizations, forums for staff and engage advisors and advising deans. Online discussion panels will also be launched for the subcommittees. This will be an opportunity for students, faculty and staff who cannot commit to a subcommittee, but would like to be a part of the process. The steering committee's working mission statement focuses on the experiences students should have. In the future, focusing on the courses. Questions asked are: "What experiences should students have?" "What should students learn from the Kent Core?" "What should students learn in the Kent Core?" Different aspects the steering committee believe should be included are interdisciplinary, supports developing intellectual flexibility and lifelong attitude of discovery and creative expression. This prepares students for the workforce, but also for lifelong learning. It is important that there is integration with the core and the major, that it is equitable, humanitarian and ethical decision-making and civic responsibility that is aligned with Kent State. Questions to be answered are: How to redesign the Kent Core? How is it organized? What is the structure of the Kent Core? Other universities have added pathways that are interdisciplinary. How to make the Kent Core distinctive? Part of that may be through the design. How do students get an experience from the Kent Core that is different from other universities? Linking those answers to future outcomes. Another focus is budgetary reform asking how the core is funded. Offering courses in the Kent Core is driven by the RCM model. The committee will be reviewing that model and how to improve it.

An EPC member asked if the budgetary subcommittee is tasked with making recommendations of changes to the RCM.

Senior Associate Provost said the subcommittee will be tasked at reviewing how the Kent Core is handled under RCM.

An EPC member asked if the subcommittees would be making recommendations for specific courses.

Senior Associate Provost van Dulmen and Dean Smith replied, no. They will not be reviewing individual courses in relation to the Kent Core.

Dean Smith explained that listening tours started to gauge what the faculty in the colleges and schools are thinking about the way the Kent Core operates now and the way it may be improved.

Teams from the steering committee and subcommittees meeting with all academic units. There have been 35 listening tours completed. They are expected to be finished in January. Average faculty attendance for each listening tour was 11. Students, advisors and alumni will be next on the listening tours. Future focus areas are diversity requirement, experiential learning requirement, writing requirement, integrative and interdisciplinary experiences, competency and skill-based learning, GenEd and CCP/Transfer and general education and associate degrees. The anticipated timeline for implementation will be fall 2025 for the first cohort and full implementation fall 2028.

Therese asked what is meant by a pilot.

Dean Smith explained that there will be multiple pilots at different levels. When the time comes to run the pilots, they will look for volunteer faculty and create a pilot process.

III. Subcommittee Reports

A. Transfer Credit Committee

Edward Dauterich and Joanna Liedel, co-chairs

VIEW THE REPORT

Joanna stated that the credit transfer office brought an issue with CLEP to the subcommittee. There are state minimum scores for what credit will be offered. There is a discrepancy between ACE and state minimum. ACE says that Kent State should give credit at a minimum of a 50 score and the state minimum is typically above that. The question was what to do if a student receives a score of 52 and the state minimum is above that number. The committee discussed that general elective credit could be awarded for students who meet the ACE minimum, but are below the state minimum. The subcommittee will also be putting together some guidelines and materials to help faculty new to evaluating transfer credit. It will be easily accessible for faculty and others to access.

B. Undergraduate Policies Council

Charity Miller and E. Sue Wamsley, co-chairs

VIEW THE REPORT

Sue said that the council is looking at two policies—academic probation and dismissal, appeal and reinstatement. The council is in the process of LEAN process review. The council is working with Kim Rivers in IT to review the dismissal, appeal and reinstatement process. The process helps to understand what the student knows, what they do not know and how to make it more efficient and student-friendly process. There is a subgroup currently reviewing the policy language to make it more student-friendly and ensure that the appeal process is understandable, equitable and accessible. The preliminary discussions have shown that there is a disconnect between the students being dismissed by the university, but having to appeal through the college. During spring, the council worked on recommendations for automatically applying for graduation. There is a recommendation to make applying for graduation automated. However, there are staffing concerns. Options will continue to be reviewed with caution. Staffing issues are with key offices.

IV. Policy Proposals Review A. Action Items

Office of Curriculum Services

1. Course Schedule Type: Establish a new course schedule type – Combined Lecture/Studio (*fall* 2023)

VIEW THE DISCUSSION

Therese explained that course schedule types are the designation given to each course (i.e., lecture, lab, studio, thesis, internship). There is a policy attached to that for contact to credit hours. State guidelines are followed for how many contact to credit hours are required for each schedule type. Currently, there is a combined lecture/lab. It has a lecture component and lab component. They may be scheduled differently. The lecture may be Monday, Wednesday, Friday and the lab may be Tuesday. If a course and lab are taught simultaneously, then it uses the combined lecture/lab designation. Over the past year, some departments have asked for something similar, but with studio. Some art and design courses may provide lecture and studio simultaneously. To make the student's schedule easy to understand the type of course, the departments/schools have asked that a combined lecture/studio designation be created with the minimum credit to contact hours. This designation will be listed in the guidelines and have a code attached to specific courses.

Senior Lecturer Laux made a motion to approve, and Associate Lecturer Marshall seconded the motion.

With no questions or comments, the item passed unanimously.

V. Structure Proposals Review

A. Action Items

Ambassador Crawford College of Business and Entrepreneurship

1. Department of Management and Information Systems: Divide the department into a new Department of Management and a new Department of Information Systems and Business Analytics (*fall 2023*)

VIEW THE DISCUSSION

Dean Spake explained that the divide between departments was due to the growth and to be consistent with other business schools in Ohio and across the nation related to naming conventions for departments that house these disciplines. With respect to growth, the management and information systems department (MIS) is the largest in the college. Both from a faculty standpoint and a number of degree programs. The department houses 46% of all undergraduate majors and 38% of all undergraduate minors in the college. The college reviewed the department names and programs from other public Ohio universities. Some business schools in Ohio do have a management and information systems department, but they also have a separate department of management. Most schools with a department named "management and information systems" focus is solely on information systems. The current MIS department is a combination of both management and information systems disciplines. This combination is not represented at any other public Ohio university. The current MIS houses a growing business analytics discipline not reflected in the department name. The college is proposing to have the same naming convention as Miami University and University of Cincinnati with combining information systems and business analytics in one department name and a separate department of management. The department and college curriculum committees, FAC and CAC have approved the proposed restructuring and renaming. These departments would better reflect the disciplines

in the college, better align with peer, aspirant and other Ohio business colleges in naming and better serve students by clearly identifying the department of their major. No curricular changes are being made except to move existing programs and courses to one of the two new departments and to modify prefixes of graduate courses to match the prefix at the undergraduate level to improve clarity. All of the academic deans were contacted, and letters of support attached to the proposal.

Senior Lecturer Laux made a motion to approve, and Associate Lecturer Marshall seconded.

An EPC member asked if there has been any discussion regarding needing two faculty handbooks.

Dean Spake stated that the department has already separated the handbook and there are two current handbooks in anticipation of this move.

With no further questions or comments, the items passed unanimously.

College of Arts and Sciences

2. Center for Aquatic Ecology, Center for International and Comparative Programs, Center for Materials Informatics, Institute for the Study and Prevention of Violence, Matthew Ferrini Institute for the Study of Human Origins: Inactivate three centers and two institutes in the college (*fall 2023*)

VIEW THE DISCUSSION

Associate Dean Warren stated that these centers and institutes have not been active in a practical manner for some time. The college has communicated with all units where faculty were in the centers at one time and are no longer. The Center for Aquatic Ecology was replaced by the Center for Ecology and Natural Resource Sustainability. The Center for International and Comparative Programs became the Center for Comparative and Integrative Programs and now is the School of Multidisciplinary Social Sciences and Humanities. The Center for Materials Informatics has been inactivated for a long time. The Institute for Study and Prevention of Violence was moved to Public Health when the faculty went there, and the faculty left the university. Matthew Ferrini Institute for the Study of Human Origins was never able to take off.

Associate Professor Piontkivska motioned to approve, and Associate Professor Ensley seconded.

With no questions or comments, the item passed unanimously.

VI. Program Proposals Review

A. Action Items

College of Applied and Technical Studies

1. Early Childhood Education Technology – A.A.S.: Revise major name to Early Years Education and Care; revise program description, course requirements and roadmap (*fall 2023*) VIEW THE DISCUSSION

Associate Professor Pech stated that the bachelor's program made some adjustments to their content in their courses due to the changes of the licensure at the state level. Licensure changed from a pre-k-3 to a pre-k-5. The changes made at the bachelor's level impacted the associate's

level. The learning outcomes needed modified to continue to align with the 2+2 program. Technology used to be required to be in the program name, but is no longer required. Technology was dropped from the name. Since the program is focused on young children, the program was renamed to Early Years Education and Care. Data sheets were updated realigned some of the changes to continue alignment with the bachelor's degree and adding three new, one-credit field courses. In order for state accreditation, field experiences have to be documented. In the past, the field hours were woven into the content courses. The bachelor's degree added one-credit hour field courses and the associate's degree followed with one-credit hour field courses to align and meet state requirements.

Associate Professor Tu added that the introduction class used to be a two-credit class and was changed to a one-credit hour course to align with the bachelor's degree.

Associate Lecturer Marshall motioned to approve, and Associate Professor Piontkivska seconded the motion.

With no questions or comments, the item passed unanimously.

2. Respiratory Therapy Technology – A.A.S.: Revise major name to Respiratory Therapy; revise learning outcomes (*fall 2023*)

VIEW THE DISCUSSION

Academic Program Director, Yvonne George, explained that the rationale for the proposal is that the word "technology" brings to mind a trade and respiratory therapy is a profession. Kent State is one of four universities in Ohio that still have "technology" in the program name. The learning objectives were also updated.

Associate Lecturer Marshall motioned to approve, and Associate Professor Ensley seconded.

With no questions or comments, the item passed unanimously.

College of Arts and Sciences—School of Multidisciplinary Social Sciences and Humanities 3. International Relations – B.A.: Revise major name to International Studies, revise learning outcomes, program description, course requirements and roadmap (*fall 2023*) VIEW THE DISCUSSION

Associate Professor Barnes said that the program is currently called International Relations and will be changed to International Studies. It has the same description and career paths for students. After reviewing 40 programs from around the country, name and content stood out. Of the 40 schools, approximately 20% called their program International Relations. Others called it International Studies, International Affairs or Global Studies. In terms of content, there are a number of ways to structure a program like this. A common way is a core and electives that are connected by the learning objectives. The school chose three core courses and added a capstone course. The capstone requires students to pull from their elective courses and decide what is next. The learning outcomes were also reviewed. The changes are more question and problem-driven, multi-disciplinary and what students can do.

Associate Professor Ensley motioned to approve, and Associate Professor Piontkivska seconded the motion.

With no questions or comments, the item passed unanimously.

College of Communication and Information—School of Information

4. User Experience Design - M.S.: Revise major name to User Experience; revise accreditation, learning outcomes and program description ($fall\ 2023$)

VIEW THE DISCUSSION

Professor Gracy stated that the school would like to drop the word "design" from the title. The scope of user experience has changed over the years. The scope has broadened. The school wants students to know that design is not the primary or major component of the program, but a part of the program. The program is listed as being accredited by NASAD, but it is not. That information will be removed.

Associate Professor Kildow motioned to approve, and Associate Professor Piontkivska seconded the motion.

With no questions or comments, the item passed unanimously.

School of Lifespan Development and Education Sciences

- 5. Educational Psychology M.A.: Revise major name to Learning Science; revise program description and course requirements (*fall 2023*)
- 6. Educational Psychology Ph.D.: Revise major name to Learning Science; revise program description, admission requirements and course requirements (*fall 2023*)

VIEW THE DISCUSSION

Associate Professor Roche stated that the school would like to change the name to Learning Science. The rationale is because of the different focus on research. The school wants to differentiate the M.Ed. program from the M.A. and Ph.D. programs which are more research-based. This name change clarifies that these programs are research-intensive and will focus on psychological construct. A couple courses have been added to allow students to have more choice. Curriculum was cleaned up to show that is research-based.

Associate Lecturer Marshall motioned to approve, and Associate Professor Ensley seconded the motion.

Senior Associate Provost van Dulmen asked to follow-up again with Psychology to obtain a letter of support.

With no further questions or comments, the item passed unanimously.

- 7. Human Development and Family Studies B.S.: Revise major name to Human Development and Family Science; revise learning outcomes and program description (*fall 2023*)
- 8. Human Development and Family Studies M.A.: Revise major name to Human Development and Family Science; revise learning outcomes and program description ($fall\ 2023$)

VIEW THE DISCUSSION

Associate Professor Cichy stated that the name change is to expand the visibility of the program to prospective students and their families. Family science is more readily by prospective employers. This proposed change also aligns with what is happening with peer and aspirant programs in the discipline. It reflects more of research-oriented mission of the program. The school did consult with the Arts and Sciences, Psychological Sciences and Sociology and have received approval from all. Learning outcomes and program description have been updated.

Associate Professor McEnroe-Petitte motioned to approve, and Associate Lecturer Marshall seconded.

With no questions or comments, the item passed unanimously.

B. Discussion Items

College of Aeronautics and Engineering

- 1. Aeronautical Studies B.S.: Initial inquiry to establish a new major; full proposal will come to EPC for a vote at a later date
- 2. Air Traffic and Airspace Management B.S.: Initial inquiry to establish a new major; full proposal will come to EPC for a vote at a later date
- 3. Aviation Management B.S.: Initial inquiry to establish a new major; full proposal will come to EPC for a vote at a later date
- 4. Professional Pilot B.S.: Initial inquiry to establish a new major; full proposal will come to EPC for a vote at a later date
- 5. Unmanned Aircraft Systems Flight Operations B.S.: Initial inquiry to establish a new major; full proposal will come to EPC for a vote at a later date

 VIEW THE DISCUSSION

Assistant Professor Fussell explained that the college would like to submit initial inquiries for the five majors currently listed as concentrations under the Aeronautics – B.S. Once the concentrations are pulled into their own majors, they will be more visible, will be able to be marketed and then they will be ranked. The change for the ATC program will still maintain the ability to meet FAA training and meet at the facilities. This also provides the space to look into changing the concentration to include Airspace Management, Unmanned Technologies and Air Mobility Technologies. No additional resources will be needed.

Chair Dauterich asked if there are enough students in each concentration for it to make sense to make all of these programs.

Assistant Professor Fussell said, yes. One of the issues occurring was there were too many students under a small amount of advisors and more advisors will need to be hired to break the students up accordingly.

- 6. Criminology and Justice Studies B.A.: Inactivate all concentrations; revise delivery mode to mostly online (and continuing in person); revise program description, course requirements, graduation requirements and roadmap (*fall 2023*)
- 7. Sociology B.A.: Inactivate all concentrations; revise delivery mode to mostly online (and continuing in person); revise program description, course requirements and roadmap (*fall 2023*)

VIEW THE DISCUSSION

Professor Taylor said that there are a lot of concentrations in both Criminology and Justice Studies and Sociology. It was becoming confusing for students. The majority of students in both majors were picking the general concentration. The concentration requirement was coming a barrier. The program description, course requirements and roadmaps were cleaned up. This will also allow students to design their own program.

Meeting Minutes

Chair Dauterich asked about the programs going mostly online.

Professor Taylor explained that over time, more courses have been offered online. Students are still wanting online courses. This change is reflecting what has been in practice. In person are still offered.

School of Multidisciplinary Social Sciences and Humanities

8. Cybercriminology - B.S.: Initial inquiry to establish a new major; full proposal will come to EPC for a vote at a later date

VIEW THE DISCUSSION

Associate Dean Warren said that the proposal is among the Department of Sociology and Criminology, Department of Computer Sciences, the College of Arts Sciences and Information Technology program in the College of Applied and Technical Studies. Cybercriminology was coined by a criminologist in 2007 as a multi-disciplinary field of inquiry. It is relatively new, but growing area. Kent State would be the first university in NEO to have a true cybercriminology program. It prepares students to understand, investigate, process and prevent cybercrimes. Members from the field have stated the need for more people in the field.

Associate Lecturer Marshall added that the program requirements will be collected almost all from existing courses.

9. Gender and Sexuality Studies - B.A.: Initial inquiry to establish a new major; full proposal will come to EPC for a vote at a later date

VIEW THE DISCUSSION

School Director, Julie Mazzei, explained that this major has been considered for some time. A committee reviewed what the university already offers and what is needed to offer this program. Core classes and electives have been collected. Existing minors and other programs speak to this program so well. Kent State stands above what other universities and regional colleges can offer.

Therese asked if all elective courses are regularly offered.

Julie said yes and that they have letters of support.

Therese suggested showing what future offerings will be for students.

College of Public Health

10. Public Health – Ph.D.: Suspend admission temporarily to Health Policy and Management concentration (*fall 2023*)

VIEW THE DISCUSSION

Interim Associate Dean Zullo stated that they have chosen to suspend the HPM concentration to help move students along who are at the point of dissertation or the 10-year mark. The students are part-time, working individuals and had a hard time collecting data due to the nature of their work and especially during covid. The curriculum will be revised, and they need more time to review and decide on courses.

Secretary Tillett called the meeting to order at 3:20p.m., on Monday, 5 December 2022, via Microsoft Teams.

I. Approval of Minutes

A. Meeting on 14 November 2022

Associate Lecturer Marshall motioned to approve, and Associate Professor Piontkivska seconded.

The item passed unanimously.

II. Subcommittee Reports A. NF Mark EPC Subcommittee

Co-chairs: Brenda Burke, Chris Dorsten, Stina Olafsdottir, Therese Tillett VIEW REPORT

Chris Dorsten stated that the Registrar's Office is required by the Department of Education, for federal financial aid purposes, to identify students who are enrolled in a course, but have not participate or attend. The process happens through the Academic Engagement Verification Roster which instructors complete. Registrar's is required to review or adjust for federal financial aid for a certain number of courses that were never attended. Registrar's office assesses tuition and fees for a course identified as never attended. Students have the option to appeal. Unpaid bills go to the Attorney General's Office. KSU is unable to recover any debt via legal recourses as the court system tends to consider charges for never-attended courses to be an "unjust enrichment and with no benefit conferred." Registrar's notifies students in several different ways that they are pending/have received an NF mark, the consequences and the steps to take action. Students receive two to three university-generated e-mails including the NF mark has been submitted for a course, a change has been made to student's record with the NF mark and student's federal financial aid is affected (if applicable). Some students warn students that an NF mark is pending and may submit an early alert notification and some advising units reach out to students once they receive the NF mark or an early alert. Registrar's gives no credit and assigns the NF mark to a course identified as never attended. The NF mark is displayed on the transcript and the NF mark grade is calculated as an F into the student's GPA. Most students (79%) who initially received an NF mark took action to drop the course or started attending. Of the students who started attending classes, most (78%) passed, with the majority (61%) earning A to Bgrades.

Most students (90%) received the initial NF mark in only one or two classes. A small number of students (4%) earned NF mark in all courses in a term. Of the students who earned all NF marks, most (77%) did not return to Kent State.

An EPC member asked about why some students did not react to the NF mark.

Chris said there is no way to understand why students did not take action.

Therese added that the committee will be doing more data digging to gather more information. The time the data was pulled from, only two options were available. Take the course again or leave for a year and return to have the grade forgiven. There are now more options for students.

Stina stated that there are four options the committee has come up with at this time. Benefits, challenges and considerations have been documented for all. Other options may be available in the future after conversations. One option is to drop the student from the course as if they were never in the course and reverse tuition/fees. Another option is to assign the course a new mark (i.e., Administrative Withdraw-Never Attended) and reverse tuition/fees assessed for the course. The third option is to designate students who receive all NF marks in a term as "no intention to attend Kent State" and drop them from all courses and reverse tuition/fees. The last option is to designate students who received a percentage of NF marks (%TBD) in a term and drop them from the courses with NF mark and reverse tuition/fees from the class and given subsequent tuition/fee credit.

Therese added that the committee has reached out to other Ohio universities to see what they do as this is a federal compliance issue.

Stina explained that they reached out to other institutions in the state of Ohio. None of them automatically process drops, but they do use an administrative mark. They do offer students the opportunity to appeal them. Miami University is using the administrative mark, so it does not have a negative impact on the student. The committee is also interested in the tuition assessment side. KSU cannot get the money back if they never attended the course. Ohio universities did not take the tuition away, but required the student to take action for that.

Therese stated that the committee recognizes they need to look at more data, discuss more options and then will come to EPC with a recommendation.

An EPC member asked, in reference to tuition loss, if a student is penalized by financial aid and grade, is there consideration for that to be handled.

Stina said that they want to make sure they do not over inflated what KSU can collect on. It is very complicated because every situation is different.

Brenda added that each student would have to be assessed individually by how many NF's they had. An example is a student's financial aid may be reduced and then may also owe the university.

Therese explained that many students do not realize they were registered, never attend Kent State and never check Kent State e-mail. They do not know about this issue until it goes to the courts. The person was never a Kent State student. This is one reason why the committee is considering administrative drop and tuition/fee reversal.

An EPC member asked if the data was for individual students or aggregate numbers for a course.

Therese said that data mining can be done for individual students.

An EPC member asked for the committee to pull more demographics for those who had all NF's. One way may be to review high school GPA.

III. Policy Proposals Review

A. Action Items

Graduate Dean's Advisory Council

1. Combined Bachelor's/Master's Degree Program— Revise the maximum allowance of graduate credit hours that may be double counted toward both degrees, from 9-12 to 9 (fall 2023)

VIEW DISCUSSION

Therese stated that currently 9-12 credit hours are allowed to be double counted. An undergraduate student early admitted into a master's program is allowed, with permission, to double count 9-12 credit hours of graduate work to their undergraduate degree. They continue as

an undergraduate student until they earn their degree and then continue in the master's program. The 9-12 credit hours depended on the credit hours of the master's program. Recently, the High Learning Commissioner, notified the Ohio Department of Higher Education that we could not do that as a state. They would only allow maximum of 9 credit hours. Every Ohio university is having to revise their policy to limit double counted credit hours to 9. Another requirement from the state, annually, KSU will have to report the combined bachelor's/master's programs and the enrollment.

Associate Lecturer Marshall motioned to approve, and Associate Professor Stringer seconded the motion.

An EPC member asked if the existing combined degree programs have been notified.

Therese said 95% of them were only doing 9 credit hours. The programs that are allowed up to 12 credit hours were notified. Manfred had a meeting to discuss this with graduate deans.

With no other questions or concerns, the item passed unanimously.

2. Transfer of Graduate Credit—Revise restriction that students with an earned Kent State graduate degree cannot transfer courses, with program permission, to another Kent State graduate degree (fall 2023)

VIEW DISCUSSION

Therese said there are a lot of stipulations in accepting transfer graduate credit. This means graduate coursework outside of and within KSU. One of the stipulations was that students could not transfer credit from an earned degree from Kent State or outside. With the rise of dual degree programs, GDAC began to see the conflict. Kent has quite a few dual degrees that allow double counting of credit hours. Many students did not realize they could do a dual degree, and when they returned, they were not allowed to double count credit hours. The revision to the policy is to allow Kent State students to request permission to double count their KSU coursework towards another their current Kent State graduate degree. A student who earned a graduate degree elsewhere still cannot transfer in graduate coursework from a degree earned at another university.

Associate Professor Ensley made a motion to approve, and Associate Lecturer Marshall seconded.

An EPC member asked if there are any foreseen issues with students wanting to double count undergraduate degree coursework from an earned degree into another undergraduate degree.

Therese explained that students could return and meet many requirements from their earned degree into a different degree. Another change to the policy is that a maximum of 50% of the requirements for a graduate certificate or minor may comprise transfer credit. This will revise the resident policy.

With no further questions or concerns, the item passed unanimously.

IV. Program Proposals Review

A. Discussion Items

Department of Chemistry and Biochemistry

1. Biochemistry – B.S.— Initial inquiry to establish a new major, which is currently concentrations in the Chemistry major; full proposal will come to EPC for a vote at a later date VIEW DISCUSSION

Associate Professor Stroup stated that the proposal is to take the existing Biochemistry concentration and make it a major. The idea of having Biochemistry as a separate major came from the hour's ratio rule. Concentrations need to include a minimum of 50% of the curriculum of the major. Kent Core cannot be included in the 50% major curriculum. The program requirements are 23 hours, and the concentration hours are between 54-59. There are three times the amount of students in the Biochemistry concentration than the other concentrations substantiating the creation of a major in Biochemistry.

Therese added that 70% of students enrolled in Fall 2022 are in the Biochemistry concentration. Also, having Biochemistry as a concentration could be limiting it from branching out more. More marketing and recruitment could be done with Biochemistry if elevating it to a major.

An EPC member suggested Chemistry review Calculus and Statistics and make sure they are meeting the needs of the majors.

Associate Professor Stroup agreed and said as they proceed, they will consider that.

B. Information Items

Office of the Provost

1. Early Entry J.D. Degree Agreements—Establish 3+3 articulation agreements with various Kent State bachelor's degree programs and the University of Akron School of Law; Cleveland State University College of Law; and Case Western Reserve University School of Law VIEW DISCUSSION

Therese stated that the agreements allow early entry from a bachelor's degree into a law program.

Joanna explained that each school is a little different, but they follow the same patterns. Students would apply their junior year and senior year they would start law school. At the end of their first year of law school, they would transfer coursework back to Kent State and would complete their undergraduate degree. Other programs can contact Joanna and Ashley if they are interested including their program.

Therese added that they do not have to be in a law-related major. They prefer students have a diverse academic background.

Therese stated that there are two new course subjects: Learning Science and Respiratory Therapy. The M.Ed. is remaining Educational Psychology, but the course subject with change to Learning Science. Respiratory Therapy course subject will also be changing to RTT. Chemistry 10052 is being inactivated and removed from the Kent Core. It has not been taught for four years.

Chair Dauterich called the meeting to order at 3:20p.m., on Monday, 23 January 2022, via Microsoft Teams.

I. Approval of Minutes

A. Meeting on 5 December 2022

Associate Lecturer Marshall made a motion to approve, and Associate Professor Tippey seconded.

With no questions or comments, the item was approved.

II. Structure Proposals ReviewA. Action ItemsCollege of Arts and Sciences

1. Center for Democracy, Social Justice and Peaceful Change—Establish Center

VIEW THE DISCUSSION

Neil stated that the proposal is to establish a center for democracy, social justice and peaceful change. The proposed center builds on and substantially extends the impressive interdisciplinary work already undertaken under the umbrella of what is known the Growing Democracy Project. This existing body of work includes community workshops, a podcast series that, while only launched in the summer of 2020, includes 75 episodes with thousands of listeners, a growing democracy blog, secured funding of around \$35,000 and production of scholarly papers. The mission of the news center is to be an inclusive community that strengthens democracy, fosters equity-centered civic engagement and facilitates peaceful change through transformative research, learning and community-engaged practice. The existing Growing Democracy Project already represents an impressive example of interdisciplinary collaboration in and of itself, involving as it does faculty from SBCS, Africana studies and economics, as well as colleagues from geography, political science, and the Women's Center. But the new center will substantially expand on this level of cross disciplinary collaboration to include a wide range of additional colleagues with expertise in a range of areas, including in elections and voting, regional identity, human rights, political violence and youth civics. Over and above this, as well as continuing with the existing workshops, podcasts, et cetera that have been inaugurated under the auspices of the Growing Democracy Project, the new center will launch a range of new projects, including a democracy roundtable, community organizing workshops and a civics academy. It is also envisaged that it will offer a further fee for service applied research service. The proposed head of the center, Ashley Nickels, has an impressive record of producing original, high quality, high impact publications. Some of which have also received prestigious external awards. Dr. Nickels status as a leading scholar in the field, means she will be an excellent figurehead for the new center. Likewise, a central role in the Growing Democracy Project, I think means she is well suited to understand the demands of having the new sensor and growing its portfolio of research, extramural funding, and applied work in the community. The proposed center also fills a gap in the university's current portfolio as centers and institutes. There are some existing centers whose work connects into cognitive concerns and themes that the center will be addressing. The Antiracism and Equity Institute, for instance, or the Institute for African American Affairs come to mind. But I don't think there is any current center or institute that is specifically designed to address questions of democracy, civic engagement, community rights and community empowerment writ large. Given both the salience and polarized nature of current discussions in the US about the state of democracy, this represents quite a notable gap in the university's architecture of centers and institutes, which the center will amply fill. Moreover, the center proposal demonstrates there is a good deal of research, teaching and applied work going on in KSU that would benefit from being harnessed under the umbrella of the new center. The framework of activities envisaged for the center offer a real potential for university researchers in this field to discover new synergies and areas of collaboration, whether it be in research teaching, funding applications or applied work. It is also worth noting that the proposal is consistent with the vision and mission set out in the university strategic roadmap, most notably the emphasis placed on meaningful voice as well as priority four of the roadmap community impact. Finally, the work of the center, in general, but particularly the proposal to create a civics academy to

overlap with the annual May 4th commemoration, cause real potential, not just to honor the legacy of May 4th, but to link that legacy with contemporary concerns about the issues of democracy, voice participation and civic rights that were at the very heart of the student protests on May 4th. The center builds on an impressive body of work already under undertaken under the umbrella of the Growing Democracy Project. It promises to develop several promising new strands of work. It fills in a gap in the current portfolio centers and institutes and it has the potential to provide a collaborative forum for existing KSU researchers in this field to explore new research, teaching and funding synergies. Above all, I think the sensor will be addressing questions of democracy, participation, and peaceful change that are central to local and national debates today about politics, community and society and those processes of peaceful change associated with those factors.

Associate Professor Kildow motioned to approve, and Associate Professor Ensley seconded. Secretary Tillett asked if the new center would absorb all funding and all activities from the Growing Democracy Project and if it will cease to exist.

Neil replied, yes, it will subsume the Growing Democracy Project within the auspices of the new center.

Secretary Tillett asked why to create a center and not just continue with the activities of the project.

Neil said, the Growing Democracy Project has grown to the point where it is almost a center already, but we have just not given it that label. So, this is a kind of proposal, in part, to recognize where it is or where it is going and to make that direction of travel more concrete.

Secretary Tillett asked if the budget would be funded, for the first three years, by grants that have already come in for the project or is it university money that is funding.

Neil explained that there is a mix. There is funding from money that has been provided to Ashley herself that she is putting forward towards the new center. The funding that the school is providing as part of the support. That is part and parcel of the kind of funding mechanism. The aim is really to utilize the framework and the umbrella of the new center to optimize the funding applications. The aim is to gradually move towards funding model where the funding is coming in from extramural sources, whether it is through grant activities or fee for service work.

With no further questions or comments, the item passed unanimously.

III. Policy Proposals Review

A. Action Items

Graduate Dean's Advisory Council

1. Combined Bachelor's/Master's Degree Program—Revise policy to align with ODHE directive (fall 2023)

VIEW THE DISCUSSION

Senior Associate Provost van Dulmen stated that this is coming down from the ODHE and is something all public universities in the state that offer combined degree programs need to be

compliant. Currently, Kent State allows combined degree programs to double count anywhere from 9 to 12 credits. Under the change policy, the number is decreased to 9. Conversations have been had at Graduate Deans Advisory Council, various offices on campus and coordinators or associate deans and colleges where their programs currently allow for more than 9 credits to be double counted to ensure that we have a teach out program for students in those programs. Going forward only 9 credits can be double counted in combined bachelor's and master's programs. What has been allowed in combined programs has not been clear for some time. The state wants to make sure they are compliant with the HLC. They have had some concerns from HLC about practices. This new directive also is basically an effect of that.

Associate Lecturer Marshall motioned to approve, and Associate Professor seconded the motion.

An EPC member asked if this is at the state level as it runs contrary to the ideas of making these academic endeavors possible. This seems like a tiny step in the opposite direction of wanting to reduce the number of credit hours for students to make education more affordable.

Senior Associate Provost van Dulmen said he agrees. The Council for Graduate Deans was not to have a cap on the number of credits that could be double counted, but leave it up to each institution to decide what that cap should be and how should how it should work. We also have master's programs that have a large number of credits. However, ODHE said that is not the direction KSU can move.

An EPC member asked for clarification on double counting credit hours.

Senior Associate Provost van Dulmen explained that for undergraduate degree at minimum 120 credits and for a master's with at least 30 credits now 9 credits can count both towards the bachelor's degree and the master's degree.

With no further questions or comments, the item passed.

2. Transfer of Graduate Credit—Revise Policy allow Kent State students pursuing subsequent degrees to double count courses (fall 2023)

VIEW THE DISCUSSION

Senior Associate Provost van Dulmen said the second proposal is in proposal for transfer of graduate credit. The proposal is for students who are entering or wanting to seek a dual degree program, but have not entered at the same time in both degrees. They currently cannot count the credits from the first degree earned towards the second degree. If a student wants to do a dual degree in the MSN and an MBA, they need to be enrolled simultaneously. However, if the student earned MSN before the MBA, they cannot earn a dual degree because they were not enrolled at the same time and transferred those credits. The policy is to make modifications to the current transfer policy to allow the credits earned from a previous graduate degree from Kent State to be also count to a future degree at Kent.

Associate Professor Tippey made a motion to approve, and Associate Professor Liu seconded.

An EPC guest asked if students go into one degree in the fall, can they start another degree without finishing the first degree.

Senior Associate Provost van Dulmen said, yes, as long as the program approves it.

An EPC member asked if someone has a professional degree, that in the future, they could try to use some courses towards another degree at Kent State.

Senior Associate Provost van Dulmen said yes, as long as it is approved by the faculty in the program.

With no further questions or comments, the item passed unanimously.

University College

3. Destination Kent State: First Year Experience to: Flashes 101 (New Student Orientation)—Revision policy to align with courses changes (fall 2023)

VIEW THE DISCUSSION

Associate Dean Piatt stated that the policy language will bring the already approved revisions into alignment.

Associate Professor Kildow made a motion to approve, and Associate Professor Ensley seconded.

With no questions or comments, the item passed.

College of Aeronautics and Engineering

- 1. Aeronautical Studies B.S.—Establish program (fall 2023)

VIEW THE DISCUSSION

Assistant Professor Fussell said after looking at recruitment and retention and the marketing abilities of the program, the college realized and was advised to split the concentrations into their own bachelor's degree programs which also lets certain things happen for accreditation purposes. Currently, the college can only market the professional pilot program in certain ways because it is a concentration. By moving the aeronautical studies air traffic and airspace management, aviation management and professional pilot and unmanned aircraft systems flight operations from concentrations into their own bachelor science degree programs, that left the college with the inactivation of the Aeronautics – B.S.

Associate Professor Kildow motioned to approve, and Associate Lecturer Marshall seconded.

With no questions or comments, items 1-6 were approved unanimously.

College of Arts and Sciences: Department of Modern and Classical Language Studies 7. Classics – Graduate Minor—Establish program (fall 2023)

VIEW THE DISCUSSION

Professor Larson stated that the classics faculty have proposed a graduate minor, because many students from other graduate programs, were taking MCLS courses. The department thought it would be beneficial for them to have that coursework memorialized on their transcript if they have enough coursework. This can be done either completely online, hybrid, partly online, partly in person or all in person. Supporting data on student enrollment and documents are included with the proposal.

Associate Lecturer Marshall motioned to approve the item, and Associate Professor Ensley seconded.

With no questions or comments, the item passed unanimously.

College of Communication and Information: School of Emerging Media and Technology 8. Broadcast Engineering Technology—Establish program (fall 2023)

VIEW THE DISCUSSION

School Director Beam said that the proposal is an interdisciplinary collaboration between faculty in the School of Emerging Media and Technology and the School of Media and Journalism in the College of Communication and Information and faculty from the College of Aeronautics and Engineering. The college consulted with Kent State's working broadcast engineers in tele productions and members of the Society of Broadcast Engineers when developing the program. As noted in the proposal, the minor provides coursework where students learn technical applications, skills and networking, multimedia production and coding and problem solving. Students will have the opportunity to use technology to facilitate media recording and coding, distribution, streaming and interaction. This is a 19-credit hour minor with 13 core credit hours and six minor elective hours between EMAT, MDJ and CAE. The program is relying on existing coursework.

Associate Professor McKenney made a motion to approve, and Professor McEnroe-Petitte seconded the motion.

Secretary Tillett asked if there were any other majors that would benefit from this minor.

Associate Professor McKenney said that there are number of parts of the program that students may be interested in. For example, if they were involved with TV2 and loved that, they could get into this minor. It is not a big hill to climb if the students are already in some of those courses, but could be picked up from outside.

Secretary Tillett asked what kind of jobs are out there for broadcast engineers.

Associate Professor McKenney explained that the jobs are for people making sure everything is working. These days, with all the streaming options and all the different ways that stuff is connecting, the information they have to know in order to make that work is rapidly changing. With no further questions or comments, the item passed unanimously.

Secretary Tillett asked if broadcast engineers are at streaming companies along with local and national TV stations.

School Director Beam said, yes. Currently, there is a lot of move from regional sports networks to streaming services. Broadcast engineers are working at those companies to help with the encoding and distribution from the truck outside the sports stadium to the streaming platform company, then distribution out to viewers.

Secretary Tillett asked what kind of background do broadcast engineers have. Is it the engineering part or the media or the integration of both?

School Director Beam exampled that it is an integration. There are a lot of these types of roles across different companies and I think some roles are more on the production side. Some are maybe more on the technical application side and then some are more on the engineering side. All those different backgrounds play a distinct role in these types of jobs. A range of jobs that are going to require more or less hard engineering versus understanding the production elements from inside a studio and camera operation or being able to code or script.

With no further questions or comments the item passed.

School of Media and Journalism

9. Journalism – Minor—Establish program (fall 2023)

VIEW THE DISCUSSION

Associate Professor McKenney said there has not been a journalism minor available going back several years. Students were encouraged to take the major if they wanted to be in journalism. There were other minors that were kind of adjacent but not journalism itself. A couple things have changed. One is the accreditation body allows our students to consume more of our program. Before there was a ceiling on that. Electives were fine, but they were not graduating any sooner. If a student had a minor within the program, it was almost counterproductive in their graduation timeline. That is no longer true. The school is seeing students interested in public relations major, journalism minor, digital media production major and communication studies from across CCI and elsewhere. The school designed an 18-hour minor. The first five classes are the same ones that students take for journalism or for PR. Then, three-hour elective out of several of the class that come next. It allows the school to offer that to students to be able to do storytelling. Another change is to offer one writing course for everyone instead of a writing course for majors and one for non-majors.

Associate Professor Tippey motioned to approve, and Associate Professor seconded.

Secretary Tillett stated that the program will need more upper-division credit hours to meet the minimum for minors. Curriculum Services will work with Associate Professor McKenney to make that correction.

Associate Lecturer Marshall recommended that the motion is modified to say that the proposal is supported with the modifications made by Curriculum Services.

Chair Dauterich said, yes and requested a motion to approve and a second for the friendly amendments.

Associate Lecturer Marshall motioned to approve, and Associate Professor Earp seconded.

With no further questions or comments, the item passed unanimously.

B. Discussion Items

College of the Arts—School of Fashion Design and Merchandising
1. Fashion Industry Studies – M.F.I.S.—Revise delivery mode, description, program requirements, graduation requirements (fall 2023)

VIEW THE DISCUSSION

Professor Palomo-Lovinski stated that what the school is trying to do is shift the M.F.I.S. to be more industry facing for people that are needing to upscale. The delivery mode is online and in person. There are a lot of international students, so the school wants to be able to have the international students on campus should they choose and also industry people, that are predominantly in New York, to be able to engage online. There are some redundancies in courses. The school now has a research methods in fashion industry course and fashion systems thinking which is more critical thinking and revisioning of the fashion industry. The school took an elective that was global consumer in the fashion industry and moved that to a required course. They will be keeping the thesis requirement for those would like to propose their own research ideas and a non-thesis option which bounces off of the required fashion practicum. This is where students are immersed for a semester in an industry with a very particular problem that they are trying to solve while engaged in industry practice. Students are taking what they have done in the practicum and writing about it, exploring it and pushing it a little bit more robustly.

Secretary Tillett asked how the program moved away from its original intention.

Professor Palomo-Lovinski explained that its original intention was to be something that was really hybridized between design and merchandising, and it became, given that fact that two merchandise faculty were the directors, it kept moving more and more towards something that was much more heavily focused. In merchandising, it really did not address a lot of the creative practice that is incredibly important to design and how that design practice can be pragmatically implemented and usable to industry. In the associate director role, the program could be shifted back to what was originally planned.

Secretary Tillett asked what graduates of the program tend to go on to.

Professor Palomo-Lovinski said that it is a little bit of the problem. Merchandising faculty generally go into a Ph.D. program. The courses were being treated like Ph.D. prep. Design is going to be much more focused on design and reflective practice and the on-the-ground solutions. Students come in with a smattering of outcomes. Most of them go right back into industry and are doing exactly what they were doing. The school is trying to figure out a more pointed way in which students can do something very pointedly and pragmatically in the fashion industry.

School of Theatre and Dance

2. Theatre and Social Change – Minor—Establish program at Trumbull Campus; revise learning outcomes (fall 2023)

VIEW THE DISCUSSION

Associate Professor Kildow this is an attempt to rectify an oversight. The theatre major was established at the Trumbull campus back in 2018. There was the theatre and society concentration. The minor had not been created at Trumbull due to error in not selecting that option. The school is now looking to establish the minor at Trumbull to rectify this.

College of Communication and Information: School of Media and Journalism 3. Digital Media Production – Minor—Establish minor at Trumbull Campus; revise program graduation requirements (fall 2023)

VIEW THE DISCUSSION

Associate Professor McKenney explained that Trumbull approached about offering the digital media production minor. It was previously approved for Stark. It was not a difficult task to arrange, so they are ready to move forward.

An EPC member asked if the only change was to offer on an additional site.

Associate Professor McKenney said yes, with minor administrative changes.

Secretary Tillett asked how the minor is doing at Stark and why Trumbull and not any other campus.

Associate Professor McKenney said that students from Trumbull Career and Technical Center (TCTC) could easily flow right into the program at the Trumbull Campus. In particular, there is student interest in this issue at all campuses wanting the idea of film and video recording. The Trumbull Campus believes they could really take advantage of the connection there. Additionally, they are looking into building some CCP courses, so students could get some of the coursework done before they graduate high school. Stark just adopted this about two or three years ago. They are not pursuing it aggressively right now. The numbers have not supported that. They thought with the music technology major there would be some overlap, but there has not been. Stark is not seeing big numbers in this, but it is known that the regionals have had some challenges. It cannot be attributed, necessarily, to lack of interest.

V. Course Proposals Review

A. Discussion Items – University Requirements Curriculum Committee (fall 2023) Diversity Requirement

Kent Core Requirement

- 1. ENG 11002 College Writing I-Stretch to: College Writing-Stretch
- 2. ENG 11011 College Writing I to: College Writing
- 3. ENG 21011 College Writing II to: Research Writing

VIEW THE DISCUSSION

Associate Professor Cunningham explained that Executive EPC had a question about removing roman numerals. It is obvious, by the course numbers and GPS, that students cannot take ENG 21011-College Writing II until they complete ENG 11011-College Writing I. The roman numerals does not suggest to students that they need to take both courses or that the focus of each is different. While 21011 is a continuation of the first writing course, it is an extension and more involved. The language of it being a continuation indicates that students will continue using the processes they learned in 11011, which is peer review, workshops drafts and revisions. The proposed name changes articulate both to students and instructors how these classes are related, but different. Students who have had any writing exposure in high school tend to assume that they do not need the basic information that they presume is included in the first writing course. The college writing courses shift focus from purely academic writing and the writing process to academic writing requiring research and analysis. For example, that is not the same kind of transition as elementary French one to French two. The new titles make the distinction very clear. Roman numerals are not necessary to indicate that students need to take both. The course numbers indicate that one is 10,000 level and the next is 20,000 level. Further, in the GPS system, students see all of the classes that they need to take, which will only continue to improve and become more obvious with the Kent Core initiatives. Anecdotally, the students that have been spoken to, a lot of whom are already in these classes or some of whom have moved on, liked the new titles and thought that they made more sense. One member of the Writing Program Committee said that she could not tell you how many times students waited until later in their academic career to take College Writing II. The students mentioned how they wished they would have taken it sooner as it would have helped with the research foundation and all of their other courses. It is not obvious to students that is what the class is, so it is being renamed Research Writing. The name change will help make the content more obvious. Other Ohio institutions are interested in the name change and would like to do similar. This would make Kent State's writing program at the forefronts of these changes in how composition courses are perceived by students and others outside of the discipline. The Executive EPC also asked about more information about the confusion students were experiencing. Students were misinterpreting the roman numerals to mean that they only need to take one of the two courses and that they can skip the first one entirely. What they do not understand, because the names are vague, is that the first course provides a foundation for writing and teaches students how to write drafts and receive feedback. Before coming to college, most students do not understand that writing is a dialogic process and undervalue or do not understand the importance of receiving feedback in order to revise. They also tend to write in a five-paragraph essay format largely due to standardized testing, which we totally understand. This class helps them understand that and move beyond it. The second writing course applies all of what they learned in the first writing course, but it focuses more on finding, evaluating and integrating secondary sources. Including the word research is in line with the field of writing studies, and the less about what is considered research

in terms of empirical research and other disciplines. Finding, evaluating and integrating secondary sources applies to all disciplines, and the name research writing is not meant to be a class for all majors, but a class for all students. It is a foundational class that is relevant to all other core classes and to basic academic research concepts that can be applied to all fields. The second course has had a research component since the state learning outcomes were updated about 15 years ago and is meant to give students the opportunity to understand the basic concepts of researching, writing, and using secondary sources that can be applied to any discipline. Changing that name will help instructors who have been teaching before these updates occurred when that class was a literature class and some are trying to hold on to that, even though that meets none of the learning outcomes, it is a research writing course. The other issue that arose with Executive EPC was confusion with transfer students. The Writing Program Committee does not believe that these name changes would confuse any transfer students who already work with advisors and the writing program when they are figuring out which courses to transfer. The state maintains course equivalency management system that would be updated with these name changes. The Flash Credit Estimator would also be updated with the name changes.

An EPC member asked how students do not understand that they have to take College Writing I and II and how do they know students are confused. Additionally, the new name for the course may be more confused with this course name being like others within other majors.

Associate Professor Cunningham explained that the confusion comes from the roman numeral that makes students to believe that they are beyond that course and can skip it and they do not need College Writing I at all.

An EPC member asked if the Kent Core requirements say students must take both.

Associate Professor Cunningham said there are ways they do not have to take it. In the past, when Kent was using ACT, if students had a 26 or above, they could skip College Writing I. Now that it is test optional, students need to take College Writing I. The department wants students to understand that when they are looking at the core, there is a class called College Writing and a course called Research Writing. They are similar because they are both writing classes. However, they are different in the content and the research part of it is this idea of finding an integrating secondary sources, learning how to evaluate those courses, know what is credible, what is not credible, understand the basics of how a research essay is written and how to integrate valid sources.

An EPC member asked if students can test out of College Writing I in some manner.

Associate Professor Cunningham said they can still do that with the ACT score, but very few do.

An EPC member asked why they are still proposing College Writing and not something that is more specific to what happens in the course.

Associate Professor Cunningham explained that the Writing Program Committee has debated this for some time. It makes most sense to the committee to because college writing is learning

the writing process and that writing requires a dialogue and feedback. They though of a lot of names, but College Writing fit best.

An EPC member asked what technical writing is compared to research writing. Also, should there be sections focused more on what STEM students are writing about as opposed to standard English.

Associate Professor Cunningham said that professional and technical writing is something completely different than research writing. The course does apply to STEM. They are teaching in a way that should apply to all fields and disciplines in terms of finding sources, integrating sources and knowing how to make sure that sources are credible. APA is used in the courses because it is used more widely. The way that research writing in College Writing II is taught already applies to STEM.

An EPC member asked how long College Writing II has been taught that way.

Associate Professor Cunningham explained that the change at the state level happened 15 years ago and the focus on APA began in 2018.

An EPC member expressed concern that students get to their senior year and are asked to do projects and they cannot write. There is obviously a disconnect senior and sophomore year.

Associate Professor Cunningham stated that the name change could also help with that. Some students do wait until senior year to take College Writing II. They wish they had taken it sooner as it would have helped with other courses. The hope is if they know that it is research writing, then they will be more likely not to wait and realizing it can help with other courses.

Chair Dauterich added that there are two seniors and three juniors in College Writing II. That is not typical of previous the college writing teaching experience.

Associate Dean Warren explained that these changes passed through Arts and Sciences Curriculum Committee unanimously. There were no concerns brought up by any of the representation within our units, which include Psychology and Biology. If there were any concerns, they would have been raised and asked for these changes to be tabled.

An EPC member asked if the name change would help students take the course sooner.

Associate Professor Cunningham explained that if students get an idea of what the course is about from the name, they are more likely to take it sooner.

Secretary Tillett asked if students may feel daunted by taking a course called research writing so early in their academic career.

Associate Professor Cunningham said she would rather know students know what the course entails than a title that they do not know or understand. If it says, "research writing," at least they will know it involves research.

An EPC member asked about hyphenating with College Writing – English I and Research Writing – English II.

Associate Professor Cunningham explained that they did not see the need to make the title longer.

An EPC member asked if students would understand they have to take both.

Associate Professor Cunningham said, yes. There is no reason why students think they have to take College Writing I and II right now, except through GPS.

An EPC member suggested seeing if there is a way, university-wide, to get the writing courses in early in the college career to alleviate some of the deficits.

Associate Professor Cunningham said that students working with advisors are getting these courses in their freshman and sophomore years. She agreed that would be ideal to for all students to take the writing courses early in their college career.

With no further questions, comments or concerns, Chair Dauterich concluded the meeting at 4:56pm.

Chair Dauterich called the meeting to order at 3:20p.m., on Monday, 30 January 2023, via Microsoft Teams.

I. Approval of Minutes

A. Meeting on 23 January 2023

Associate Professor Piontkivska made a motion to approve, and Associate Lecturer Marshall seconded the motion.

With no questions, comments or corrections, the item was passed unanimously.

II. Program Proposals Review

A. Action Items

Ambassador Crawford College of Business and Entrepreneurship Department of Accounting

VIEW THE DISCUSSION

- 1. Accounting Analytics Graduate Certificate—Establish program (fall 2023)
- 2. Advanced Accounting Graduate Certificate—Establish program (fall 2023)

Acting Chair Sellers stated that the department took their Master of Science in Accounting online. This is an extension of that. Each certificate is a four-course bundle. This is filling a need in the marketplace for people who may not want a complete master's, but will benefit from specific courses from within the master's. The Advanced Accounting certificate is designed to for people with a B.A. in Accounting to give them four extra courses to prepare and study for the CPA exam. The Accounting Analytics certificate is targeted to students who may be working professionals and have a need for updating their skills. They hope these certificates will satisfy the needs in the marketplace and that some will finish the master's degree after completing a certificate.

Associate Professor Liu made a motion to approve, and Associate Lecturer Marshall seconded the motion.

Chair Dauterich asked about the support from the community and students.

Acting Chair Sellers explained that they have an accounting board that is made up of, primarily, alumni. There is universal interest in analytics as people see that in their everyday life and are looking to upskill the people that they have. Prior, they wanted people to be CPA ready by the time they are hired. Now, there is more demand for accountants than there is supply. They are starting to see graduates with a B.A. being hired, and the graduates getting their CPA while working. There should be a lot of interest in the medium to large size firms in the area. Meetings are scheduled with businesses in the area to discuss this further. The certificates are leveraging off of existing courses.

With no other questions or comments, the items passed.

Department of Management and Information Systems

- 3. International Business Graduate Certificate—Establish program (fall 2023)
- 4. Quantitative Business Management Graduate Certificate—Establish program (*fall 2023*) VIEW THE DISCUSSION

Associate Dean Dubois said that a couple of years ago, they created certificates that provided a stackable certificate approach to getting the M.B.A. Certificates were also created business analytics and human resource management. The certificates have had a good uptake. Students have stacked them towards the M.B.A. and their concentration within the M.B.A. These new certificates will be an expansion. International Business has a range of courses. None of the courses have prerequisites, so they are available to anyone across campus as well. If someone is a working business professional and they want to go towards jobs in international business, they can use this certificate to go towards that. Quantitative Business Management is a renaming of

what used to be Financial Management stackable certificate. The Finance department wanted that name of their certificate. Quantitative Business Management has no new courses. The Financial Management certificate will have finance courses. The college expects uptake in these certificates.

Associate Professor Liu made a motion to approve, and Associate Lecturer Marshall seconded the motion.

Secretary Tillett asked why they would not market to the students who are in the International Business concentration within the M.B.A.

Associate Dean Dubois explained that students are able to put on their LinkedIn that they have a certificate in international business rather than a concentration. It draws more attention and has greater legitimacy.

Secretary Tillett asked for confirmation that the students would be earning two credentials for the same curriculum.

Associate Dean Dubois added that students do take an extra course in the certificate.

Secretary Tillett asked if the college has thought about removing the concentrations and making them all certificates.

Associate Dean Dubois said no. Some students do not want to take the extra course. She said they will think and discuss it.

Secretary Tillett asked why the extra course was in the certificate and not in the concentration.

Associate Dean Dubois said that this is so students have a choice to take the extra course. Not every M.B.A. student does this. People who do not want to do the M.B.A. also take the certificates. The certificates provide different pathways and are stackable.

Secretary Tillett asked why they would want to market to current students in the M.B.A. within a concentration.

Associate Dean Dubois said that it looks better on students' LinkedIn profile if they have a certificate.

With no further questions, the items passed unanimously.

College of Arts and Sciences

5. Pre-Health – Undergraduate Certificate—Establish program (*fall 2023*) VIEW THE DISCUSSION

Associate Dean Warren the college is proposing a pre-health certificate that targets students who graduated with a non-health degree and want to come back to get the prerequisite courses that are required for medical schools. This includes medical, dental, pharmacy, physician assistant and veterinary. There are not any other programs that currently serve this population. Consultation

and support have come from Arts and Sciences and other units in the university. The certificate has some core requirements that are common to other professional schools. There are a number of electives that students will take based on what professional school they are interested. All courses currently exist. The college and units, biology, chemistry, physics and psychology, have academic and faculty advisors to guide the students through the requirements. This certificate will allow students to get financial aid. The students will also be tracked and advisors can ensure they get all they need.

Academic Program Coordinator, Erin Lawson, added that a big component would be guidance. Students coming in would need to have a minimum 3.000 GPA to declare the certificate. Students will not be setup for unrealistic expectations for what they might pursue in the future. Guidance would be provided along the way to also ensure that students are meeting extracurriculars.

Associate Professor Ensley made a motion to approve, and Associate Professor Piontkivska seconded.

Associate Professor Osbourne asked if the College of Podiatric Medicine could play a part in the certificate. There are only a couple students from Kent State.

Associate Dean Warren explained that they visited the College of Podiatric Medicine (CPM) and had discussion about how they could collaborate.

Erin added that would be a fantastic opportunity and that there is room to guide students to CPM's admission representatives. The college would like to look more into this in the future.

Secretary Tillett asked if they foresee articulation agreements with community colleges or other universities.

Erin said there may be a possibility for that, but it would depend on the particular student and professional school they desire to attend. A number of professional schools require a degree from a four-year institution.

With no further questions or comments, the item passed unanimously.

Department of Chemistry and Biochemistry

6. Biochemistry – B.S.—Establish program (fall 2023)

VIEW THE DISCUSSION

Associate Professor Stroup stated that the proposal is to convert the concentrations into a major. The proposal has retained the program requirements. The B.S. Chemistry major is not going away. It will retain the Chemistry, Industrial Chemistry and Material Chemistry concentrations. The structural change will be big for the department. The B.S. Chemistry/Biochemistry concentration is a concentration of chemistry and not a standalone B.S. in Chemistry program. The department has prepared a plan to reduce disruption and loss of enrollment and to create a smoother transition. The existing Biochemistry program has a combined enrollment of 120

students for 2022. Materials Chemistry, Industrial Chemistry and Chemistry, the combined enrollment is 41. There is also a process for continued review.

Associate Professor Piontkivska made a motion to approve, and Associate Lecturer Marshall seconded the motion.

Associate Dean Warren added that since the Biochemistry concentration has been so popular, elevating it to a standalone program could possibly increase student enrollment.

With no further questions or comments, the item passed.

Department of Computer Science

7. Cybersecurity Foundations – Minor

VIEW THE DISCUSSION

Professor Dragan said that 10 years ago, the department created a cybersecurity concentration in their bachelor's program. Based on that concentration, the department wants to create a minor so that students in other areas in the university can take the minor. College of Aeronautics and Engineering and Department of Sociology uses some of the courses for cybersecurity and cybercriminal. The minor is being proposed so that students from other departments can have exposure different top domains of cybersecurity. Consultation has been conducted and support gathered with other units throughout the university and with the cybersecurity committee. The minor is named Cybersecurity Foundations, so that the name "Cybersecurity" can be used for future programs.

Associate Professor Piontkivska motioned to approve, and Associate Professor Osbourne seconded.

With no questions or comments, the item passed.

School of Peace and Conflict Studies

8. Environment, Peace and Justice – Minor

VIEW THE DISCUSSION

Professor Kaplan stated that the minor will combine the elements from Peace and Conflict Studies and Environmental Studies.

School Director Cooper added that they support the proposal. They believe it responds to demand in those areas and broadly. The combination of the required courses work really well together. This is a program that delivers on the Kent State University's commitment to promote learning that sparks sustainable outcomes to better the World.

Secretary Tillett asked how the title was created and if Peace, Justice and the Environment was considered.

Professor Kaplan said that was not considered, but asked if there was a better reason to use that title.

Secretary Tillett explained that the question comes from the focus and also alphabetical order. She asked if the focus comes from peace and conflict or environment.

Professor Kaplan said that they wanted to attract students from both peace and conflict and environment. They thought this would be a good minor for either of those programs to expand their studies. Also, students outside the two majors who have an interest. The order of words in the title was not considered.

School Director Cooper added that the program leads with environment. The courses are environmentally based. The minor provides a clear focus on practices of conflict resolution around environmental disputes.

Secretary Tillett asked why the program decided to go with 21 credits.

Professor Kaplan explained that most of their minors have about 18 credits. The additional three credits in this minor were from courses they really felt they needed in the minor. They do anticipate that many of the students taking this minor will have taken some of these courses already. Two of the classes are Kent Core courses. Given that there is so much potential for overlap, they do not see that there will be an issue completing the 21 credit hours.

Associate Professor Piontkivska motioned to approve, and Associate Lecturer Marshall seconded.

With no further questions or comments, the item passed unanimously.

College of Communication and Information School of Media and Journalism

9. Communication and Advocacy – Graduate Certificate—Establish program (*fall 2023*) VIEW THE DISCUSSION

School Director Haridakis stated that advocacy is a seminal roots of the field of communication studies. Advocacy courses have always been a part of the school. In recent years, there is a growing number of students interested in advocacy and activism. There also have been a growing number of jobs with advocacy within the field. This has been a discussion for a long time and the coursework has been developed along the way. It is a 12-credit program. Students have an option of six courses to choose from and from various advocacy areas.

Associate Professor Piontkivska made a motion to approve, and Associate Professor McEnroe-Petitte seconded.

With no questions or comments, the item was approved.

School of Media and Journalism

10. Journalism Education – Graduate Certificate—Establish program (*fall 2023*) VIEW THE DISCUSSION

School Director Metzgar stated that the proposal is for a graduate certificate in Journalism Education. A total of 12-credit hours, two required courses and a selection of two courses from

four electives. This is for established teachers, advisors and media professionals who are interested in transitioning to teach in the post-secondary space. The program will be offered 100% online. It is associated with the Center for Scholastic Journalism, which is also funded with support from the James L. Knight Foundation. The certificate is comprised of a subset of courses from the existing master's degree with a specialization in journalism education. This is not a teacher certification program. The need for the program builds on existing M.A., responds to call for non-degree credentials, data driven, aligned with CSJ and Knight Chair missions and supports future journalism. The learning outcomes are intended to build a well-designed, comprehensive and pedagogical experience for people working in this space. Only one new course, which is Teaching Media Literacy. This will help to serve that is not already being served within the journalism program and also those losing steam in the master's program.

Associate Professor Piontkivska motioned to approve, and Associate Professor Tippey seconded.

Secretary Tillett asked if they see students who would have gone into the master's go into the certificate instead.

School Director Metzgar said no. They see the opposite. The school had conversations with the Cleveland Metro School District with trying to provide training for teachers already working in the system. The school believes that the certificate will be enticing to teachers not interested in pursing a master's, but would like more specialized training.

With no further questions or comments, the item passed unanimously.

College of Education, Health and Human Services School of Foundations, Leadership and Administration

11. Educational Studies – B.S.—Revise name to Professional Studies; revise delivery to mostly online in addition to in person; revise description and CIP code (*fall 2023*)

VIEW THE DISCUSSION

Assistant Professor Ray-Tomasek said that Educational Studies was established 40 years ago. This has worked as a degree completer program for many years. In more recent years, they have found they are serving students in diverse backgrounds. The name has not been a good fit for some time. Professional Studies is more fitting. The program has been online for some time and will now be clearly identified as mostly online. There were some raised concerns from CATS about the concern for confusion for students regarding the name change. The school did embark on meetings to more clearly define the degree completion programs that exist. There will also be a website to provide more understanding.

Associate Professor Piontkivska motioned to approve, and Associate Professor McEnroe-Petitte seconded.

With no questions or comments, the item passed unanimously.

College of Public Health

12. Clinical Research – Graduate Certificate—Establish program (*fall 2023*) VIEW THE DISCUSSION

Interim Associate Dean Zullo stated that Clinical Research graduate certificate will be comprised of four existing courses within the college. Two are being reactivated at the graduate level. It also includes an option for a new course that is being developed for the Healthcare and Compliance certificate. The certificate can count as electives in the M.P.H. in Epidemiology or Biostatistics. It can also lead to the M.S. in Clinical Epidemiology. The certificate is very efficient and is a pathway that can lead to a program within the college. It is 100% online. There is a need, nationwide, for clinical researchers. This program is largely aimed at people who currently work in a clinical setting that have no training in clinical research and who want to move into the research setting. A 2020 survey from Association of Clinical Research Professionals that job postings in clinical research increased by 9.3% from the previous three years. Currently, 380 job opening in Ohio and 15,000 nationwide.

Associate Professor Piontkivska motioned to approve, and Associate Lecturer Marshall seconded the motion.

Chair Dauterich asked if the college sees this more for students that will move onto a master's program or for students that want to add on credentials.

Interim Associate Dean Zullo explained that it will be good for both.

With no further questions or comments, the item passed.

13. Environmental Health Sciences for Natural Science Majors – Minor—Establish program (*fall* 2023)

VIEW THE DISCUSSION

Interim Associate Dean Zullo said that the college currently has a minor in Environmental Health Sciences, but this change will help make it more readily available for students in the basic sciences to take public health courses and then take the registered sanitarian exam. This will add some course options to the minor.

Associate Professor Piontkivska motioned to approve, and Associate Lecturer Marshall seconded the motion.

With no questions or comments, the item passed unanimously.

14. Healthcare Compliance – Graduate Certificate—Establish program (*fall 2023*) VIEW THE DISCUSSION

Associate Professor Brewer said that field of healthcare compliance has been growing steadily for the last 30 years. The demand for healthcare compliance professionals was accelerated by the Affordable Care Act (ACA). There was a requirement in the ACA that every long-term care, skilled nursing facilities and other healthcare facilities had to have a dedicated healthcare compliance professional. Before that, it was strongly suggested. This is a legacy regulation that was supposed to come into effect in 2018. In 2018, there was a concern to find qualified professionals for these roles. Associate Professor Brewer did a survey with the Ohio Healthcare Association surveying every for-profit, long-term care facility in Ohio and many of them said they do not know how or where to meet this. The Trump Administration tried to re-write the

regulation that was ease the requirement, but were not able to follow through. In October 2022, CMS started auditing on this. There is a lot of concern for this in the field of how to meet the requirement. There are a lot of third-party organizations setup that can come in on a periodic basis to fulfill the need. There is a huge need for people with this skillset. This certificate will be submitted for accreditation through the Healthcare Compliance Association that would allow graduates to sit for the certification exam. The certificate would be stackable on the M.P.H. Students would not have to take anymore courses. Students would either add this as a credential or continue onto a master's. Consultation has taken place with EHHS. One long-term care course from EHHS is listed as an "or." The college also worked with Ambassador Crawford College (ACCBE) of Business and Entrepreneurship to put in an ECON class in the future. ACCBE students could also use this certificate with their Nursing Home Administration degree. The college believes there will be a broad appeal across the university and form the field.

Associate Professor Tippey motioned to approve, and Associate Professor McEnroe-Petitte seconded.

With no questions, comments or concerns, the item passed unanimously.

15. LGBTQ+ Public Health – Graduate Certificate—Establish program (*fall 2023*) VIEW THE DISCUSSION

Interim Associate Dean Zullo stated that the certificate is aimed for individuals who treat LGBTO+ individuals, whether they work in a public health setting or a clinical medicine setting. It has two new courses and three established courses. All courses can lead to the M.P.H. It is a unique program in the area and nationally. Only a handful of programs that offer training in this area. The college directed a local needs assessment which showed a great need to address the unique health needs and concerns of the LGBTQ+ community. The information gathered showed that only 19% of individuals in this community receive care at established LGBTQ-focused clinics. This means the majority receive care from a clinician who likely has no training. Allies were also surveyed. That data showed that 64% were uninformed or knew little about LGBTQ+ issues. Under 35% reported that they witnessed LGBTO+ discrimination in a medical or mental health setting. 46% indicated that they do not know where to go for information on how to support these individuals with healthcare. Overall, data from the community needs assessment shows that allies need help identifying the health problems that might be unique to this community and guidance on how to provide help. There was also qualitative research that came from the needs assessment. It showed that LGBTQ+ individuals feared being denied healthcare or not having access to healthcare and being able to take care of themselves as they age with fear of medical discrimination. Overall, there is a need to train practitioners in public and clinical health settings to meet the needs of LGBTQ+ individuals. Students in the college, local community of public health practitioners and healthcare partners have offered strong support for the certificate and have indicated that they will encourage their staff to use their tuition reimbursement and enroll in the program.

Associate Professor McEnroe-Petitte made a motion to approve, and Associate Professor Piontkivska seconded.

With no questions, comments or concerns, the item passed unanimously.

With no further questions, comments or concerns, Chair Dauterich concluded the meeting at 4:35p.m.

Meeting Minutes Monday, 20 February 2023 View the Meeting

Chair Dauterich called the meeting to order at 3:20p.m., on Monday, 20 February 2023, via Microsoft Teams.

I. Approval of Minutes

A. Meeting on 30 January 2023

Professor Piontkivska made a motion to approve, and Associate Lecturer Marshall seconded the motion.

With no questions, comments or corrections, the item was passed unanimously.

II. Subcommittee Reports

A. University Requirements Curriculum Committee

VIEW THE REPORT

Dean Smith stated that the URCC reviewed the ELR this past year. The ELR is a high impact practice and is recommended for the undergraduate students across the country. Kent State has been using this since Fall of 2012. Students can earn ELR credit through for-credit courses or non-credit course experiences. URCC is interested in how it is going and what the trends are and

what can be recommended. There are five categories of ELR and they still remain strong areas. There are 415 ELR courses available and in 2021-2022, 45% of ELR courses were offered only during summer or winter/spring break. The majority of the ELR courses are offered in the upper division, 21% shared across the campuses and lower division were primarily offered at the regional campuses. Three ELR courses also count in the Kent Core. Most enrollment are in the practical experience ELR's, and capstone have the greatest growth. URCC recommends offering more opportunities in the lower division level for ELR credit, make identifiable links or pathways to upper division ELR experiences, develop a way to recognize ELR completion in a tangible way and consider incorporating the ELR into the revised Kent Core.

Associate Professor said that ELR status can be requested for one semester only under special circumstances and is approved by the URCC.

Secretary Tillett asked if they looked into what worked best as ELR courses based on student data and input. She asked if the assessment showed if scheduling sections of a course worked or if it caused any problems.

Dean Smith explained that they did not use surveys, but relied on the enrollment data. This was mean to be a snapshot evaluation. The enrollment data shows that practical experience wins. Students are really making use of those courses. If the URCC did survey, they would go to students and alums, but that was not the scope of this overview.

Secretary Tillett asked if students and faculty saw that students were getting something out of the ELR courses, since the report said URCC did not want this to not be just checking a box.

Dean Smith said they do not have direct data on that. The single section ELR's have happened throughout the university curriculum, and it seems to be successful in some areas. That is shown with people coming back year after year to designate a section as ELR. Where it has shown the most potential is in the Kent Core. The Kent Core has many sections and some instructors have figured out a way to make it an ELR for that semester. There is good potential to reach into the Kent Core and make more of them an ELR. Without having surveys from faculty and students, there is not much more to confirm single-section success.

Secretary Tillett asked if URCC reviewed how the ELR's that are not tied to a course are doing.

Dean Smith explained that they tried. They reviewed with Wayne Schneider on this, but there was not an easy way to get numbers of that.

An EPC member asked if there was still a one credit hour ELR that could be added to a course.

Dean Smith said, yes it still exists. Faculty can designate a course ELR, designate a section and ELR (per semester), a one credit attachment and the practical experience makes it an ELR.

An EPC member asked if there is an approval process for the one credit attachment before requesting ELR designation on a course.

Dean Smith said to try it out on a section.

An EPC guest asked for the civic and community engagement category to be reviewed, and possibly more options added as it seemed to be the lowest in the categories.

Dean Smith explained that URCC noticed was most of the ELR courses were upper division. When this was setup, the idea was that it would include both upper and lower division courses. There is a lot of room to consider leveraging experiences in the lower division and connect them to the upper division.

B. Committee-Wide Discussion: Time Limits for Subcommittee Chairs

VIEW THE DISCUSSION

Chair Dauterich stated that this was discussed at the Exec EPC meeting. The committee thought it would be a good idea to have a two to three-year term for committees unless the members want to stay on. They would be staggered terms. The suggestion was also that chairs be there for more than one year. There is also the possibility that some committees need different timelines/terms than others.

Secretary Tillett asked if the committee agreed to put a two-year term limit on chairs, should the clock start when the subcommittees started, on current chairs or a future date.

Chair Dauterich said that is open for discussion.

An EPC member suggested to start the term when the policy is made. Also, it should be made clear that if a committee wants to re-elect a chair after their term, they can.

Chair Dauterich said that is fine if someone wanted to re-run for chair.

An EPC member asked if specific types of chairs, such as faculty, administrator or one faculty one admin.

Chair Dauterich said he believes that is listed on the charges of the subcommittees.

An EPC member asked how big of a deal it is to have terms. There is concern with continuous turnover of chairs and members.

Chair Dauterich said none will be forced to leave. It is a standard way of moving forward with the committee if a member is no longer able to serve or wanting to serve. The term limit helps to committee to move on in those circumstances. Chairs will have to be elected by the committee. It is more difficult to get people to serve, so none would be forced out.

An EPC member asked if we would want vice chairs to train people in the role, so that there is the transfer of universal knowledge.

Chair Dauterich said that is something we could try to create for the subcommittees. Secretary Tillett added that Curriculum Services has discussed providing more resources to the committees. A lot of the committees become either revisions or new academic policies. The resources would help with how to get feedback, policy writing and revisions and what the proposal should contain. Step-by-step of how to move proposals forward.

Chair Dauterich asked if this is something to be put on as a future action item.

Secretary Tillett suggested elevating the item during the current meeting unless others would like more conversation.

Chair Dauterich asked for a motion to instate the term limits discussed.

Associate Lecturer Marshall made a motion to establish two year limits for chairs and the ability to be re-elected if desired, and Professor Piontkivska seconded.

An EPC member mentioned that a three-year term may be better for the committee.

Chair Dauterich suggested making the term for EPC chair, subcommittee chairs and subcommittee members three years.

Associate Lecturer Marshall motioned to, instead, establish a three year term limit for EPC chair, subcommittee chairs and members. Professor Piontkivska seconded the motion.

Chair Dauterich opened the floor for any questions or concerns on the motion.

With no questions or concerns, the item passed.

III. Policy Proposals Review

Undergraduate Policy Council

1. Grade Point Average (GPA) Adjustment—Revise policy (fall 2023)

VIEW THE DISCUSSION

Co-chair Miller stated that after the GPA Adjustment Policy was implemented, the committee realized that there were some questions that arose from advisors. The eligibility requirements were not quite clear enough as it was reflected in some of the questions. In addition, the requirements for a student to complete a quiz was considered an equity issue as no other policy requires that. The committee decided to make a revision to clarifying that students must be seeking a Kent State degree or certificate and students must be enrolled in undergraduate Kent State courses. This policy does not apply to guest or former students. The committee also wants to remove the completion of a quiz for eligibility. Instead, as students apply for eligibility, there is a statement they will initial that would have been a part of the quiz. It is meeting the same intentionality, but not requiring a quiz. The committee found that some of the pages did not get changed with the new name, so there is cleanup for that as well. This will help the policy be clear about who the policy applies, removing the quiz that causes equity issues and ensuring the policy name is correct.

Associate Professor Wamsley added that Secretary Tillett will be including the policy history.

Associate Lecturer Marshall motioned to approve, and Professor Piontkivska seconded the motion.

With no questions or comments, the item passed unanimously.

IV. Program Proposals Review

A. Action Items

Ambassador Crawford College of Business and Entrepreneurship Department of Management and Information Systems

1. Leading Through Challenge – Graduate Certificate—Establish program (fall 2023)

VIEW THE DISCUSSION

Associate Dean Dubois said that both Peace and Conflict Studies and Business have courses that address leadership skills. When reviewing what cooperations are doing for leadership skills and training, they can never have enough. They also prefer to get training from a university and that it is trusted and high quality. People are leading through challenge as there is challenge and change everywhere. The proposal is to be combine two courses from Business and three from Peace and Conflict Studies, which will prepare students with solid skills to lead effectively. One of the courses from Business is Leadership and Management Skills, which is very hands on with feedback. The other course is Leading Positive Organizational Change and is taught by someone with a lot of experience in organizational change.

School Director Cooper said three courses from Peace and Conflict Studies include a specialist course on negotiation, a course on mediation and another course on organizational conflict and cooperation. They are practice and skills-based courses, so students can develop needed skills.

Associate Dean Dubois added that this certificate is only offered in person, since there is so much hands on practice. The courses are already existing, so nothing new is being establish. It will be beneficial for students in both subject areas to hear from one another. This also meets the university's goal to have more multi-disciplinary study.

Secretary Tillett asked if they plan on moving the certificate online.

Associate Dean Dubois said they have discussed this as the two business courses are online. However, it is what is happening in the hands-on practice in the Peace and Conflict Studies courses.

School Director Cooper added that since the focus is practice-based, they have been traditionally run in person. The next stage of discussion would be to consider offering it online. As it is currently structured and delivered, including classroom-based work, they would need to consider how that could be done online.

With no further questions or comments, the item passed unanimously.

College of Arts and Sciences Department of Political Science

2. Global Issues – Undergraduate Certificate—Establish program (fall 2023)

VIEW THE DISCUSSION

Chairperson Molina stated that the proposal is based off of a two -ear discussion with History, Peace and Conflict Studies, Geography and Political Science. Much of the motivation comes from the desire to increase enrollment and provide more coherent experience for Florence students. One of the problems was that Florence students had already taken the courses offered. The department wanted to create courses that were unique to the Florence campus. The program requirements show many "or" options. Students can complete the certificate in Kent, Florence and both on and off campus. A credit hour was added to make it possible for visiting students and post baccalaureate students to get financial aid. The vision was to have a companion program similar to the Washington and Columbus programs, but in Florence. The department has cross-listed courses with Geography and Environmental Science to continue to build with interdisciplinary collaboration.

Associate Lecturer Marshall motioned to approve, and Professor Piontkivska seconded the motion.

Chair Dauterich asked about the collaboration with History.

Chairperson Molina explained that they are still working with History and that their curriculum committee did not have time to consider it. Conversation will continue. This will be the first credential that students can obtain fully abroad.

An EPC member asked about some the courses that do not appear to exist yet.

Chairperson Molina explained that some of the courses went through, and some are on the current agenda.

An EPC member asked for confirmation that the required courses are created and just need approval.

Chairperson Molina said that the Earth Sciences cross-listing had been tabled but is on the agenda now. The other course was a capstone class that needed to be 16 hours in order for students to be eligible for financial aid.

With no further questions or comments, the item passed unanimously.

With no further questions, comments or concerns on the agenda, Chair Dauterich concluded the meeting at 4:16p.m.

Chair Dauterich called the meeting to order at 3:20p.m., on Monday, 20 March 2023, via Microsoft Teams.

I. Approval of Minutes

A. Meeting on 20 February 2023

Professor Piontkivska made a motion to approve, and Associate Professor Barber seconded the motion.

With no questions, comments or corrections, the item was passed unanimously.

II. Subcommittee Reports

A. Graduate Policies Committee

VIEW THE REPORT

Associate Professor Barber stated that the subcommittee focused on two policy revisions. The first one is academic forgiveness. The committee has discussed course repeat included within the policy. The committee will be sending out a request for feedback on recommendations from

GDAC and chairs and directors. The focus is to make the course repeat section of the policy fairer and clearer for graduate students. Recommendations are to allow graduate students to repeat up to two courses with a C- or below between 50000/80000 level. There are no more than two repeat attempts allowed. The university will recalculate the student's GPA with the highestgrade attempt and credit hours associated with the grade. This would only affect the student's overall GPA at this time. The committee will be working on defining program GPA. Courses designated as repeatable for credit are exempt from the two-attempt limit. The recommendations have not been distributed, but will be within the next week for feedback. The second policy being worked on is academic standing and dismissal. This will be going to GDAC and chairs and directors for feedback. The recommended changes are removing the word "systemic," clarifying academic standards may go above the university requirement, replacing "must" with "should," replacing "below C" to "below C-" to align policies, removing dean's list and good standing from academic review since they were specific to podiatric medicine and changing probation requirements to extend 3.0 GPA requirement to the following semester to allow more time to improve. Students who are on an official leave of absence cannot be issued probation. If the student on probation does not take any graded coursework that semester will not count as their probation.

Associate Dean Mitchell, member of the Graduate Policies Council, added that there is no reference to grades in the probation section. Previously, there was reference to eight hours of Borlower and four hours of C- or lower. This was removed due to the difference in credit hours among programs. Some programs are 60 hours, 45 hours and some are 30 hours. It was not fair to have the same expectations for all. Additionally, students who have a GPA above 3.0 within three or four courses have gotten grades of B- and are eligible for dismissal. This did not make sense, because students can graduate with a 3.0 or higher. The committee also did not want to remove a student from a GA position midway through the year when they have the opportunity to improve their GPA. The dismissal is now based on whether a student can get themselves off probation. Once the student is on probation, they have one semester during which they have to get a GPA above 3.0. If they do that, but they are still ineligible to be off probation, then they receive another semester to raise their GPA above 3.0. If the student still remains on probation, they will be dismissed. Further semesters to alleviate probation are at the discretion of the academic unit.

Senior Associate Provost van Dulmen asked if this would come to EPC again.

Associate Professor Barber said, yes, it will come for a vote in the near future.

B. International Advisory Committee

VIEW THE DISCUSSION

OGE Executive Director Sarah Malcolm stated that the committee is working on identifying four awards that will be centered around internationalization. This is in response to Kent State being recognized in the 2022 Simon Award for Comprehensive Internationalization. The committee felt the next step was finding a way to recognize faculty and staff. Three of them will be faculty awards and one will be for staff. The committee is hoping to have a monetary award attached to that. The plan is during International Education Week in November, they will be awarded.

III. Structure Proposals ReviewA. Action ItemsCollege of Aeronautics and Engineering1. Center for Advanced Air Mobility—Establish center (fall 2023)

VIEW THE DISCUSSION

Associate Professor Stringer said that the center will be a multidisciplinary community of researchers and practitioners addressing one of the most emergent and disrupted technologies in both aeronautics and engineering. The incorporation of small, autonomous aircraft into the national airspace and the global economy, with a particular emphasis on sustainability and clean energy. Advanced air mobility (AAM) refers to the integration of autonomous aircraft technology and low-level air transportation with the aim of providing safe, efficient and sustainable air transportation solutions for passengers and cargo. It comprises an ecosystem of new aircraft designs, air traffic management systems and infrastructure regulatory frameworks to enable the widespread use of passenger air vehicles. The goal of AAM is to provide faster, more convenient and cost-effective access to cities as well as remote and underserved areas, while reducing traffic congestion, emissions and the carbon footprint of urban and aviation transportation. This ecosystem is mainly being brought about by the Air Force and NASA with the FAA. Not only are there different types of aircraft and they all function from electric propulsion or some kind of hybrid, but also have to deal with the airspace that can get these into and out of the air safely without affecting what we think of as traditional. There are a unique blend of researchers and practitioners in the area. They have had significant student population growth of 30% in the last five years. The underrepresented student growth percentage has doubled in the last five years. Students are placing well in national competitions in both aeronautics and engineering. The college wants to conduct research and develop technologies for this emerging area, train a workforce that can function in this new area and engage several partners whether those partners be other universities, state officials and the population that needs to understand the benefits of this technology. Current advanced air mobility activities include programs and workforce development, facilities and labs, operations, systems and security, policies, propulsion and power, government and professional service and robotics, autonomy and human factor apps. The state of Ohio is making significant strides and significant investment. They have identified areas, manufacturers, airports and academic institutions and the ecosystem capabilities many of which are already in place in the college. In their strategic planning, the ecosystem capabilities the college is seeking to build and identify how the units within the university can fit in and partner on multidisciplinary projects, especially being an R1 institution and continuing to further this in terms of demand. The United States is behind in this technology compared to Europe and other countries such as Malaysia. The state of Ohio commissioned a report through the Ohio Department of Transportation Commission and found AAM has about a \$13 billion economic impact in the upcoming years, with an estimated 15,000 jobs. It parallels Ohio's other big high-tech pushes, the Intel plant that's coming to the Columbus area, and the transformation of the Lordstown plant into a plant building electric trucks. In terms of uniqueness and how Kent State complements what is happening in southwest Ohio. The college will also bring in partners, such as Case Western, Cleveland State, Youngstown State, Baldwin Wallace and others. The five-year plan includes year one to establish identifying an advisory board, identify a director, set up an inaugural symposium and begin to setup those processes, year two will be to implement, year three is to assess and readjust as necessary and then years four and five will be to further develop proposals, research and pursue launching an institute.

Associate Professor Stringer made a motion to approve, and Senior Lecturer Laux seconded the motion.

With no questions or comments, the item passed unanimously.

College of Education, Health and Human Services

2. Center for Disability Inclusion—Merge the Center for Disability Studies and the Center for Innovation in Transition and Employment to form the new center (fall 2023)

VIEW THE DISCUSSION

Professor Unger stated that the reason for the merger is that the two former directors of each of the centers have retired and left the university. Both of the centers have very common interests and have collaborated on proposals for external funding and worked on student initiatives. The college would like to pull the resources across the two centers to provide greater resources, strength and ability to secure external funds. The mission of the center is to advance the inclusion of individuals with disabilities across all aspects of society. The work across the two centers has focused on youth and young adults with disabilities across the spectrum of physical and cognitive disabilities. The mission would be interdisciplinary research to primarily secure external funding to support research endeavors. Additionally, the mission would be to provide training and technical assistance to community providers, state agencies, families of individuals with disabilities and individuals with disabilities. The proposal offers to operate pre employment transition service program, which is a federally recognized program through the Workforce Opportunities and Innovation Act. The program is essentially a fee for service program. Kent State would be reimbursed for those services from the state agency (Opportunities for Ohioans with Disabilities). Another task of the center will be to initially operate a telehealth or tele support line for individuals with disabilities, families and caregivers. Often times, through experience and research findings have indicated that disability services can be complex systems for families to navigate. The center has an external advisory board, and the goal is to merge operations.

Associate Lecturer Marshall motioned to approve, and Associate Professor Fisch seconded the motion.

With no questions or comments, the item passed unanimously.

V. Program Proposals Review

A. Action Items

College of Arts and Sciences

School of Multidisciplinary Social Sciences and Humanities

1. Gender and Sexuality Studies – Establish program to be offered in person at the Kent Campus (fall 2023 pending final approvals)

VIEW THE DISCUSSION

Associate Professor Mazzei said that what makes this program strong relative to other programs is having experts across the university who are either related to or tangentially related to gender and sexuality studies, which gives the program the ability to offer dimensionality and nuance and intersectionality that other programs in gender and sexuality studies cannot offer. The major is 30 hours. It involves the creation of four new courses and electives.

Professor Taylor motioned to approve, and Associate Professor Fisch seconded.

With no questions or comments, the item passed.

B. Discussion Items

College of Arts and Sciences

Department of Computer Science

1. Computer Sciences – M.C.S.—Program development plan to establish a Master of Computer Science degree (with concentrations in Cybersecurity and Data Science), to be offered online only

VIEW THE DISCUSSION

Professor Peyravi stated that this program mimics the existing programs except this is a professional degree. The courses are geared towards professional experience rather than research. Students will discuss technologies used for cybersecurity.

Secretary Tillett asked how the department would restrict course registration from other programs since the new courses overlap with current courses.

Professor Peyravi explained that the department will tell the Ph.D. students that the course would not count. This will be done with advising. The department does not know whether it can be done electronically (registration restriction).

Secretary Tillett asked if a student in another program took one of the new courses, it would not be counted toward their degree.

Professor Peyravi said that is correct. Course registration will be given by permission.

An EPC member asked how this program compares to Aeronautics cybersecurity degree.

Professor Peyravi explained that they have a committee that reviews cybersecurity across campus as well as data science. Differences are discussed and distinguished.

Associate Dean Warren added that the courses are aimed at this specific population of students that are in the workforce and want to get a master's degree. The courses could be restricted in banner to students within the degree.

An EPC member asked if more faculty was going to be needed to cover the new courses.

Professor Peyravi explained that there is a plan. The department is currently hiring one full time TT faculty member and two new NTT's.

An EPC member asked what other units have been consulted and if there are letters of support attached.

Professor Peyravi said that the information was informally discussed, but the curriculum coordinator typically takes care of the letters of support. They should be attached to the proposal.

Chair Dauterich added the final proposal should include a letter or e-mail of support.

Associate Dean Warren clarified that this is the initial PDP, and more will be included in the full proposal.

With no further questions, comments or concerns on the agenda, Chair Dauterich concluded the meeting at 4:30p.m.

Chair Dauterich called the meeting to order at 3:20p.m., on Monday, 17 April 2023, via Microsoft Teams.

I. Approval of Minutes

A. Meeting on 20 March 2023

Professor Piontkivska made a motion to approve, and Associate Professor Tippey seconded the motion.

With no comments or corrections, the minutes passed unanimously.

II. Presentations

A. College pilot of portfolio-based prior learning assessment

VIEW THE PRESENTATION

Dean Shadduck stated that portfolio-based prior learning assessment is for students to provide an option for evaluating learning that occurred outside of the pre-screened realm. This includes professional training that has not been pre-screened and learning that occurred outside of a

classroom or training session. Kent State would screen the information and determine how much, if any, credit would be applied. Students with applied and technical careers often achieve learning through a variety of experiences. Individuals who can get some credit through prior learning assessment has shown to impact the percentage of non-traditional learners who complete an academic credential. Testing portfolio-cased prior learning assessment can be done by dovetailing existing KSU professional training with CATS AAS level courses and/or develop a process to assess workplace learning equivalencies applied towards CATS credit.

An EPC member asked for confirmation that the credit would be towards CATS degrees and not for specific courses, such as a math course.

Dean Shadduck confirmed that was correct. That is why the pilot would be through CATS. It makes sense for CATS where it may not make sense for other colleges. To go beyond the pilot to other colleges, if things go well, the committee would be coming back to EPC for additional approval. The assessment may only be limited to CATS, but that is a decision the university faculty would have to make.

An EPC member asked if a group has been set up to oversee the committee.

Dean Shadduck said that has not formally been confirmed, but that can be part of the current setup.

Secretary Tillett asked if there has been a timeline setup for the pilot.

Dean Shadduck said yes and that there are two pieces. The first piece is the group working under the AACU. They have presented the plan and the next steps of the plan are currently being worked on. This includes creating a rubric and portfolio. The goal is to pilot this fall. It depends on interested individuals. The committee would like to work with one or two companies to identify the right individuals. Susan Perry is in on the conversation to make sure if there is anything to notify the HLC.

Secretary Tillett asked if there is a maximum amount of credit hours or upper division and lower division limits.

Dean Shadduck explained that they are only piloting one 10000-level course right now. If it continues, then the committee will look at upper and lower division courses. The committee will need to see what portfolios people bring in and assess credit limits. The committee will need to create policies on credit hours and course limits. The pilot will help to determine what is needed.

An EPC member asked if it is possible that some perspective students may look at portfolios and think they do not have that type of experience.

Dean Shadduck said yes. Most people come in without any of that. This would never be something that would be required, but would be an option.

III. Subcommittee Reports A. Undergraduate Policies Council

VIEW THE REPORT

Associate Professor Wamsley stated that probation subgroup, within the committee, is working with the retention taskforce on dismissal. The dismissal policy is being reviewed to make sure the language is student-friendly and consistent. The committee is looking at policies from other universities to get a sense what others do. The policy currently says that students with a .5 GPA are dismissed in one semester. The committee is considering if this should not apply to first-year students, but instead an alert or notice. Some on the committee believe it's less about terminology, but helping students throughout the process. Students are dismissed from the university, but have to appeal to the college. The committee is looking to have an appeals committee with a range of members across the university. Since that is a lot of work, the committee is considering that membership be on a regular rotating basis. The committee is considering an electronic application for appeal. The name would not be visible to members of the appeals committee. They would review based on the application information. The committee is also considering electronic redaction of dismissal to streamline the process.

Senior Associate Provost van Dulmen asked that the undergraduate council work with the graduate level on this as well.

An EPC guest asked to consider having the appeals committee gathering information from an academic advisor, faculty and/or staff who know the student's situation and be able to offer more insight. A rubric would be helpful to understand what the students would need to provide for an appeal.

An EPC member asked if this would extend to the College of Podiatric Medicine (CPM).

Senior Associate Provost van Dulmen explained that CPM has their own dismissal policy, but there can be conversation in the future if the college would like to discuss.

Associate Professor Wamsley said that the policy currently considers reinstatement after 12-months of a student being away. The committee is considering the timeline and making a reinstatement application. Another consideration for the committee is reaching out to students who have been dismissed and away 12 months.

IV. Structure Proposals Review

A. Action Items

College of Arts and Sciences

1. Center for Pre-Law Education—Establish center (fall 2023)

VIEW THE DISCUSSION

Associate Dean Warren stated that the proposal is to create a center within the college for prelaw. This will elevate to the college-level and expand upon work that Chris Banks has already been doing in political science. This will provide a structure that facilitates the coordination of co-curricular activities, internships and other areas of interest to students related to pre-law. There is also the opportunity to collaborate with students from other colleges. This would also expand to an existing advisory board that includes people in the legal community, lawyers and judges. A faculty list is being created to provide collaboration and networking on research and partnerships. The center will have space in Bowman Hall. A faculty director will be in charge of the center and an academic coordinator. There would be zero additional cost. The college has foundation money to fund the center. The faculty director has also already been doing this work. of pre-law student success for northeast Ohio and across the state.

Professor Banks added that the mission for the center is to become the preeminent source center is wholly student driven, inclusive and interdisciplinary in scope. The center is universally endorsed and has robust support from the Kent State community and legal stakeholders. With three years preparation, the center is poised to hit the ground running. In terms of advising, the center will be able to unify, plan and create institutional networks between departmental advising structures across the college and university. In one location, students will be given updated, coordinated pre-professional advice using informational technology and best practices to guide them through the complex and specialized law school preparation requirements. Interested faculty and advisors will be incentivized to help students begin their law school journey. Students will be able to take advantage of the revised interdisciplinary minor set to launch this fall and they will be able to tap into undergraduate and graduate 3+3 programs. Kent State has partnerships with Akron, Cleveland State and Case Western law schools. The plan is to expand those partnerships in Ohio and elsewhere. Pre-law students or those interested in studying law or law careers will become part of an inclusive, pre-professional community and be able to draw off of talents and participation of several student organizations, career development and study abroad programs. Students will benefit greatly from the networking opportunities. The center has already lined up a number of faculty affiliates across the campus and college to begin work on pre-law student success.

Senior Lecturer Laux made a motion to approve, and Professor Piontkivska seconded the motion.

An EPC member asked if there is a possibly that the center would help pre-law recruitment and how would the center do that.

Associate Dean Warren said with the center and all it offers; it is seen as a recruitment and retention tool.

Chairperson Molina added that there are other career pathways in the legal profession. Some students may choose to go onto law school or to be a paralegal. This is a way for students to explore different career opportunities.

With no further questions, the item passed unanimously.

V. Policy Proposals Review

A. Action Items

Office of the Provost

1. Accommodations for Student Religious and Spiritual Beliefs (University Catalog) 3-01.14 Administrative policy regarding accommodations for student religious and spiritual beliefs (Policy Register)— Establish policy to comply with section 3345.024 of the Ohio Revised Code (*spring 2023*)

VIEW THE DISCUSSION

2. Class Attendance and Absence (University Catalog) 3-01.2 Administrative policy regarding class attendance and class absence (Policy Register)—Revise policy to remove reference of religious observance, which will now be covered in a new policy; catalog policy renamed Class Attendance and Class Absence (*fall 2023*)

Senior Associate Provost van Dulmen stated that the proposal is to be compliant with the new state law that went into effect on April 3rd. According to the new law, instructors need to provide up to three absences or accommodations due to religious or spiritual holidays or participation in spiritual or religious events. The policy outlines specific instructions for students. Instructors cannot question the request or nature of the request. There are also instructions for students on working with instructors on accommodations that work for both parties. The university has seen that other universities have created a separate policy from the absence policy, so that is also what is being proposed and why there is a change to the existing policy for class attendance and absence. They have worked with general counsel, Amy Quillin, accommodations office and affirmative action. There will also be a memo to faculty and syllabus language for guidance to faculty on the implementation of the policy.

Associate Professor Kildow motioned to approve both item one and two, and Professor Piontkivska seconded.

Senior Associate Provost van Dulmen added that next year, the current absence and attendance policy can be reviewed after implementation of this policy and practices.

An EPC member asked if the language from the policy "sincerely held" and "organized activities" is purposefully vague.

Senior Associate Provost van Dulmen said that is correct and that language is in the house bill. According to this policy, if there is a request to observe a religious holiday or event, instructors have to take that at face value.

An EPC member asked if there is possibly backlash from allowing more than three accommodations.

Senior Associate Provost van Dulmen said yes. Talking with other colleagues around the state, they are wondering if there will be a modification of this in the future.

An EPC member asked about clinical nursing hours that are set up by the board. There is concern that there may be a conflict.

Senior Associate Provost van Dulmen said there were similar issues related to practicum, and that would be discussed going forward.

With no further questions or comments, the item passed.

VI. Program Proposals Review

A. Action Items

College of Arts and Sciences

School of Multidisciplinary Social Sciences and Humanities

1. Cybercriminology – B.S.— Establish new degree program to be offered fully online and mostly online at all Kent State campuses and the Twinsburg Academic Center (*fall 2023 pending final approvals*)

VIEW THE DISCUSSION

Associate Dean Warren stated that this degree would be fully online. The collaboration is between the Department of Sociology and Criminology, College of Arts and Sciences and College of Applied and Technical Studies. It will be housed in the College of Arts and Sciences under the School of Multidisciplinary Social Sciences and Humanities. There is a huge demand in the public and private sectors for people trained and knowledgeable. Both departments have the resources to deliver the program. One course will be created.

Professor Piontkivska motioned to approve, and Associate Professor Barber seconded the motion.

With no questions or comments, the item was passed unanimously.

B. Discussion Items

College of Applied and Technical Studies

- 1. Business Management Technology A.A.B.—Offer program (Management and Entrepreneurship concentration only) at the Federal Correctional Institution, Elkton in Lisbon, Ohio (*fall 2023*)
- 2. Individualized Program A.T.S.—Offer program at the Stark Campus and Twinsburg Academic Center (*fall 2023*)

VIEW THE DISCUSSION

Associate Dean Emens stated that these proposals are addition of locations to offer the programs. The Business Management Technology – Management and Entrepreneurship concentration will be offered at the Federal Correctional Institution – Elkton in Lisbon. Currently, the courses can be offered, but the program cannot be marketed without state approval. Adding the location will allow for the full program to be offered. The Individualized Program will now be offered at the Stark Campus and Twinsburg Academic Center. Some of the articulation agreements with Mercy Health make it difficult for the students because it is in close proximity to the Stark Campus, but the students have to be funneled through the Salem Campus. Adding Stark will make it easier for students and advisors helping those students.

College of Education, Health and Human Services

School of Teaching, Learning and Curriculum Studies

3. Middle Childhood Education – B.S.E.— Suspend admission temporarily at the Geauga Campus (*spring 2024*)

VIEW THE DISCUSSION

Associate Dean Crowe stated that the school would like to suspend admission to the Geauga Campus to reassess. There are only two students admitted for the coming year and the school has good ways to support them.

Chair Dauterich called the meeting to order at 3:20p.m., on Monday, 15 May 2023, via Microsoft Teams.

I. Approval of Minutes

A. Meeting on 17 April 2023

Associate Lecturer Marshall made a motion to approve, and Associate Professor Ensley seconded.

With no questions, comments or corrections, the minutes passed unanimously.

II. Presentations

A. Update on Re-Envisioning the Kent Core

VIEW THE PRESENTATION

Senior Associate Provost van Dulmen stated that subcommittees have been working on questions about the Kent Core. Phase one began this past year. The phase included involvement of 100

individuals and three subcommittees focusing on budget questions, focusing on distinction and design and organization. In the fall semester, members of leadership and subcommittees went to all academic departments to get a sense of what worked and did not work in the Kent Core and what they would like to see going forward. The consensus from other universities on trying to reenvision the general education program failed, because people were trying to do it too quickly and others were not on board. Doing something different requires having multiple conversations, having everyone at the table, making it student-focused and meaningful experiences for instructors in the education program. This project will last approximately five years. The design subcommittee focused on six areas of student outcomes and are currently working on the use Q-Sort to inform prioritization of strategies (educational experiences) supporting student outcomes. The subcommittee did not want to focus on which courses are on the Kent Core, but wanted to focus on student experience and meaningful for instructors. The distinctiveness subcommittee focused on how to make the experience unique to Kent State. The subcommittee identified four broad themes and carefully gathered and reviewed data. The budget subcommittee's main focus is to answer how current RCM is impeding the Kent Core and options to improve it.

Dean Smith explained that the next steps are to develop an advising listening tour this summer and solicit feedback from advisors. URCC will be starting conversation about infrastructure and starting a strategy on student listening tours. Data analysis of the faculty listening tour will be completed and combined with the NSSE data. In August, URCC will launch the alumni phone campaign to hear feedback from employees and employers in the workforce. A summit will be held in the fall along with finalizing the initial phase of subcommittee work including developing initial piloting projects.

Chair Dauterich asked how faculty can get more information on how RCM impacts the Kent Core.

Dean Munro Stasiuk explained that the subcommittee asked this question to a number of people on the campus. A lot of it was on decision making on offering classes and how RCM was implementing the offering of those classes. The feedback showed that the RCM was affecting how the classes were being offered. The subcommittee will focus recommendations for student experience and how the classes are offered.

Secretary Tillett asked if there were any universities reviewed that they believe could be considered an aspirant gen ed structure.

Associate Professor Marcinkiewicz said that there were pieces of many that are great, but not one that stood out.

Senior Associate Provost van Dulmen added that Paul Gaston was one of the consultants that was adamant about not locking into a certain model or university. The consideration should be what is best for Kent State and consider bits and pieces from other universities that work well instead of one as a prototype.

Senior Lecturer Laux asked if there was a noticeable difference between units that were offering Kent Core courses that are must-haves and those that are options.

Dean Munro Stasiuk said there was a trend of split between courses that must be taken and courses that are options.

III. Subcommittee Reports A. Transfer Credit Committee

VIEW THE REPORT

Director Liedel stated that the transfer committee aims to provide education about transfer credit. The committee has also worked on documenting business practices. Another topic that the committee has discussed is how to evaluate alternative credit. Discussions are centered around what is fair, consistent among students, transparent to students and faculty and keeping within Kent State ethos. This semester, the committee continued discussion on awarding upper division general credit for lower division courses. The discussion will continue with looking at what other universities do. Other work included creating documents and a presentation for faculty on how to award credit and other transfer credit information. The committee will be offering to come to other committees to present and provide more information on transfer credit. There is a program for the state of Ohio called One Year Option (OYO). This is for students pursuing the ATS degree and adult students participating in the Ohio technical centers. Technical center students who have gone back to get certain certificates and want to roll that into an associate's degree can roll it into the ATS. The committee also discussed if this could be awarded to students from proprietary schools or students pursuing other degrees and has a program from an Ohio technical center. The committee agreed to stick with the state's standards. Otherwise, an articulation agreement could be created so there is a one-to-one legal document for what is accepted. The committee had a lot more faculty participation this year and encourages more faculty to participate.

IV. Policy Proposals Review

A. Action Items

EPC Academic Calendar Advisory Committee

1. Summer Term—Revise parts of term in the summer to accommodate term length decreasing from 13 to 12 weeks (*summer 2024*)

VIEW THE DISCUSSION

Secretary Tillett stated that the Academic Calendar Advisory Committee is an EPC subcommittee. There were approved changes to the fall and spring semesters that will go into effect this coming fall 2023. Those changes will allow fall to start on a Monday as well as ensure both fall and spring semesters have enough instructional days for our contact to credit hour ratio. Alternatively, the changes caused a loss of one week in the summer term. This affects the last week of the summer term and reduces summer to 12 weeks instead of 13 weeks. The charge of the committee was to determine options that would provide minimum disruption as well as options with accelerated seven-week offerings, preserve as much as possible, activities that occur during intersession and review offerings in open learning. Recent federal regulations have brought forth more rules that said non-standard terms and open learning courses would be considered non-standard. They must comply with more complex rules for federal financial aid. Those rules may delay aid disbursement to students who are taking courses in open learning. The committee wanted to look at how many courses are in open learning and how to alleviate that. Another open learning issues is a lack of transparency of deadlines, because it is not part of an established part of term. The deadlines are not in a public place, because the start and end date of the particular course may be unique to that section. Additionally, final grades for open learning

sections do not roll to history or the student transcript until the end of the term. The committee did a deep data dive reviewing five years' worth of summer terms. This does not include the pandemic summer. The data showed that summer one is the most enrolled followed by summer three and open learning. The committee reviewed other Ohio universities. Fifty percent of Ohio public universities have a 12-week summer term. They are all inconsistent and do it slightly differently. They all have two six-week sessions. Additionally, a survey for feedback of options was sent to full-time faculty, department chairs, school directors and campus and college administrative leadership. The data showed that students and faculty need a break. The first recommendation is to leave intercession as it is, summer one starts two weeks after spring semester, summer two starts the same time as intercession and there will be a two-week break between summer three and fall semester. The benefits of this will be to keep all parts of term at current length and this does not negatively affect students' financial aid if they take both summer one and summer three courses. The challenges include 18% of survey respondents said overlapping intersession with summer one and two was not acceptable. Recommendations for the first and second seven weeks would be to either overlap or to create a first and second sixweeks. The overlapping seven weeks would keep the length and remain aligned with seven weeks schedule in fall and spring. The first and second six weeks allow seven-week courses to shorten by a week if the program area does not want to overlap, allows summer two courses to increase if program area does not want to teach in five weeks and 61% survey respondents selected it as their first option. The full-term recommendation is for 13 weeks to be reserved for practical experience only. The final recommendation is for a full term or 12 weeks that includes a break before and after. If approved, the recommendations would go into effect in summer 2024.

Associate Lecturer Marshall motioned to approve, and Associate Professor Stringer seconded the motion.

Senior Associate Provost van Dulmen asked what it would mean for the recommendations to be implemented.

Registrar, Chris Dorsten, stated that the new parts of term fall on the schedulers and the college/departments to build. Any parts of term that already exist do not need built. The lift of scheduling the parts of term falls on chairs and directors and deans to review the schedule. Faculty will also need to submit grades more often with more parts of term. Financial aid will need to see how SAF will roll in the summer. It will make things more complex, but will be doable. There was a lot of conversation about added lift.

An EPC member asked if there would be any impact on faculty load.

Senior Lecturer Laux stated that there are some restrictions. Everything for full-time, non-tenure track and contract would be covered regardless of the change because of language that puts an overall restriction on 15 credit hours for the summer, not including intersession. Regardless of how many session there are, there is always that fall back language in the CBA. No impact is expected in regards to the CBA.

Chair Dauterich asked if only the 13-week session is limited to what departments are doing or can they mix and match whatever works best for their pedagogy or desires.

Secretary Tillett said yes, that is what the committee is recommending. The 13 week will only be for practical experiences.

The Registrar, Chris Dorsten, added that a report could be created to monitor the parameters of the terms as needed.

With no further questions or comments, the item passed unanimously.

2. Spring Break—Revise placement of spring break to the ninth week (*spring 2024*) VIEW THE DISCUSSION

Secretary Tillett stated that the committee worked on reviewing spring break for two years. The current structure of spring break is in the 11th week of the semester. It falls between the second and third five week and falls near the beginning of the second seven-week classes. The committee's recommendation is to move up spring break to the ninth week. It will almost be in the middle. The recommendation is for the ninth week and would become effective in spring 2025. Data showed that 62% of Ohio public and private universities schedule spring break in the ninth week. Only Kent State and The University of Akron have spring break during the 11th week. Most courses are scheduled for the full term. If moving spring break to the ninth week, it would be in the second, five weeks. The majority of students are scheduled for full-term courses and the fewest are scheduled for the second five-week courses. When surveying students, faculty and staff, 42% chose the ninth week for spring break. Respondents liked the ninth week, because it was in the middle of the semester. Additionally, it would allow everyone to recharge after midterms. Many respondents noticed that with the 11th week spring break, students do not want to return or are less engaged. Additionally, concern about local school district's spring breaks came up. They tend to follow what the universities do. Any school districts around Kent will align with the changes.

An EPC member asked about Nursing's perspective on the ninth week.

Dean Motter stated that the ninth week is perfect as it will give students a break before they start again.

Associate Lecturer Marshall made a motion to approve, and Professor Taylor seconded the motion.

With no further comments or questions, the item passed.

EPC NF Mark Committee

3. NF Mark—Revise the process of assigning the NF mark at the end of term (*fall 2023*) VIEW THE DISCUSSION

Therese explained that EPC approved the temporary NF mark (never attended) subcommittee last year. It has not had a comprehensive review since it was created. Two recommendations are being brought forward for the council to approve one of the options. In 2003, the university established the NF (never attended) and SF (stopped attending) marks. It was a federal mandate to all universities that for students receiving federal financial aid, they should not get aid if they did not attend the course, or they get partial aid if they stopped attending. The university approved two marks to replace the NA. They now count as an "F" grade in the student's GPA.

Associate VP for Business and Administration Services, Stina Olafsdottir, explained that faculty assign the NF mark using the academic engagement verification roster. It is calculated as an "F" grade in the student's GPA. It is displayed on the student's transcript and appears on the degree audit as not counting towards the program course. This triggers a system email to the student that they have been assigned an F marker for the course. Some faculty submit an earlier alert notification of a pending "F." Advisors also reach out. Students are liable, if applicable, for tuition and or fees for courses reported as "never attended." Students must petition if they want the NF mark removed from their academic record. There are two different petitions. Current term courses, if approved, the course is removed from the academic record. For prior term courses, if approved, the course is not removed from the academic record and the student receives a "W" grade. With both, if applicable, a tuition and/or fee credit is applied to the student's account. Kent State is required to send outstanding student account balances to the OAG's office for collections. Kent State is unable to recover balances of courses with NF markers. The court system views these as unjust enrichment with no benefit conferred. Students at the OAG office must file a tuition refund appeal to have tuition and/or fees revered for courses they never attended.

University Registrar, Chris Dorsten, stated that one of the things that the data showed is that the NF marker is a great motivator for students to take action. They either start attending the class or withdraw. The data showed that students who start attending those courses do really well. If they missed a few classes at the beginning, an instructor indicates that they have not been attending. Notification goes to the student which, most of the time, alerts them to either withdraw or start attending the class. Most students (80%) who initially received an NF mark either started attending the class or withdrew. The academic record of the students who started attending the class was not negatively impacted. Almost 74% passed the class with 62% of those students earning either an A to a B-. The majority of students (88%) had one to two NF marks. Only a few students earned an NF mark in all of their classes did not return to Kent State. If a student received all NF marks, they did not return. Most students who earned an NF mark in two or three courses also did not return. Overall, 80% of students who receive an NF mark are successful while 20% are unsuccessful. This attests to what the NF mark and alert is doing for students.

Secretary Tillett added that Kent State does a lot of effective communication to students. Students receive notification from the Registrar's Office, Student Financial Aid and Bursar's. Additionally, some faculty also reach out immediately to students. The Student Success Program reaches out to students if faculty put in an early alert. Colleges and campuses all do their own outreach when they see students having an NF mark. There is no lack of communication with the students which helps them take action.

Stina explained that both recommendations include automating the removal of the course after the term has ended. Both options result in removing it from the GPA, not appearing on the audit or transcript and reversal of tuition which may or may not result in a refund. Option one removes the course after the term has ended for all students who receive one or more NF marks as a final grade. Option one is a way to address administrative barriers and equally apply the benefit of removal of the NF mark to all students. Consider with this option that if students know the grade will automatically be removed at the end, they may not start the course. Option two is the removal of the course after the term has ended, but only for students who received all NF marks

as a final grade. Option two addresses administrative barriers. It does not equally apply the benefit of the removal of the NF marker to all students.

An EPC member asked if the removal of the NF mark at the end of the semester has any impact on students who fall below full time because of an NF mark.

Stina said that, currently, as soon as the NF marker is assigned it is deducted from their time status. This means, even though they are unofficially withdrawn, the Bursar's office runs a report each week to watch for that. The Bursar's Office does not wait until the end of the semester for those. One reason the NF mark was created was to be able to watch for students not attending or stopped attending a course.

An EPC member asked if that would impact internal scholarships.

Stina said it could impact their federal financial aid.

An EPC member asked which option of the two the committee chairs recommend.

Chris stated that there are challenges with both. Option one applies the benefits to all and option two only applies to students with all NF's. The data shows that we have more students that will fall under option one.

Stina added that the process for adding an NF mark would not change. After the semester ends, a report is run and for those students who did not withdraw and did not attend the course, there would be an automated process to reverse tuition and remove the NF mark. The amount of students that this would impact is low compared to how important it is to allow the semester go as it should. Not every NF mark results in money owed. It depends on what it is for, the time and status.

An EPC guest asked for clarification as to how or why these options would remove the administrative barriers.

Stina explained that if students realize they during the semester as opposed to after the semester, the instances are treated differently. Navigating the petition is also very cumbersome. The committee wants to avoid the barrier to students. Treating both instances the same can help with that barrier.

Chris added that, currently, students have to petition and ask for the NF mark to be removed. Sometimes they do not know to ask, or they do not follow up. If the process was automated, then every student would get the same outcome. None of the students would be penalized by this, because it does currently impact their GPA which leads to potential probation or dismissal.

Therese added that the data shows that students that get all NF marks do not come to Kent State and had no intention to come. They probably registered for courses and then decided not to come, or they were going to another university and did not check their Kent State e-mail. The population of students with all NF's is small. If NF's are removed from all students, including continuing matriculating students, students may have no inclination to do anything because they know it will be removed at the end of the semester. That is something to consider.

An EPC guest asked if the NF will still impact financial aid.

Therese said the NF mark impacts financial aid no matter what. How financial aid handles the NF mark will not be changed. Also, the SF and NF marks do not shutdown Canvas as it did for Blackboard.

An EPC guest asked if it would also impact satisfactory academic progress.

Therese said yes. There are repercussions. Students who are on federal financial aid and the NF mark drops them below full-time, then they are on aid. This would motivate them to get in the class or register for another class.

An EPC member added that when an SF or NF grade is assigned, the student needs to talk to them to get back into the course. The student needs to agree to a contract about how they are going to get caught up and stay caught up. They are manually deactivated in Canvas until then.

Chair Dauterich asked for members to raise a virtual hand in favor of options one or two. Option one had the most votes. Chair Dauterich asked for a motion to approve option one.

Associate Lecturer Marshall made a motion to approve option one, Professor Taylor seconded the motion.

With no other comments, questions or concerns, the item passed unanimously.
