Implementation of Revisions to Program Admission Criteria

Because the admission window for a semester opens so far in advance of the start of that semester (e.g., admission for fall 2021 opens in July 2020), the implementation date for revisions to a program's admission criteria cannot follow the same deadlines as other program revisions.

Therefore,

- A revision to a program's admission criteria will be implemented for the next admission window unless a later term is requested.
- Revisions will be implemented only after approval by the Educational Policies Council (EPC).
- Revised admission criteria will be noted in the next-published University Catalog after current admission criteria (e.g., *Effective for spring 2022, admission criteria will be the following...*).

Chair Pamela E. Grimm called the meeting to order at 3:20p.m., on Monday, 21 September 2020, via Microsoft Teams.

Item I: Approval of Minutes of 12 May 2020

Chair Pamela E. Grimm agreed to wait until next meeting for members to review and approve the minutes.

Item II: Presentations

a. EPC Restructure

Chair Pamela E. Grimm summarized the restructure of EPC. She said the composition decreased the number of voting members from 55 to 30. The majority are voting members are now faculty. EPC has added an executive committee that is made up of the provost's office, faculty members from faculty senate and two faculty members with Pam chairing the committee. Chair Grimm explained that the charge has not changed for the council. She encouraged everyone to review the EPC member guidelines. The restructure was approved by the faculty senate with the charter and bylaws approved by faculty senate and board of trustees. Specific language defining the changes will go back to the faculty senate for final approval. Chair Grimm stated that the hope

for the restructure is to get a more vigorous engagement in the process. She said that key expectations are preparing ahead of time for meetings by looking at meeting materials, having questions ready and feeling empowered to ask those questions.

With no questions or comments, the council moved to the next topic.

b. Overview of the Curriculum Information Management (CIM) system

Jennifer Kellogg explained that she would be providing an overview of helpful pages and how to review and search proposals. She stated that the Curriculum Management page (<https://www.kent.edu/provost/curriculum/curriculum-management>) could be found through the Curriculum Services site. This site includes a user manual in html format, FAQ's, terms and definitions, curriculum deadlines, training and action pages. She said that courses, programs and policies all go through the CIM system. The action pages provide dropdowns for courses and programs with step-by-step instructions on how to initiate different requests. Jennifer moved onto the management buttons and explained that members could enter the management sites from those buttons. The management sites include course management, program management, policy management and miscellaneous management. Miscellaneous management is used for small changes on a large scale. She gave an example that if a prerequisite needs to be changed on 20 courses, the initiator could use the miscellaneous form rather than going through each course. Jennifer proceeded to the course management site. This site allows members to research, review a proposal, begin a proposal or revise. She showed members how to search, read the course status and workflow and an overview of the revise page. This included the ecosystem showing where courses live in the catalog, where it is required in a program and it is a prerequisite for another course. She also highlighted the course learning outcomes which is new to the form. On the agenda, Jennifer showed members how they may click on the link next to each course that takes them to the CIM proposal where they can review the workflow and changes accentuated in red (removed) and green (added). Proceeding the course management site, Jennifer signed onto the program management site and showed members how to search, read the program status and workflow, the eco system and how to track changes. Additionally, she encouraged members to sign up for training through the curriculum management page.

Item III: Committee Reports

a. University Requirements Curriculum Committee

Dean Alison J. Smith explained that the University Requirements Curriculum Committee (URCC) is a subcommittee of EPC. She said they are currently working on revision of the Kent Core. Last November, faculty senate approved the URCC proposed path towards revising the assessment of the general education program. That approval included using the American Association of College and University (AACU) value rubrics. This reduced the amount of learning outcomes from 11 to 4 utilizing the AACU leap model. Using best practices to develop the assessment tools. The faculty senate approved establishing a faculty lead committee on general education assessment. Dean Smith said that there will be an AACU pilot study of two of the general education rubrics. Those are value rubrics. URCC have contracted with AACU to run the critical thinking and written communication rubrics this year. The rubrics will be completed in the spring semester. She said that in the fall, they will be working with faculty to get that setup. Dean Smith stated that at the end of the spring semester, the data will go to AACU for analysis and will return a full report. She concluded her statements that based on the results of

the pilot study URCC will be able to move forward in a big way to implement AACU value rubrics.

An EPC member asked if there is a separate group that is looking at the Kent Core and the modifications.

Dean Smith explained that it is all part of the same committee. The assessment piece has to be completed first.

Item IV: Program Proposal Review

Chair Grimm explained that there were no action items for this meeting. There are lesser action items and they may be discussed at member request.

Item V: Course Proposal Review

Chair Grimm stated that there are no action items for this meeting. URCC items are modifications to courses and there are no new courses. There are lesser action items and they may be discussed at member request.

Therese stated that she received a request from chemical physics for material science to withdraw a revision to one of their courses. She said members could look online at the agenda to see one revision has been withdrawn under the college of arts and sciences. Additionally, she said Evaluation and Measurement changed their name to Research, Measurement and Statistics has contributed to so many courses on this list.

Item VI: Other—Discussion Items

a. Review of a new program review checklist

Therese stated that she created a helpful checklist to be used by members when they are reviewing a new program, minor, certificate or concentration to ensure it is aligned with the university's mission. Some questions the checklist asks are: Is it well designed? Does it have the faculty credentials and what's needed to be viable? Does it have academic quality, resources, needs and proposal quality? She explained that it would be for members personal use and would not be collected. She asked members to confirm if the checklist is useful, makes sense or if it is missing anything.

Chair Grimm asked if the criteria is clear to proposal initiators on what they need in their proposal.

Therese said that Curriculum Services will be preparing some resources for program development and go over a timeline. She added that they want to take a more active role in helping colleges and departments shape their proposals and get them out in a timely manner. The checklist would also be given to those creating a proposal to help them understand how their proposal will be reviewed at EPC to ensure it meets all of the items. Therese asked members to send her any recommendations on the checklist.

Chair Grimm requested to add whether the program is unique or is there an overlap with another program within KSU.

Interim Provost Manfred H. van Dulmen asked to include if the program will attract new students to Kent State.

b. Ideas for EPC subcommittees

Chair Grimm stated that the Undergraduate Policy Council (UPC) and Graduate Policy Council (GPC) will replace the EPC Ad Hoc Committee for Academic Policies. The proposed ideas for committees are Academic Calendar Advisory Committee (as needed, to develop 5-year calendar), Fiscal Impact Statement Review Subcommittee and Alternative Credit Subcommittee.

Therese added that the subcommittees listed are ideas for brand new subcommittees. She said Curriculum Services oversees the academic calendar. It is a 5-year lookout and is getting close to the time to create a new 5-year lookout. Groups to include are parking services, residence services and athletics since they depend on the academic calendar.

Manfred said that many universities have these committees and Kent has been using EPC Ad Hoc committee for both UG and GR. Most of the graduate policies have gone through the graduate dean's council which does not have faculty or student representation. He said they thought this would solve those issues. EPC Ad Hoc has representation from enrollment management and they envision going forward that these councils will have representation from financial aid, registrar's office and other functional areas on campus.

Therese explained the fiscal impact statements are required to be filled out for any new degree program. A Fiscal Impact Statement Review Subcommittee would assist with developing a better document. This would be a short-term subcommittee with members from EPC and financial areas to review the statement and make it more useful. The Alternative Credit Subcommittee is for test scores that come through that have not been reviewed and determined how to award credit. She said that awards may be very departmental, but there is no university-wide policy on alternative credit. For example, A-levels from England or GED. This committee could meet on an as-needed basis.

An EPC member asked what the current subcommittees are of EPC.

Therese replied, EPC Ad Hoc and asked for volunteers if members agreed subcommittees are beneficial.

Manfred added that there needs to be research on what other universities have done with composition and framework on subcommittees.

Chair Grimm asked members to reach out to herself or Therese if interested in subcommittees.

c. Presentations

Chair Grimm asked if there were any topic members were interested in hearing about during meetings.

Therese said she invited VP Mary Parker to discuss the new strategic enrollment plan for the next meeting.

An EPC member said they were interested in hearing about microcredentials.

d. Information items

Chair Grimm stated that the interim pass/fail policy for summer 2020, fall 2020 and spring 2021 passed through faculty senate. She added that there are new professional licensure disclosures required as well.

Therese added that typically the pass/fail policy would have gone to EPC, but it was an interim policy and needed to be approved quickly.

Jennifer explained the new federal regulations on professional licensure disclosures. She said universities need to disclose whether the requirements met at Kent State would meet the requirements to be licensed or certified in another state. Continuing distance education, registrar's office and admissions gathered and came up with a website. Students who are in a program, are applying to a program or anyone who changes their major to a program that leads to licensure will get notified by email about the professional licensure in other states. Jennifer said she requested faculty program coordinators to fill out a Qualtrics form for each of their licensure programs and all of the states. Feds said "not determined" programs are okay for now, but will need to be determined soon. The Qualtrics link will be sent out again to program coordinators during catalog proofs March-May.

Therese added that it is now up to universities to know if the licenses meet the requirements in other states.

With no further questions, comments or items, Chair Pamela E. Grimm adjourned the meeting at 4:26pm.

Chair Pamela E. Grimm called the meeting to order at 3:20p.m., on Monday, 19 October 2020, via Microsoft Teams.

I. Approval of Minutes

A. Meeting on 12 May 2020

With no questions, comments or changes, the members approved the minutes from 12 May 2020.

B. Meeting on 21 September 2020

With no questions, comments or changes, the members approved the minutes from 21 September 2020.

II. Presentations

Strategic Enrollment Management Plan

VP of Enrollment Management, Mary Parker, presented the Strategic Enrollment Management Plan to EPC members. Enrollment Management wanted to begin the plan early in the spring until covid hit. She detailed what the plan is, what it entails, who is engaged and the outcomes. Enrollment Management involves student success that includes curricular, co-curricular, budgeting, planning and facilities. While not directing these

operations, they do come together to impact enrollment. The plan focuses on mission, values and how the institution aligns those with the academic and co-curricular planning in the student lifecycle. VP Parker said the hope is that the plan will help to think differently, be nimble and actionable and to think of new possibilities. Optimal enrollment can be accomplished by setting clear goals, promoting academic success, creating effective strategies and financial planning. To execute the plan, she has created a structure that involves the president and cabinet, strategic enrollment plan governance committee (faculty senate, campus administrators, deans) who will develop the framework and the steering committee (faculty, staff, administrators, students, department chairs, regional campuses) that will look at marketing and branding strategies. Additionally, she said she is working through academic affairs with Melody and Manfred on curriculum in terms of demands and marketplace analysis, enrollment access and completion and working with the retention group. Steering committee invitations have been sent out. The goal to review the plan within a year to see where enrollment is and where it will be in the next five years. She encouraged members to reach out if they would like to be engaged in the process.

Therese asked if the subcommittees are going to be longstanding or short-term.

VP Parker replied that for a year, the subcommittees will work with the committees. She said she is not sure if they will stay the same. However, there will need to be a standing enrollment committee that continues to look at the plan, assess the current status, evaluate demands and make any necessary changes. It will be up to the governance committee and steering committee to make that decision.

An EPC member asked if there is a timeline in mind or deliverables to be reached by a certain date.

VP Parker said the governance committee and action committee will create a timeline, but those meetings have not happened yet. Recruitment has already begun, so deliverables will be assessed in the spring after the holidays. She said how to increase or stabilize enrollment will be one of the first things to tackle.

Chair Grimm said with a new provost there will be a new strategic plan. She asked how does the strategic enrollment plan account for that.

VP Parker stated that the Strategic Enrollment (SEM) plan has to support mission, vision and values. The governance group will be asked if the mission still stands and is it meeting the desired needs. The SEM plan and strategic plan need to be tied together. Academic affairs, as a whole, has to be engaged in the process. They are the critical players in this entire SEM process. The provost, academic affairs team and faculty senate are going to be critical in determining what is focused on. The areas to focus on will help to lead academic affairs when they are thinking about a new strategic mission and tie in the SEM plan. She said she is collecting institutional, state and national data for the governance and action committee.

III. Committee Reports

A. University Requirements Curriculum Committee

Dean Alison J. Smith stated that the URCC met this month and the work involved the American Association of College and Universities (AACU). She said the Assistant VP of Research and Assessment at the AACU walked the committee through the pilot study, what the committee will be doing and the pieces involved. There are two questionnaires that have come from the Ohio Transfer Module Taskforce group. One is changes to the Ohio Transfer Module (OTM) that may have a slight impact to the Kent Core. Dean Smith said that URCC will present that to EPC in November. The OTM taskforce group sent out another reporting questionnaire regarding diversity-related learning outcomes to be included in the OTM.

Therese clarified that Dean Smith would discuss the OTM and Kent Core at November's meeting and then EPC members will have a discussion. Afterward, Dean Smith will complete and send back the questionnaires to the state.

IV. Program Proposal Review

A. Discussion Item

College of Communication and Information—School of Emerging Media and Technology

Program development plan (notification step) to establish a new degree program

School Director, Michael A. Beam, said the M.S. in digital sciences needs to be relaunched to a M.S. in emerging media and technology (EMT). The graduate program is facing similar issues that the undergraduate program faced. Six concentrations had menus that were confusing to students. The coursework became stale. For UG level, they reevaluated how to bring interdisciplinary into the program. This allows other schools to iterate curriculum and students can keep up with them. Director Beam said they talked with all of the partner schools to make sure they had the appropriate courses and were advising students well. The final proposal will be brought back to EPC in spring 2021 with an aim to launch fall 2022. The program will offer three core courses and two exit culminating courses. The interdisciplinary courses are going to be, largely, outside of the school and across the institution. The program will allow students to focus on an interdisciplinary, study such as data analytics and coding, social science research, applied communication and information and applied creative technology. The aim is for students who want to be a technologist on a team. The plan is to talk with partner schools to build out courses in the each of those areas and to build up strengths in the interdisciplinary areas.

An EPC member asked if the core courses will give students knowledge to be able to apply to the interdisciplinary courses.

Director Beam replied, yes. Those would be the core courses to give students methods, theory and skills to be able to apply the emerging media and technology (EMT) mindset into their different areas. Depending on where students want to focus, the interdisciplinary courses will come into play.

Chair Grimm asked what this program is offering that the M.S. in computer science or the M.S. in management and information systems does not offer.

Professor Tang Tang said the need comes from the interdisciplinary skills. Students will be able to communicate within a team across many parts.

Director Beam explained that he has always been in conversation with partner programs. Rather than a degree in computer science that may write an OS, the EMT student would be on an interdisciplinary team, coding on top of an OS to be able to execute multimedia story telling through code. The EMT degree would be able to speak across the team. With someone needing the visualization, the EMT person can write the code for that. In the final proposal, there will be scenarios for each of the interdisciplinary areas for which courses students may take and which careers they may go into.

Interim Associate Provost Manfred H. van Dulmen said that a strategy should be set upfront for applied science degrees to be collectively developed throughout the university.

An EPC member asked how the program would be applied to the jobs listed in the proposal.

Director Beam said the way in which they got the external report was in part to the UG program they built. Depending on the areas the students go into, they could be in these rolls. He said it could be that they are not communicating the breadth of job opportunities.

Manfred stated that the internationalization advisory committee would be to build up a strategy for international programs, review partnerships, make new programs and ensure there are faculty in the process. This involves the strategy for Kent State and how it involves academic affairs and units.

Chair Grimm expressed concern for the paragraph:

“Traditional partnership programs such as faculty linkages, study abroad and visiting student initiatives would not require approval by the subcommittee, instead they would continue to be approved through the Partnerships Proposal Process. This would ensure faculty members who need formal partnership agreements for research or other academic endeavors would not be impeded.”

She said it implies that this subcommittee would be approving programs. She asked that that language be removed as program approval goes through EPC and faculty senate.

Interim Associate Provost van Dulmen agreed that the language should be removed.

An EPC member said that it is important to define partner and program.

Therese asked members for input on who would be the chair of these committees, members and charges. She added that whomever was interested in serving should contact her.

Chair Grimm said she was concerned for only one faculty member involved in the UG and GR Policy councils.

Therese clarified that there will be one faculty member from each college with a total of 11 faculty members.

An EPC member said there may need to be representation from deans on the subcommittees to bring in a different perspective.

Interim Associate Provost van Dulmen said it would be reasonable to have a dean on each of the committees. He suggested the dean could be an ex officio member.

Chair Grimm explained that deans are represented at UDC and GDAC. She asked if the dean should have perspective before a final decision is made or be on the committee.

An EPC member said that the conversation is important in the formative stages rather than simply making comments. However, there may not be enough deans to put on seven committees.

Chair Grimm suggested that deans' involvement be a discussion at smaller group.

Therese said she will send out the descriptions of the proposed EPC subcommittees to members and they should contact her directly to serve. She clarified that the UG policy council and GR policy council previously existed as EPC Ad Hoc. The academic calendar committee has been a previous short-term ad hoc committee would like to make it a standing committee. Transfer committee is greatly needed. A lot of alternative credit coming through in the last years. Really need to decide at the university level how to handle them.

An EPC member suggested having someone on the transfer committee who understands the financial ramifications. The process should be designed for Kent State and not just receive the alternative credit.

2. New program review checklist (revised)

Chair Grimm stated that the checklist is comprehensive. She has heard that the checklist is helpful. The checklist helps to have a better understanding of programs, how they fit into resources and how they enhance the university.

Therese explained that she received feedback after the last meeting that included drawing new students to the university. The other feedback was about overlapping or duplicating with existing programs. She said if members believe it is useful and want to use it, Curriculum Services will give it to initiators of new programs. This will help them know what how their program will be reviewed and what the proposal will need.

Manfred suggested using “substantial” before “overlap” as there will always be overlap.

An EPC member asked if the checklist looks forward or anticipates programs that could be collaborative.

Chair Grimm suggested adding how the program may be marketed to students and how it is unique and/or similar. Additionally, how they would guide students into the right program.

B. Information Items

1. Interim undergraduate academic dismissal policy for fall 2020 and spring 2021

Therese stated that the university made a policy for spring 2020 not to dismiss any students or put students on academic probation. For fall 2020, no student will be dismissed, because anyone who could have gone on academic probation in the spring did not and they would have been notified that they would possibly be dismissed in a future term. Students will continue to be dismissed in spring 2021 minus new students. Afterward, the normal policy will return. This is slow movement back to the current policy. Students facing probation and possible dismissal will get a different type of letter than they normally do and there will be more outreach from advisors.

VII. Next Meeting

Therese explained to members that she would like presentations to continue. She asked members for any recommendations of what subject they would like to hear that concerns courses and programs.

Chair Pamela E. Grimm called the meeting to order at 3:20p.m., on Monday, 16 November 2020, via Microsoft Teams.

I. Approval of Minutes

A. Meeting on 19 October 2020

Professor Edward Dauterich moved to approve, and Associate Lecturer Shelley K. Marshall seconded the motion.

No corrections or changes were requested. The minutes from 19 October 2020 were approved.

II. Discussion

A. New online programs and existing on-ground programs transitioning to online, e.g., demonstrating demand, quality, engagement, marketing, resources.

Interim Associate Provost Manfred H. van Dulmen said the state master's programs that are on-ground delivery do not need state approval to move fully online. Need to evaluate resources. Questions to answer are: If a program is already approved for on-ground and they want to go online, does it require more faculty? What if the courses are already

online how is this part of a strategy? Is more faculty required? Where does a marketing plan come in? How do we know there is a demand? For this group, what is the approval process and where does this fit in for Kent State? He said the group needs to decide on the approval process that these changes should be engaged in and the role of EPC.

Provost Melody J. Tankersley said she was concerned about not considering all of the variables when it comes to online learning and delivery. To do online delivery well involves more than putting courses in an online format. When looking at programs declining in enrollment, one of the first things done is to put it online. There needs to be more thoughtful and deliberate process instead of moving a program online immediately. Need to look at variables, such as demand. We have to be available to do that for them. The programs that have support of Everspring do much better than programs that are internally put online. That is because they offer 24/7 support to the students. They help them enroll and have a plan of study. What would be appropriate to help programs make those decisions and what you as a curricular body would recommend to faculty senate about whether this program has made those deliberative actions.

Chair Grimm said there has been much innovation for creating online programs, but the consistent overview and the strategic online education has been missing. Faculty Senate has concerns for a lack of standards for online programs. This needs to be thought about holistically.

Interim Associate Provost van Dulmen added that a lot of it has to do with strategy. Some of it is outside of EPC and that is why strategic enrollment management is included.

Chair Grimm said what has been missing are structural and process consistent goals.

VP Mary Parker stated we have to look at not just demand and competition. Making sure we are strategic; we have a plan and we are consistent. Being mindful of what programs brought online and when they are brought online. Making sure we are able to market, deliver and assess the cost and if it is a benefit.

An EPC member said we could look to colleges and departments with programs already online for best practices. There are a lot of reasons to design an online class.

An EPC member stated that important considerations for transitioning programs online are internal capacity for designers, support for online students, library resources, support structures and the impact on the design group.

An EPC member explained when making these decisions, it is important to know what makes a truly excellent online experience. Information sharing by those who have done this in the past would be really useful so there is a true understanding of what capacity means and staffing decisions, workload.

Chair Grimm added that having students in different programs with different rates at different campuses complicates what is already a complicated situation. Need to think about how to price these things and the consistency in pricing.

An EPC member stated that in thinking of best practices, we can look internally and nationally.

An EPC member stated that the school of information has all of their programs online. Two of the programs are with an outside marketer and the other is not. The programs with the outside marketer are priced a little higher than the other program. It is important to remember that if you are using an outside marketer, you are getting a lot of good stuff. You get 24/7 student feedback. You have people to help with admissions. They are also taking a cut of what Kent is making in tuition. We have used our outside marketer for 5-6 years and working in conjunction with them, I think we have a good way to offer our Health Informatics program. There are so many things you have to look at in terms of do you go online? Do you not? What are the costs? Also, return on investment, especially if going with an outside marketer.

Chair Grimm said that it is assumed marketing for the online programs are digital marketing and most directed at keyword search and social media. The variations would be program specific. The general approach would be similar.

VP Parker stated that it is something that has been discussed and is something that we should look at through the Strategic Enrollment Management (SEM) process. We will need to coordinate with this committee on this.

Provost Tankersley said she was hopeful to create a process to help academic programs think through the online program process.

Therese added that there are financial aid consequences from a program area promoting an online program that has not been state approved. By federal law, there may be a different financial aid package. Students may lose out on tuition waivers. In the past we state paperwork has been used. We have never really had an intentional process for online. The state has streamlined some of the paperwork that we don't have anything in place. Now is the perfect time to see what is our practice and process and what we want to see documented.

An EPC member said they would like to propose a motion to require any new programs or online courses to go beyond FAC to the EPC as we figure out what our process is going to be.

An EPC member asked if some of the language from the checklist could be used for new programs. It could be modified to transition to online or developing fully online.

Interim Associate Provost van Dulmen stated that we need a review of processes and practices. Possibly create a subgroup of EPC looking at this and developing a list, reviewing current practices and coming up with recommendations.

Chair Grimm said we could have this de facto program becoming a fully online program with no intentionality and no review of it as a fully online program. She said she was concerned a program going online could be driven by faculty preference. Faculty preference is important, but students need to come first.

Provost Tankersley explained that it can be de facto based on the way students choose courses. A program decides to put all major courses online even though the program is not online. Based on the way students choose classes, they could choose a 100% online program without it even being noticed. There is a lot to consider programs are put together. The main thing is to have quality programs. Some of the programs might not have all of the resources they need to do it well. Then it becomes something less than and we really have to guard against that.

VP Parker added that we are not in compliance with title IV aid if we are doing that, because we have to certify cost of attendance based upon certain things. We need to know if a student is in a fully online program or not. We want to caution that, because we could be out of compliance. We need to look at a process and review the financial aid perspective. This includes making sure we know that those who are reported as fully online are truly online and those that are face to face are in those programs.

Chair Grimm asked if students decide to take courses online, if that makes it an online program.

Therese stated that they do differentiate between students may select versus what the program area has decided to do with online. There are some programs where a student can carefully select a majority of online courses, but that is not the program's intention. That would not be promoted as an online program. An online program would have to go through a process, have it approved and consistently communicate that the program is online.

An EPC member said it would be reasonable to look into adding a question in a process checklist about a program's faculty having online teaching expertise.

Chair Grimm asked if departments or colleges state whether they are offering a course online.

Therese replied, no. There is not a mechanism in the CIM (curriculum management) system that faculty would state the delivery, because that may change. Unless they put it in the information of the course, they are not asked about delivery.

Chair Grimm asked if there was a way to add a question about delivery on the CIM form.

Jennifer Kellogg explained that if a delivery question was added to the CIM form, the faculty would need to do a revision every time they change the delivery. We do try to match it up to programs. If a program comes in and we are noticing that their courses are online and they have to fill out the documentation that shows which courses are offered online right now and which in the future, we do double check class schedule and go back a couple terms to see if these courses are being offered online. If we notice they do not include them all, that is when we ask them about delivery.

Chair Grimm concluded the topic stating that the conversation will continue at a later time.

III. Committee

A. University Requirements Curriculum Committee

Dean Alison J. Smith state that there are a lot of different program reviews going on in Ohio. One is the Ohio Transfer Module review. The Ohio Articulation and Transfer Network Oversight Board and the Ohio Department of Higher Education are working on a project to work on the OTM (Ohio Transfer Module). They have sent us two proposals. Both involve general education or Kent Core. The two proposals effect general education and therefore could affect the Kent Core. URCC has reviewed both of those and have a consensus on the potential impact and outcomes for this. The first proposal is focused on the trackways that students in associate degrees will be taking. It is an attempt to try to streamline those trackways to bring students from their two-year degree program into the four-year degree program. As a reminder, the general education hours are 36 hours. 24 of those hours are required gen-ed hours and the other 12 are additional hours that we assign. The OTM proposal is focused on those additional 12 hours. The 24 required general education hours are not involved in this proposal. The additional 12 hours would focus on advising students to develop their pathway as soon as possible. The two-year students that already know their major can begin work on their guaranteed transfer pathway. The OTM proposes that the students who are undecided are sorted into an associates of science or arts degrees and getting them moving on this. There is a recommendation from OTM that they take a second writing course. This is the only effect on our current Kent Core. The proposed transfer module change that would affect the Kent Core is in area one—English and oral communications. The OTM highly recommends in the additional 12-hours that there be guided advising for students to take an additional English or oral communication course. We can absorb this course within the 3-6 hours in English or communication. That would be absorbed by the current requirement of 3-6 additional Kent Core courses in English and Communication. This proposal also wants to change the title of the Ohio Transfer Module to the Ohio General Education Transfer Module. Since most of the transfer module is gen-ed, the URCC did not see a problem with that. There are no changes that would affect our current Kent Core. She asked if there were any questions about that proposal.

With no questions or comments, Dean Smith continued with the second OTM proposal discussion.

The second proposal proposes adding expected learning outcomes in diversity, equity and inclusion to the 12 additional hours to general education. This does not involve the 24 hours

that are required. It involves the 12 additional hours that are offered by universities across the state. The Kent State's diversity requirement is a 6-credit requirement in which a student takes one domestic diversity course and one global diversity course. They can meet this requirement in three ways. They can either take at least one course of domestic or global diversity course from the Kent Core or they can take both from the Kent Core. The courses in the Kent Core that are flagged for diversity add up to about 32 courses. They can also take one from the Kent Core and then one that is a non-Kent Core diversity course. That may also be counting towards a major, minor or elective. We have 74 upper-division courses on that diversity list. The third way is, with a dean's approval, the global diversity requirement can be satisfied by a student studying abroad during a semester. Looking at the diversity courses offered there are almost as many diversity courses as there are Kent Core courses. There are 106 with 70% being at the upper-division level. The other 30% are evenly split between the humanities in arts and the social behavioral sciences in the Kent Core. Regarding the Kent Core, we expect that there might be some change, because students taking CCP and students from associate degree programs that currently transfer in Kent Core courses are already transferring in Kent Core courses that fulfil the diversity requirement upon entry to the university. We may see an increase in that. There would be DEI outcomes in more courses across the state. There might be an increase in the number of students coming in and already having completed this. The second probable change is relevant to the upper-division courses. We do not know what that impact would be. There could potentially be a drop in these course. There could be a drop in choosing these courses, but they're choosing major, minor and electives may make the impact of the OTM changes negligible. There are no changes for the study abroad aspect of it. The learning objectives that they are proposing to put into general education would then feed into the courses we would see transferring in by way of the Kent Core. There is a question on the OTM survey to answer—"How could the diversity, equity and inclusion learning outcomes be incorporated into the OTM to fit within your institution's future or present general education program?" We have 15 OTM Kent Core courses in arts and humanities that are flagged for diversity. We have 16 OTM Kent Core courses in social and behavioral sciences that are flagged for diversity. Using either of those or both arts and humanities and social and behavioral sciences OTM courses would all be appropriate for this. However, this is part of a much larger question. We are currently working on a revision of the Kent Core. As we work on that, we do not know the outcome yet, but it may impact other university course requirements, including diversity. Our diversity requirement was last reviewed in 2015 after a very lengthy process that took years. It is not something the URCC could do now in the middle of the Kent Core work. The outcome of the Kent Core work may impact it. Diversity, equity and inclusion should not be a study done by URCC. It should be done by another body, possibly the office of diversity equity and inclusion. Then the report could come to URCC. It concerns her that they are asking about future. This proposal could be accommodated in the present diversity requirements.

Therese asked if they have decided if diversity, equity and inclusion (DEI) will be embedded or a separate category.

Dean Smith replied that they are leaning towards putting DEI in the courses themselves rather than having one standalone course. This is because we are not the only university that has types of diversity courses. We have domestic and global. Other universities have other

types. It is easier to put DEI into the courses themselves. As they are transferred in, having the universities look at them and decide if they will qualify as DEI or not.

Therese asked if the state would be asking for certain courses to build in DEI.

Dean Smith replied that she asked about it and the answer was, no, we don't have to do that. Most of these, if they put them into social and behavioral or the arts and humanities, will probably already align with what we are doing. They said Kent State is way out in front on this and we are doing very well. We have a lot of selections that are already meeting this requirement. They do not see that anything that would come in would not fit that requirement.

Therese added that the DEI had been reviewed in 2014 or 2015 and URCC did have some concerns and recommendations. Unfortunately, it never went any further than that. She said she thinks it would be helpful if we talk about convening some type of committee or group to review the diversity requirement and also review URCC's report.

Dean Smith said it could be great to review the diversity requirement again. It is, however, beyond the scope of what URCC can do right now. She said she was concerned that URCC is a small group and not representative of diversity, equity and inclusion issues or attributes across the university.

Chair Grimm asked if there is some type of agreement that certain characteristics of a course meeting a requirement that is set for transfer module. That approved OTM course can transfer into any of the Ohio state schools and satisfy a requirement.

An EPC member replied that if it is part of the tag agreement, it has been approved following special policies.

Chair Grimm asked if the DEI a new OTM category.

Dean Smith replied, yes for gen-ed.

Therese clarified that OTM is different from TAG. TAG is tied to majors and programs. OTM is tied to a universities gen-ed requirement.

Dean Smith said that if this proposal passes and they decide to put them in the social and behavioral area then we would round up our gen-ed courses that we have currently flagged as diversity courses. Departments would look at the learning outcomes that OTM wants in there and they would decide how to do that. Those proposals would go to OTM and the process would go through. The courses would meet those requirements and would be transferrable.

Therese clarified that once the learning outcomes were established, we would need to submit the courses and they would be reviewed against those learning outcomes and approved or disapproved. All of our Kent Core courses, that are OTM, will need to be re-reviewed and

reapproved. The state has acknowledged that universities have a diversity requirement separate from their gen-ed and we can continue to have that if we want it.

Dean Smith said that was correct. We can continue with what we are doing. The advantage to that is that it gives us the option to continue with the 74 courses that are upper-division and the study abroad remains. They are not interfering with that.

Chair Grimm asked if reviewing Kent Core courses happens on a regular schedule.

Dean Smith said that it happens on a 5–7-year schedule. The diversity requirement report was probably initiated around 2012. The report came out in 2015, because it went through two different deans.

Chair Grimm said that we could share the DEI report from 2015 with Amoaba Gooden and see if her office would be able and willing to participate in a review of that requirement.

Dean Smith added that it is good to have these reviews because ideas shift and concepts change over time. She said the survey she received asks if the 5 learning concepts if they are acceptable. She agrees that they are and are under what they are doing. The other question was how to perceive these as being delivered, embedded in the gen-ed or a standalone course, both or neither. URCC is in consensus that we would put them in the courses themselves rather than a standalone because a single standalone would not work for us.

Chair Grimm asked if members agreed that those would be the logical choices for Kent State.

An EPC member asked if we want a structure that can accommodate the OTM that is a DEI OTM and offer DEI courses as OTM courses than the route we would not take is not embedded in one or the other, but in the social and behavioral sciences and art and humanities. That means that any of the courses currently identified as DEI may wish to look at the learning outcomes that the state is providing, see if they are consistent and then apply for OTM status. She asked if that was correct.

Dean Smith replied, yes. They all are already in the OTM. This would give another box to check.

The majority of members voted yes to the choices for the proposal.

An EPC member asked if the second option involved using the extra credits for Kent Core to fulfill another diversity requirement.

Dean Smith responded that the whole option would be happening within the additional 12 hours. The additional 12 are currently distributed throughout the Kent Core, so nothing would be added.

Therese added that her meeting with other universities, she asked if they had considered lowering the 36 hours for the core, because the Higher Learning Commission only requires

30 hours for a bachelors. They said not at this time, because they really wanted the associate to bachelor's degree transfer and the ability to transfer more than 50% of an associate degree.

IV. Program Proposal Review

A. Discussion Items (*effective fall 2021 except where noted below*)

Department Chair, Drew Sellers, explained that this is an existing program moving to an online delivery mode. It is driven by competitive and market forces. There are changing requirements for the CPA exam, which are changing when students can sit for the exam. There will be more working students that will be needing additional certification later. It is a response in anticipation of the legislature that will be voted on in a couple weeks. Additionally, it responds to competitive forces, such as Ohio University and John Carroll. In terms of capability, the department is rather small, but 2/3 of the faculty have experience in creating quality online classes in support of the MBA and some undergraduate class and the accounting class for non-majors. That combined with the College of Business Instructional Design Resources, we have the capacity to deliver on this.

VI. Other

A. Action Items

1. Establishment of EPC subcommittees on academic policy, academic calendar, transfer credit, fiscal impact statement and international partnerships and collaborations

Therese stated that if anyone was interested in serving on a committee, to let her know via e-mail. She will be sending out a document to associate and assistant deans and chairs and directors to seek people to serve. The committees will start in the spring semester.

With no questions, comments or concerns, the item passed unanimously.

Chair Pamela E. Grimm called the meeting to order at 3:20p.m., on Monday, 25 January 2021, via Microsoft Teams.

I. Approval of Minutes

A. Meeting on 16 November 2020

With no questions or comments, the meeting minutes of 16 November 2020 were approved.

II. Structure Proposal Review

A. Action Items

Office of the Provost

1. Anti-Racism and Equity Institute (establishing institute, *fall 2021*)

Interim Dean Mandy Munro-Stasiuk stated that this is a multi-disciplinary, research-oriented collaborative designed to advance and promote research scholarship education and activism about racial, ethnic and social justice through rigorous and accessible scholarship and creative activities. The representation on the team was from all across the university from the majority of the colleges and also included Michael Kavulic from Research and Sponsored programs as well as Mike Lehman the director of the Green Health Institute. This helped us to ensure that what was structurally created aligned with what was already existing on campus as far as the existing institutes and initiatives. The anchor of the institute is clearly focused on anti-racism and equity as noted by the name of the institute. The name is odd to some and she said she was pointing it out, because there have been a lot of questions about it. Essentially, naming it “anti-racism,” it involves the identifying, interrogating and getting rid of racism by modifying and replacing systems, organizational structures, policies and practices and attitudes. This is the exact focus of the institute. It will be on research, activism and teaching in this area. Given the historical and contemporary manifestations of racial prejudice, violence and discrimination in the U.S., the immediate focus of the institute will be on anti-black racism as well as its intersections with gender, sexuality, class and immigrant status. This is timely at Kent State in particular, because it links us to the historic nature of racism. The contemporary manifestations and social inequities that are systemic in our society across institutions and including here at Kent State University. This is a collaborative initiative. It brings together a structure and a space to bring together researchers, educators and partners from many disparate parts of the university. A survey was sent out the faculty. There have been over 100 faculty respond that want to be members of this institute and over a dozen staff all from the major academic colleges. All of the deans who have faculty expressing interest have provided a letter of support for what we present here today. This also promotes equity. Many of the scholars from Kent State study aspects of race and racism have reported through the coach survey and also through the climate survey that they feel that their research is less valued than the mainstream research typically done by predominantly white researchers. These researchers have felt less valued by colleagues. Internally, they have reported that they have more problems with reappointment, tenure and promotion and less likely to receive funding from internal sources. This institute is creating a structure to elevate and promote this research and promote the faculty by giving them access to people, resources and access to competitive funding. The proposal is requesting to setup the institute as the other institutes are setup. There will be a director, various advisory bodies, members affiliate members and student members. Members will have a lot of access to resources, such as the opportunity to apply for pilot grant funding, research career development support, primary access to collaborative space and access to a pool of graduate and undergraduate fellows. This proposed institute will be unique to Kent State. Regionally, there are only three institutes or centers that have marginally overlapping missions. None of them really focus on the anti-racism aspect that is proposed. Therefore, there is no local competition. Nationally, Kent State would be on the level playing field with centers, such as The Anti-Racist Research and Policy Center and The American University in Washington DC, The Center for Anti-Racist Research of Boston University and Race and Equity Center of The University of Southern California. Finally, this institute will raise

the profile of Kent State, in general, in the area of race and anti-racism research. This will be a major recruitment tool for faculty as well as students moving forward.

Associate Professor Jennifer Marcinkiewicz added that it is not just that the scholarship is marginalized at Kent State, but it is a national trend. These sorts of venues that people publish in are typically less valued and less regarded by RTP committees.

An EPC member asked where the intersections are between the existing Diversity, Equity and Inclusion and the Women's Center and how can we support these issues university wide.

Interim Dean Munro-Stasiuk replied that this is a research institute which is not available in those other areas. She said they want to partner with all of these entities. They would become members and affiliate members with the institute. The way that the partnerships are currently setup right now. Originally, this institute would report to the Provost's Office, but Melody wants it to report to RASP like the other institutes with a dotted line to the Provost's Office and to Diversity, Equity and Inclusion so that those offices would be informing the work that was moving forward. There would be all kinds of programming done in collaboration with the Women's Center, the LGBTQ+ Center and the rest of the entities on campus.

An EPC member asked if there is a way to express interest.

Interim Dean Munro-Stasiuk replied, yes. There is still a collection of names being collected.

With no further questions or comments, the item passed unanimously.

Division of Research and Sponsored Programs

2. Environmental Science and Design Research Institute (establishing institute, *fall 2021*)

Vice President of Research and Sponsored Programs Paul Dicorleto stated that a five years ago, a poll was done of the university community. The survey was of possible research areas to invest in. There were two main criteria were existing strengths in those area and geared toward multi-disciplinary research. Two were formed as institutes and three as initiatives with a goal of seeing how things performed and moving forward if it went well. Environmental Science and Design Research Initiative has done very well. All metrics put forward were exceeded.

Professor Chris Blackwood explained that the initiative started a couple of years. There has been a lot of support from faculty from a wide range of disciplines. They were all very excited and supportive of the transition from initiative to institute. This builds on their participation in the environmental science symposium which has grown. This will be the 7th or 8th annual symposium. Looking forward to expanding what is done by individual faculty and units.

Associate Professor Diane Davis-Sikora said that having institute status would only enhance the opportunities in expanding partnerships on national and regional levels.

With no questions or comments, the item passed unanimously.

College of Arts and Sciences**3. Department of Pan-African Studies: Renaming department to the Department of Africana Studies (fall 2021)**

Associate Professor Felix Kumah-Abiwu explained that there has been discussion in the department about aligning with the field. The current name is Pan African Studies. The department thought of how to fall within the broader line of the discipline. The discipline has been changing over the past 50 years. The new name would be Africana Studies. The rationale is to align with the changing trends and make it more accessible to more students. A study has been done within Arts and Sciences on the name change. This is the way many departments across the nation are changing their name. The name “Africana” captures the totality of the various areas focused on—Africa, African American experience and Caribbean. It is good to align to what is happening and keeps it consistent with names of graduate school programs.

With no questions or comments, the item passed unanimously.

III. Program Proposal Review**A. Action Items****COLLEGE OF AERONAUTICS AND ENGINEERING****1. Aviation Maintenance Management - B.S.: Establishing degree program to be offered online-only (fall 2021 pending final approval)**

Dean Christina Bloebaum stated that the focus of the college has changed. There have been 10 Ph.D.'s hired with 9 of them being 10-year track faculty. This gives an idea of the change in focus of the college.

Associate Dean Maureen McFarland said that five non-engineering programs to cover the breadth of aeronautics and aviation—Professional Pilot program, Air Traffic Control, Aviation Maintenance, Aeronautical Studies and Engineering Technology. The Bachelor of Science in Aviation Maintenance Management is a natural continuation of this process. It was started with conversations with the Ashtabula campus when looking at partnering with them with a part 147 aviation maintenance technician school. This is a completer degree for individuals who already have their Airframe and Powerplant certificate. Boeing and Airbus put out an overview for the need for technicians, pilots and individuals working in the aviation industry. There is a need for over 192,000 new aviation maintenance technicians between now and 2039. BLS talks about a 5% growth in the next ten years. There is a lot of need in the aviation technician and part 147 students. When going through a part 147 program, there is rarely a degree offered. The reason is it takes about 4800 training and contact hours usually done within a compressed timeframe of 18 months. This includes hands-on and specific training to be able to repair an aircraft. There have been conversations with hundreds of thousands of aviation maintenance technicians who have not gotten a degree, because they have not had the time. This will allow them to finish their training and go into the workforce. This is designed to complement the rest of the aviation programs. Students coming into the degree will automatically get 30 credit hours for the aviation or powerplant certificate they have already earned somewhere else. The rest of the degree is designed to give them their bachelor's degree and give them the maintenance management feel. There is a capstone course in this degree. They will have the tools to begin a part 145 repair

station. Students can go on to get an inspection certificate and can do repairs and send an aircraft back into service without someone else checking their work. Part 145 means that the entire organization is to sign and return an aircraft to service. Kent State just became a Part 145 aircraft repair station. That process is kind of like the accreditation in the eyes of the FAA. The program is 100% online since many of the students will be working. Most of the new courses are in 2-credit-hour, 8-week increments online to support the working individual. Students can finish the degree in as little as 2 years. In order to do maintenance on a Boeing 737, students have to go to school with Boeing. With this program, students can get credit for the Boeing credential. Maximum would be 15-20 hours. The rest would be math, English and core requirements. Then there would be a focus on the management and finance piece. Being able to design and create a portion of a 145 repair station. Graduates can be managers and rise to higher levels within their maintenance organizations.

With no questions or comments, the item passed unanimously.

2. Mechatronics Engineering - M.S.: Establishing degree programs to be offered at the Kent Campus (fall 2021 pending final approval)

3. Mechatronics Engineering - Ph.D.: Establishing degree programs to be offered at the Kent Campus (fall 2021 pending final approval)

Dean Christina Bloebaum stated that this is a program that has built upon expertise in the Bachelor of Science which was approved 3 years ago and the first cohort is going to graduate this year. The bachelor's program is the only one in the state and the M.S. and Ph.D. degree will also be very unique.

Associate Professor Blake Stringer explained that the first aerospace and engineering cohort graduated last fall. Out of those, 86% are employed. There are currently 70 students in that program and about 23 in the undergraduate mechatronics engineering program. The mechatronics engineering students are getting internships at places like Tesla. Last year, the M.S. and Ph.D. in aerospace engineering program was approved. It received unanimous recommendation by the other voting institutions in the state. Admissions started in the fall. To accompany that degree, the M.S. degree in mechatronics engineering was created. Mechatronics is a multi-disciplinary program. It combines aspects of mechanical engineering, electric engineering, controls engineering, systems engineering and computer science. Everything that is built today is a mechatronics system. This M.S. proposal consists of 31 credit hours. The Ph.D. has 60 credit hours past the master's degree. The M.S. includes seminar requirements. A mathematics graduate course is required at the master's level and has been coordinated with the math department. There are different focus areas, such as control systems area, robotics and automation area and machine intelligence focus area. This includes some computer science courses. Coordination has been done with the department of computer science and the department of mathematics. They are onboard with participating and offering graduate courses for this degree. In addition, there are two new programs developed—mechatronics engineering and aerospace engineering. There is a new course carousel developed in engineering for both aerospace and mechatronics. The current process involves putting names with the

courses. Some of the courses are running now. In terms of faculty, there are now 15-16. The tenure track faculty are focusing on research and bringing in and raising the profile.

With no questions or comments, items 2 and 3 passed unanimously.

COLLEGE OF APPLIED AND TECHNICAL STUDIES

4. Brewing Technology - Undergraduate Certificate: Establishing certificate to be offered at Ashtabula Campus; compliments enology and viticulture associate degrees (fall 2021)

Senior Special Assistant Lori Lee stated that the brewing curriculum was created in the last 18 months. Early last spring, they were contacted by the department of hospitality management looking for a way to expand some of their offerings. Over the course of those conversations, this certificate was developed. From the viticulture and enology degrees being offered on campus, they can harness the science courses built into those degrees to also build into the brewing degrees. The chemistry, microbiology and sanitation are very similar between the processes. Although different, they are similar enough to be taught in the same course. Looking at the brewing numbers over the last 5-6 years, the number of microbreweries and the number of jobs in those jobs has exploded across the state. Breweries more than doubled from 2015 to 2018 in the state. The number of barrels of beer produced in the state over that same time also increase exponentially. The certificate method was decided upon to deliver this. They believe it has multiple ways of attracting students to the program. They believe that the viticulture and enology students will be interested in adding the certificate to their degrees, because of the changing liquor laws. There will also be hospitality management students that will be able to use these 21 hours towards their 18 hours of specialization within a hospitality management bachelor's degree. This certificate, on its own, will have standalone marketing ability.

Therese asked who the audience would be for the non-degree seeking students.

Senior Special Assistant Lee replied that they have seen a lot of post-undergraduate students who are looking to change careers. They believe there is a market for just the certificate in that way. It does not preclude anyone coming in taking the program without a degree, but there seems to be a market for these certificates.

Therese asked how many of the courses are being offered online and are the others offered at Ashtabula or onsite elsewhere.

Senior Specialist Assistant Lee said that students will take classes in a V3 delivery format. This includes online courses and then come to the Ashtabula campus or on-site at a winery to do their practicum time or lab work. This depends on how the course is structured by the faculty member. They are working with the hospitality management program to look at a site in the Kent area for students in the hospitality management program.

With no further questions or comments, the item passed unanimously.

5. Computed Tomography - Undergraduate Certificate: Reactivating certificate to be offered at Salem Campus; previously offered 2008-2012; prepares students for certification (fall 2021)

7. Magnetic Resonance Imaging - Undergraduate Certificate: Reactivating certificate to be offered at Salem Campus; previously offered 2008-2012; prepares students for certification (fall 2021)

Dean Jan Gibson stated that the bachelor of radiologic imaging sciences was established in 2002. Since that time, there have been over 200 students complete the BRIT degree with CT and MRI concentrations or have completed the certificate programs when they were offered in 2008-2012. They were deactivated due to issues with proprietary schools. They are looking to reactivate the certificates, because the two programs are now being offered online and that would be attractive to students. The audience for the certificates would be for those who have completed a program in radiologic technology, nuclear medicine, radiation therapy or diagnostic medical sonography or ultrasound. Most of the applicants are those who completed an associate degree in radiologic technology. When they complete the certificate coursework in clinicals, they can then sit for the National Certification Exam and become a registered CT technologist or a registered MRI technologist. This permits them to become more marketable, advance their skills and position and increase their financial well-being. In the past, when students completed the certificate program, some of them did come back and complete the BRIT degree. There are a lot of job opportunities for those who complete the program. The majority of the technologists work in hospitals that require scanning around the clock. The graduates have no problem securing employment. The BLS states a 7% increase in the job outlook for these workers and Ohio healthcare practitioners and technical services state a 12% increase in the job outlook. There are many requests from employers in the area and past graduates informing of job openings on the social media page. The 3-semester certificate program provides 21-credit-hours of coursework that includes clinical education. Students do 15 hours a week of clinicals at their nearby hospital. It includes equipment procedures and patient management. Students come from radiology schools throughout northeast Ohio, northern West Virginia and northern Pennsylvania. They have recently partnered with radiologic technology programs from Columbus State, Eastern Gateway and Lorain County Community College to provide a pathway for their students towards these certificates or the bachelor's degree. Faculty are in place since these courses are already offered for the BRIT degree. The same faculty will be teaching these courses. The main difference is that the students will not complete the Kent Core courses. Competitors are Lakeland Community College, University of Cincinnati, Columbus State, Rhodes State also offer these types of certificates.

With no questions or comments, items 5 & 7 passed unanimously.

6. Event Management - Undergraduate Certificate: Establishing certificate to be offered at Ashtabula Campus (fall 2021)

Associate Lecturer Mandy Ulicney this is in response to 10 years or so worth of information coming in from the hospitality advisory board and industry partners where there is a very big need for event managers. Not just in the Ashtabula area, but in the northeast Ohio area in general. Industry reports are showing that occupancy rates are starting to climb. Airline reports

are showing that people are starting to travel again. It is predicted that by early 2022 we are going to experience something equivalent to the “roaring twenties.” The hospitality industry is expected to rebound in a very big way. They reached out to the Ashtabula County Convention Visitors Bureau and got a report that there has been constant year over year growth in the hospitality and travel industry. This certificate was brought forth for the need for event managers. As Lori Lee stated, breweries and wineries are exploding throughout the state. Breweries and wineries are looking for people to run events at those facilities. The hospitality management program is currently putting forth a curriculum revision in which event management will be one of three concentration areas.

Therese asked about the differences between the new certificate and the existing hospitality management certificate and the plans for the hospitality management certificate.

Associate Lecturer Ulicney replied that they have had the hospitality management certificate for 12 years and there are students who enjoy hospitality management, but their true interest lies in events. While the hospitality management certificate was a good start, it was not checking all the boxes. There was a need to separate that out. The ways that they are going to be different are the coursework. The hospitality management certificate will have more of a basic understanding of various industry segments. Students could choose an event planning class if that is what interests them, but they could also choose a casino management class or a club management class. Whereas the event management certificate, the requirements of the program will have a few more event related courses within it. The two separate certificates will still be offered, because some people are not interested in events and there are people who are really interested in events.

Therese asked why the practicum is not required.

Associate Lecturer Ulicney said the majority of students that are coming in are non-traditional college-aged students. They often have several years of experience already. The practicum was added in for students that were more traditional and did not have the management experience. It was left out for those that already did.

With no further questions or comments, the item passed unanimously.

COLLEGE OF ARCHITECTURE AND ENVIRONMENTAL STUDIES

8. Interior Design - B.A.: Substantial revising of curriculum, including 21 new courses (fall 2021)

Dean William Willoughby stated that they have a long-standing, nationally recognized and accredited program in interior design. About 18 months ago, there was a charge put forth by the dean to review and, if needed, reform the curricula for the interior design program. Competitive peers and aspirant institutions were reviewed to benchmark and reform the curriculum to better respond to peer and aspirant institutions and accrediting body and its performance standards. The accrediting body is the Counsel of Interior Design Accreditation and NASAD. Three points were considered. The cleaning up of incremental changes that have occurred in the curriculum over many years to smooth out the rough patches in the curriculum. To help with better pedagogically connect courses. This led to pretty major revisioning of when courses are taught. Also, with the

nomenclature associated with certain courses. In addition, there was a major change in the strategy in how curriculum outcomes were addressed. Historically they have been connected to course names and titles. That was hindering the opportunity to look at learning outcomes as a better measure of what is done and when. This allows the curriculum to be nimbler. It is better that those areas are where they belong. This allows curriculum to be taken where information builds by semester to connect coursework to the studio course where there is a lot of applied learning. It allows for better alignment of the right course at the right time by the learning outcomes associated with those courses. Another thing this change has made is, in the past, the curriculum has said very limited room for upper-division elective courses. With the course consolidation, there was time found for elective courses. This is a better response for the accreditation and it also facilitates students that want to seek a minor. A number of the students do pursue minors. The changes better reflect the state-of-the-art in interior design education and the hope is that it responds better to the mission of the college.

Therese asked if it was expected of students to go above 126 credits required.

Dean Willoughby replied that a number of the students who enter the program so have post-secondary credits. Most likely, some of the students do pursue minors and some students do go beyond the 126.

Therese asked if they stay within the four years.

Dean Willoughby replied that students typically stay within the four years.

Therese asked if the 126 credit hours is required by accreditation.

Dean Willoughby said a lot of the aspirational colleges were around that amount.

Therese said she knows a lot of programs were staying with the name interior design, but some are going with interior architecture.

Associate Professor Ronn Daniel said that data on other accredited interior design degrees show University of Cincinnati at 126, University of Miami 124-128, University of Kentucky 128, University of Ohio 127 and Lawrence Tech 129.

Dean Willoughby added that the 126 does not increase the number of credit hours.

Therese asked about the name change. She wondered if they had considered Interior Architecture as some programs have changed to that name.

Associate Professor Daniel replied that there is some move towards that name. However, it is sensitive terrain with that professional licensure and nomenclature. Programs that are interested in changing to that name are doing so for recruiting purposes and Kent does not have that issue. The program is large, healthy and growing.

Dean Willoughby added that when recruiting for the college, they have a hard enough time making a distinction between architecture and architectural studies. Adding interior architecture would add another facet to explain.

Chair Grimm asked if the program requirements were highly and tightly sequenced.

Associate Professor Daniel replied, yes. The backbone of the curriculum are the design studios which are intended to be sequential and progressive on each other. There is also a series of content streams that feed in at appropriate points to develop supplementary, technical, historical or conceptual knowledge alongside the studios. The sequence is fairly sequential, but more flexible than the curriculum which is being replaced.

Dean Willoughby added that corequisites and prerequisites have been built in for that reason. It is much tighter in the current curriculum, but it still needs to be there to build on the ladder of knowledge and skill.

With no further questions or comments, the item passed unanimously.

COLLEGE OF THE ARTS

School of Theatre and Dance

9. Acting for the Returning Professional - M.F.A.: Revising major name to Acting - Intended for the Returning Professional; revising course and progression requirements (fall 2021)

Interim Assistant Dean Tameka Ellington said the name and roadmap were updated for the major. The name change is adding greater emphasis to attract the caliber of students. Adding the “intended” classifies the degrees title and provides intention offering the degree to a specific population. Additionally, it aligns with the recommendation from the accrediting body—National Association Schools of Theatre. The progression of the roadmap changed as well. Originally, the internship responsibilities that the students had included a 6-credit-hour responsibility. That has changed to a 3-credit-hour responsibility that aligns with the accrediting body has requested. This will allow for courses to address the pedagogy and career preparation and will allow more room for other courses needed.

Therese asked would you still not admit students coming from an acting background.

Interim Assistant Dean Ellington replied, yes. Students are required to provide evidence that they have been working in the entertainment business.

Therese asked what if you promote the program as acting rather than acting – intended for the returning professional.

Assistant Professor Eric Kildow said that in naming the program, one thing that is aimed for is this specific target audience. There is no shortage of acting MFA's. None of them specifically deal with returning professionals in regard to they have been professional artists and coming back to school for that. It is somewhat important that it be in the degree title.

With no further questions or comments, the item passed unanimously.

COLLEGE OF ARTS AND SCIENCES

Department of Biological Sciences

10. Biology for Environmental Management and Conservation - Undergraduate Minor: Establishing minor to be offered at the Kent Campus (*fall 2021*)

Professor David Ward stated that this is a proposal to create a new minor. It is similar to the current major in environmental and conservation biology. However, it has a reduced number of prerequisites. There is a single prerequisite which is a freshman course called “biodiversity.” There are 3 core courses one general ecology, one in conversation biology and one in environmental management. There is a range of courses. There are a total number of 19 credits. This is aimed for students who are not in the environmental program. This minor is looking to attract students in programs like recreation, parks and tourism management. They have a requirement that they get 10 of their credits from biological sciences. This would be ideal for them. There is also interest from environmental studies and geography. There are no requirements for taking chemistry courses or mathematics courses. If students would like to take those, they are welcome to do so.

With no questions or comments, the item passed unanimously.

11. Human Disease - Undergraduate Minor: Establishing minor to be offered at the Kent Campus (*fall 2021*)

Professor Colleen Novak Barnett stated that there are 22-credit-hours with this minor. There are a few prerequisites. The undergraduate curriculum committee went through and tried to minimize or eliminate as many prerequisites as possible. This would make it so that students could take the 3 required classes and a list of electives. It is aimed at pre-medical students who are not biology majors. They would have already taken any prerequisites and quite a few of the requirements. The non-overlapping, elective courses are also needed.

With no questions or comments, the item passed unanimously.

12. Medical Technology - B.S.: Revising major name to Medical Laboratory Science (*fall 2021*)

Chair Grimm explained that the rationale for the change is that it most accurately describes the profession and certification titles. It is prompted in part by certifications in conjunction with the field.

Therese added that most similar programs in the state are not called medical technology. They are called medical laboratory science. Students looking for the program may not have thought about looking for medical technology.

With no questions or comments, the item passed unanimously.

13. Microbiology - Undergraduate Minor: Establishing minor to be offered at the Kent Campus (*fall 2021*)

Professor Chris Blackwood said that it would be attractive to people outside of the biology major who were interested in getting a minor in biology and having that specialization attached the

minor. There is a series of 4 required classes and a series of electives. The classes range from pre-medical to pre-health. It is believed that there will be a number of majors where these will be of interest. There are already students taking microbiology due to the aspect of health.

Therese asked if they see the biological sciences general minor going away and being replaced with more specialized minors.

Professor Blackwood replied that he believes there would still be an audience. The idea is that there may be students more interested in the more specialized minors that currently do not have the opportunity to get them at Kent State.

Professor Ward explained that there have been very few students interested in the general biological sciences minor. This is because they were obligated to require a lot of prerequisite courses. The more focused minors would appeal to a much broader range of students.

Therese asked if he foresaw removing the general minor in the future.

Professor Ward said that he was not sure, but he believed the more focused minors will appeal to a broader range of students.

Professor Novak Barnett added that that they are familiar with the population of students from other majors that are taking these courses that want to focus in these areas. These minors are targeted towards them specifically. If the interest in the general minor lowers, then removing it can be discussed.

Chair Grimm asked if there are advisors that specialize in the areas and will you be communicating these minors to them.

Professor Ward said that along with advisors he and other professors would be advertising the minor.

With no further questions or comments, the item passed unanimously.

Department of Computer Science

14. Bioinformatics - Undergraduate Minor: Establishing minor to be offered at the Kent and Stark campuses (*fall 2021*)

15. Computers and Geosciences - Undergraduate Minor: Establishing minor to be offered at the Kent and Stark campuses (*fall 2021*)

Professor Feodor Dragan stated that there are 3 new minors. This is for students interested in computers from other departments. There was a 4-million-dollar grant received that gives scholarships to the students in computer science and provides some help to students in other departments taking the courses. Bioinformatics minor targets students in from biological sciences and computer sciences. Within this minor, there are computer science courses and biology

courses. The computers and geosciences minor are in collaboration with the geography and geology departments. The computer science courses are the same for bioinformatics, but then there are geology and geography courses.

With no questions or comments, the item passed unanimously.

16. Web Programming - Undergraduate Minor: Establishing minor to be offered at the Kent and Stark campuses (fall 2021)

Professor Dragan explained that this minor goes deeper into programming. This designed based on the general minor. The general minor has required courses and then 3 electives. The electives in web programming require 3 particular courses which are database, web programming I and web programming II. This is a very important minor that most databases are stored on the web and they use web programming.

Cathy Zingrone said that computer science and emerging media and technology did discuss both of their minors that are web programming. The lesser action items show that the web development minor in emerging media and technology did change its name to web design and development. In the description for both minor's reference the other minor. This could be confusing for students, so they talked about making sure to specify it in the program description. There is a difference between the front-end and the back-end.

Therese asked if they anticipate eliminating the more general computer science minor.

Professor Dragan replied that they expect more students to take the general minor than the specialized minors. These are for students in biology, geology and geography that want to add to their major.

With no further questions or comments, items 14-16 passed unanimously.

Department of Pan-African Studies

17. Pan-African Studies - B.A.: Revising major name to Africana Studies; revising Race, Sex and Gender concentration name to Race, Gender and Sexuality (fall 2021)

18. Race, Gender and Social Justice - Graduate Minor: Establishing minor to be offered at Kent Campus (fall 2021)

Professor Felix Kumah-Abiwu stated that having changed the name of department, the name of the major needs changed. There are a few other changes of the program, learning objectives and subject code. There has also been a change to concentration name to rearrange the words. Additionally, the new graduate minor is to address the current societal challenges. This reviews the intersection between race, gender and social justice. This is a way for the department to address the requests for a minor in this subject and move forward with the changing times. The goal is for students to have specialized knowledge and broaden their scope of issues of race, gender and social justice. There are 6 departments in collaboration with this—English, History, Sociology, Philosophy, Political Science, Geography, The Center for the Study of Gender and

Sexuality and The School of Peace and Conflict Studies. There are professors are from political science, Africana studies and geography. This will draw in students from political science.

With no questions or comments, items 17-18 passed unanimously.

Department of Sociology

19. Society, Health and Medicine - Undergraduate Minor: Establishing minor to be offered at the Kent Campus (*fall 2021*)

Professor Tiffany Taylor stated that this proposal is to establish the minor in Society, Health and Medicine.

With no questions or comments, the item passed unanimously.

COLLEGE OF BUSINESS ADMINISTRATION

Department of Management and Information Systems

20. Business Analytics - B.B.A.: Establishing degree programs to be offered at the Kent Campus (*fall 2021 pending final approval*)

Academic Chair Felix Offodile stated that this proposal is to establish a bachelor's in business Analytics to be offered at the Kent Campus.

With no questions or comments, the item passed unanimously.

21. Financial Management - Graduate Certificate: Establishing certificate to be offered online only; will articulate into M.B.A. degree (*fall 2021*)

22. Leadership and Management - Graduate Certificate: Establishing certificate to be offered online only; will articulate into M.B.A. degree (*fall 2021*)

Associate Dean Cathy Dubois stated that this is to establish a Financial Management graduate certificate to be offered online only.

With no questions or comments, items 21-22 passed unanimously.

School Director Emily Metzgar stated that this was to revise the major name of Journalism and Mass Communication to Media and Journalism as the school name changed to Media and Journalism.

With no questions or comments, the item passed unanimously.

Professor Aviad Israeli stated that the proposal to establish 3 concentrations and a revision to the course requirements.

Interim Associate Provost Manfred van Dulmen called the meeting to order at 3:20p.m., on Monday, 15 February 2021, via Microsoft Teams.

I. Approval of Minutes

A. Meeting on 25 January 2020

One correction requested was to move Gabriella Paar-Jakli from “not present” to “present” on the minutes.

With no comments or questions, the item passed unanimously.

II. Presentation

A. Transfer Pathways

Joanna Liedel, Director, Enrollment Management Academic Partnerships

Ashley Maher, Assistant Director, Enrollment Management Academic Partnerships

Assistant Director Ashley Maher stated that their primary focus is on domestic partnerships and ensuring they remain up-to-date. The international articulation agreements are overseen by the Office of Global Education. Ashley's office works with faculty, admissions, credit transfer, general counsel and the provost's office to institute and maintain the agreements. Additionally, they work with ODHE initiatives to facilitate compliance. Those include transfer assurance guide (TAG). TAG courses are course equivalencies among state institutions. The Ohio Transfer Module compliance governs the transfer of the general education requirements and the Ohio Guaranteed Transfer Pathways. Career Technical Assurance Guide Courses (CTAG) are overseen by Tech Prep—Jennie Koch and Melanie Tichy. An articulation agreement is a general term. It encompasses articulation agreements and partnerships between colleges, universities or institutions documenting the transfer policies for a specific academic program or degree. The focus is mainly on community colleges, but there are agreements with other entities like trade schools. Many of those are through the College of Applied and Technical Studies. The Transfer Pathway Articulation Agreement is an over-arching, legal agreement to partner with institutions. It allows to create various degree pathways with a single institution. It is also known as an "umbrella agreement." Pathways are an articulated degree to degree semester by semester sequence. These are primarily for the ease of transfer and are typically 2+2 programs. Partnerships are revenue-sharing agreements with which we agree to offer programs at another institution. Students do not need to physically leave the community college campus to earn a Kent State degree. The Ohio Guaranteed Transfer Pathways constitute an agreement between public community colleges and universities confirming the community college courses meet major preparation requirements and will be counted and applied toward the bachelor's degree. An annual (spring) review is done to ensure that the pathways remain up-to-date each year.

Director Joanna Liedel added that there are other pathways out there that may not have made it to the enrollment management academic partnerships office yet. She encouraged anyone in the process of or considering creating a pathway to reach out to their office.

An EPC member asked if there is guaranteed admission or there is a review of every student before entering a program.

Assistant Director Maher said the admissions requirements still apply. Students have to meet the admissions standards to be admitted.

Director Liedel added that they have seen pathways where they must have guaranteed spots, but that is decided upon by faculty. There has never been an automatic admittance. The state has been working on initiatives to make transferring more fluid.

An EPC member asked if there has been more discussion regarding the catalog year for students in an OGTP or articulation agreement.

Director Liedel replied that there are no current guarantees that if a student has been following a pathway for 3 or 4 years that they will continue with what was in an old catalog. Dual admission conversations have been very popular at the community colleges, because it would guarantee a catalog year for students. She said she sees it as a path Kent State is going down to help save the student from following something that would not be enforced at the time they come.

COLLEGE OF APPLIED AND TECHNICAL STUDIES

(Senior Academic Program Director Julie Senita)

1. Medical Assisting - Undergraduate Certificate

Establishing certificate to be offered at Ashtabula and Geauga campuses; prepares students for certification (fall 2021)

Senior Academic Program Director Julie Senita stated that this is a 25-credit-hour, lab and hybrid-online certificate program. The college has worked with the Cleveland Clinic and University Hospital to meet the healthcare need in northeast Ohio. The hope is that students will complete this certificate in 3 semesters.

Interim Dean Susan Stocker added that the curriculum works nicely with microcredentials. The certificate can be broken down into microcredentials for those that solely want to take one subject rather than the whole certificate.

With no questions or comments, the item passed unanimously.

2. Esports - Undergraduate Minor

Establishing minor to be offered on the Kent Campus (fall 2021)

Associate Professor Mark Lyberger stated that the purpose is to introduce an interdisciplinary minor that would be specific to the multidisciplinary concept of esports. When reviewing the possibility of a minor, it becomes a unique opportunity to capitalize on the industry and afford students the opportunity to explore different realms aligned with the industry.

With no questions or comments, the item passed unanimously.

School of Lifespan Development and Educational Sciences

(Associate Professor Kelly Cichy)

3. International Family Science - Undergraduate Minor

Establishing minor to be offered on the Kent and Stark campuses; travel abroad to Italy will be required (fall 2021)

Associate Professor Kelly Cichy stated that the minor provides students the opportunity to learn about the field of family science both as it currently exists in the United States and to take that knowledge and compare it to a study abroad post-culture. All of this while taking interdisciplinary coursework related to international topics in the U.S. and abroad. Students who are interested in internationalized curriculum will have the opportunity to have the study abroad experience. The structural and financial constraints for students have been discussed and would

allow students to stay in the U.S., but still work with immigrant populations. Additionally, employers are interested in hiring students with more study abroad experience.

With no questions or comments, the item passed unanimously.

Associate Provost Manfred van Dulmen called the meeting to order at 3:20p.m., on Monday, 19 April 2021, via Microsoft Teams.

I. Approval of Minutes

A. Meeting on 15 February 2021

Without any questions, comments or corrections, the meeting minutes from 15 February 2021 were approved.

II. Presentation

A. Tech Prep and Career Tech Ed Programs

Jennie Koch, Outreach Program Director, Tech Prep

Outreach Program Director, Jennie Koch, stated that Tech Prep (CTP) is synonymous with Career Tech ED (CTE). College Tech Prep is a combination of academics and advanced career-technical education with the objective of a seamless, non-duplicative transition from high school to post-secondary education, apprenticeships or careers. It is co-administered by the Ohio Department of Education and the Ohio Department of Higher Education. There are six regional centers. Kent State works with Career and Technical Prep Districts (CPTD). There are career and technical schools throughout the state that schools align to provide career and technical education. Some of the main things prepared by Tech Prep are developing pathways, aligning curriculum between secondary and post-secondary education and facilitating several credit options. Kent State's post-secondary partners are Youngstown State University, Lakeland, Cuyahoga Community College, Lorain County Community College, University of Akron and Stark State College. Kent State is the regional center. Within the university, Jennie is the director of College Tech Prep which is in the division of Enrollment Management. For the state, Jennie is the chief administrator. She has a director at each of the colleges and universities. There are over 240 school districts in the partnership and more than 20 charter and community schools. Additionally, there are 200 businesses and community organizations. The state has made it a requirement that students must have 250 hours of work-based learning. They are working with the governor's office of workforce transformation to help with the Ohio pipeline in areas that are critical for economic success. There are 133,627 Ohio students in the Tech Prep/CTE program as of FY19. A service provided is serving as a liaison between the Department of Education, Department of Higher Education and all of the regional stakeholders. Kent State serves as the single, regional point of contact. Another service provided is being a liaison between the business industry and labor. There is also a partnership council with a representative from every school district that meets quarterly. Jennie said they do a lot of professional development which is on behalf of ODE and ODHE, because there are so many things constantly changing. The regional centers are used to disseminate the information. Jennie explained that Tech Prep works with faculty to create articulation agreements and CTAG's. They develop programs of study which are comparable to the roadmaps at Kent State. These programs of study from grades 8-16. They work with other agencies like Ohio Means Jobs, High Schools That Work, Success Bound and Perkins 5. One type of credit Tech Prep works with is articulated credit. This is between secondary and post-secondary. It is a unique agreement between institutions and is also known as bilateral credit. This credit is awarded to students who successfully complete a state-approved career tech ed or college tech prep program and they meet the requirements of the articulation agreement and then they matriculate onto the college partner. Jennie stated that her job is to work with faculty to create the articulation agreements. Faculty decide the courses that are included in the agreement. Faculty receive the ODE and ODHE approved state standards which include state-standardized curriculum for all high school programs in Ohio. The curriculum and end of course exams are developed by college faculty across Ohio along with teachers and business industry representatives and credentialing agencies. This is to be seamless from the secondary to the post-secondary. The faculty sit on the boards that develop the end of course exams. When an articulation agreement comes in, it goes on a template. After faculty approve the courses that they want on the articulation agreement, the agreement is then sent to the high school

superintendent to sign. Once the superintendent has signed it, it comes back to Kent for the Provost to sign. Students can access the credit by completing a credit application form. The form is found on the Kent State website or from their high school counselor/teacher. The high school instructor completes part of the form and they e-mail/mail with the final high school transcript and any certification copies. Tech Prep reviews those and processes the credit. The student is notified with a letter and the credit is posted on the student's transcript by the transfer office. Students have three years from high school graduation to apply for these credits. Students must have a B or better in the course to obtain credit. Another requirement for students is to have been in the program for a minimum of two years. The other type of credit students can earn is known as Career Technical Assurance Guide (CTAG). They are similar to the TAG courses except they are academic courses and CTAG are career technical courses. They are guaranteed to be accepted at any approved public higher education institution in Ohio that offers the course. These are also referred to as CT2. Any student that is taking a course as part of the state-wide agreement is guaranteed that course with the exact same number of credits to any University of Ohio institution (USO). Every five years the standards, the articulation agreements and the assessments are reviewed by faculty, teachers, the higher learning commission and others. CTAG credit awarding happens 95% electronically and 5% require paper verification. That is because there are courses that are offered at the secondary level. The end of course state exams are uploaded into ODHE's system. At the end of the course, students take an exam and if they pass, ODHE will upload the score into their system. All incoming Kent State students are cross-walked with the system. A new Ohio law requires the student to give permission to award credit. That could be for financial aid reasons. Students are e-mailed up to four times to get permission. However, they are finding that students do not always respond. The students who do not respond to the e-mail receive a phone call about the credit.

Therese asked if Kent State has to guarantee the equivalency of a course that is guaranteed in the agreement. If yes, are those course equivalencies set by Kent State or do they have to be submitted to be approved?

Jennie replied, no. There is a state panel of faculty who make that decision. If the state identifies course 'A' to be a CTAG, then they look through Kent's course catalog and compare other courses to course 'A.' Tech Prep asks faculty to complete paperwork that is sent to the committee that is facilitated by ODHE and they make a determination whether or not it is an equivalency. If it is deemed an equivalency, then Kent State is to give the student the credit. As long as 70% of the learning outcomes are the same, then they will ask the university to make it a CTAG course.

Therese asked what is in the developed Program of Study (POS).

Jennie explained that it looks like the roadmap, but it has the high school portion through an associate degree and sometimes through a baccalaureate degree. This allows students to see what their whole education would look like and not just what is happening in 9th or 10th grade.

A. Action Items

COLLEGE OF ARTS AND SCIENCES

1. Center for Comparative and Integrative Programs: Revising the center to a school and renaming it the School for Multidisciplinary Social Sciences and Humanities.

Interim Dean Mandy Munro-Stasiuk stated that the proposal is to revise the Center of Comparative and Integrative Programs to the School of Multidisciplinary Social Sciences and Humanities. The center was created six years ago for academic programs to be experimented with, developed and grow. It ultimately became a place to house programs and faculty. This has become a problem, because the center should not be holding programs or faculty. Faculty in the center do not have any representation at the university. After reviewing multiple solutions, it would be easier to create a school structure over the center. The school would then have representation, have a faculty handbook and protect faculty. There are four non-tenure track faculty and one tenure track faculty member in the center. The majority of the programs will remain in the school and moving the pre-law minor to the Department of Political Science and moving international relations from political science into the school. The Center for the Study of Gender and Sexuality is sitting in the college with academic programs as well—Women's Studies minor and LGBTQ minor. The minors will be removed and put into the school. The center will also be placed inside the school. The rationale for creating this was to take the structural problem, get faculty representation and write a faculty handbook. It does provide a space to grow interdisciplinary and multidisciplinary. Anything created will go through the curricular process. Additionally, there will be core and affiliated faculty.

An EPC member asked about the scale of students and faculty.

Interim Dean Munro-Stasiuk replied that there are five faculty members in the school now and there is a plan to move three more in following the IR major. There will be a total of eight faculty and 250 majors.

With no further questions or comments, the item passed unanimously.

2. Healthy Communities Research Institute: Establishing institute

Research and Sponsored Programs VP, Paul Dicorleto, stated that the proposal is for a transition of an initiative into an institute. Healthy Communities Research initiative started about four and a half years ago. It was one of the five strategic research areas for emphasis that the university chose and was an excellent topic for interdisciplinary collaborations. The institute has 60 faculty members spanning 20 different academic units. In the proposal, there are 8-10 majors in which some of the students would have interest in community health. The initiative to the institute has spent a lot of time interacting with both undergraduate and graduate students in promoting healthy community research. They have supported those students through C-grants, sponsored students every summer, mentored graduate students and beginning faculty with workshops on obtaining external support and publishing research findings and sponsored webinars. There is an

HCRI listserv where this information goes out to 188 faculty, staff and students. The new institute will have a type of assessment where there is an evaluation at the end of the year where new opportunities can be submitted.

With no questions or comments, the item passed unanimously.

IV. Policy Proposal Review

A. Action Items

UNIVERSITY REQUIREMENTS CURRICULUM COMMITTEE

1. Experiential Learning Requirement: Moratorium on NEW ELR courses

Dean Alison J. Smith stated that the URCC is looking at the ELR as potentially part of the new model of what the Kent Core may be. URCC believes it would be a beneficial to have a one-year moratorium on new ELR courses. This moratorium would not include new sections that are section-only ELR's. It would include revisions of existing ELR's or those automatically receiving ELR designation based on their course type and number. Based on what has been reviewed and observed from state and other universities within the state as to their own ideas about the experiential learning credit, it looks like it is possible that it will be part of a model that faculty will be reviewing for the Kent Core. The proposal takes a long time to put together. A year moratorium is necessary so that faculty can review the models and make a decision on how they want to proceed.

Associate Provost van Dulmen asked if the moratorium would be through spring 2022 for new proposals.

Dean Smith replied, yes. A year will allow for an understanding of what the faculty are looking at in terms of the Kent Core models. She said URCC expects that there will be several models going forward in September to the faculty.

Therese asked if academic units could submit courses to be effective for fall 2022 or 2023.

Dean Smith said that they could submit them in the spring, but they would be reviewed for fall 2023 effective date.

An EPC member asked if there was any way that new courses could be reviewed so that they would be effective for fall 2022 as fall 2023 is a long wait.

Therese explained that course designations are not done mid-academic year, because it will not be represented correctly in the catalog. She said it can be discussed, but she is concerned about misinformation for students.

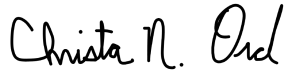

Chair Pamela E. Grimm called the meeting to order at 3:20p.m., on Tuesday, 11 May 2021, via Microsoft Teams.

I. Approval of Minutes

A. Meeting on 19 April 2021

Alison Smith stated that there is a correction in the ELR Moratorium section of the minutes. The sentence should have stated “It would **not** include revisions of existing ELR’s or those automatically receiving ELR designation based on their course type and number.”

(Note: change has been made to the 19 April 2021 minutes)

Yvonne Smith abstained from voting as she did not attend the previous meeting.

II. Presentation

A. Future possibilities for Kent State's regional campuses and the College of Applied and Technical Studies

Peggy Shadduck, vice president of regional campuses and dean of the College of Applied and Technical Studies

Vice President of Regional Campuses and Dean of ATS, Peggy Shadduck, stated that there are many stakeholders when talking about workforce needs. Employers have specific needs. They want to hire people with particular kind of knowledge, skills and abilities. They want to be able to help improve their own talent pool and moving employees into leadership positions. For students, it is very important to be able to say how are the educational experiences I am having aligned with what the employers are looking for and how am I able to take the knowledge and skills I am gaining as a college student and apply those to a career. When thinking about workforce needs, the health of the community should be considered. Having employers who can make sure that they are hiring people that live in our communities which will lead to a much healthier community. It is important for communities to have individuals who are overall knowledgeable and capable of being good citizens. Kent State plays a role of tying all of these things together in how to find the right approach to address the needs of the different stakeholders and how to make sure, as a university, that we are looking at the quality of the learning experiences. Some of the most common gaps in higher education are students with sufficient professional/essential skills, adequate linkage between education and applied experiences, access to simultaneous work and learning, ladder credential opportunities, entry points for underserved learners, clear information on upcoming skill set needs and nimble responses to providing high quality credentials. The roles of regional campuses and the college of applied and technical studies are adequate linkage between education and applied experiences, access to simultaneous work and learning and entry points for underserved learners. The way that college of applied and technical studies provides key aspects in students with sufficient professional/essential skills, adequate linkage between education and applied experiences, ladder credential opportunities, entry points for underserved learners, clear information on upcoming skill set needs and nimble responses to providing high quality credentials.

Therese asked about Peggy's experience with micro-credentials and what opportunities are seen for Kent State to have micro-credentials that would stand out among other universities offering micro-credentials.

Dean Shadduck replied that micro-credentials have been around for some time. They are a credential that is coming directly from the higher education institution, but is not at the level of a full degree. Even a minor could be considered a micro-credential, because it is not a full degree. However, it gives some knowledge and specialization in the field. Organizations are offering particular topics that people can study and earn a badge, certificate or other acknowledgement that they are proficient in a particular skill set. Higher education is considering whether more opportunities should be offered to give some academic credit and make it complimentary to the direction normally taken in higher education. Additionally, working with employers to provide

learning opportunities for training and advancement for people who work in the company. The question is should some of those be part of degree programs. Kent State could consider when keeping a relationship with students after they earn a degree. They will need to reskill, upskill and keep learning. We can develop programs that have the greatest impact on being a part of the Kent State community. What we could do best is have a long-term relationship with students where they are guided in the lifelong learning experience and meeting the needs that they have throughout their entire career as a student.

III. Schedule Review

A. Action Items

1. Submission deadlines and scheduling for academic year 2021-22

Therese explained that the schedule is being setup for next year. The schedule is typically the Monday after faculty senate. There is a struggle with the deadline for the last EPC meeting to consider items for the next catalog year. There has been interchanging dates. No matter what date was picked, there was difficulty with the deadline and January meeting. The majority of the items come for the next academic year for the January agenda. There are 10 business days to publish the agenda. Curriculum Services, Associate Provost, Graduate Dean and Executive EPC have to review the large amount of the proposals for January. The advantages and disadvantages have been reviewed. The recommendation is to have an earlier deadline in December for the January meeting items. It allows for more time to review to resolve issues before they go to EPC. In January, because the load is very heavy for the meeting, the suggestion is to have two meetings in January. This would allow for more review and all items to make the January agenda.

An EPC member asked the date for the December deadline.

Therese said December 10th would be the deadline.

An EPC member stated that December 10th was a concern due to grading and final exams. The member asked if it could be pushed a week later.

Therese said it would be something to consider, but Curriculum Services would need more time to review. The best thing to do is align with the college curriculum committees and that proposals can go to those meetings before they come to EPC. Additionally, giving Curriculum Services enough time to review before and after break to meet with the provost, graduate dean and associate provost and Exec EPC to ensure everything is good before it goes onto the agenda.

An EPC member stated that they would recommend CCC changing their December meeting.

An EPC member asked if some items could have a different or earlier due date.

Therese replied that different deadlines for different types of proposals was considered. However, so many types of proposals are interrelated. It does not always make sense to split it up, because it may be the program, courses and policy. There are certain things that appear to be a small revision, but then it ends up being a substantial change.

An EPC member asked if there could be a December meeting.

Therese replied that if there is an EPC meeting in December, we just have to make sure it is not on the same day as faculty senate. She asked if that would alleviate the amount of proposals that would come in for the January meeting.

An EPC member said that they have proposals ready for December, but have to wait for the January meeting.

An EPC member asked when the Faculty Senate meetings are in relation to EPC.

Therese replied that Faculty Senate meetings are the second Monday of the month and EPC is the third Monday of the month.

An EPC member asked if EPC could meet first and go to the Faculty Senate meeting after.

Chair Grimm stated that there are some instances where that does happen. She will take the question back to the Executive Faculty Senate.

An EPC member asked if an incentive program to get programs to submit early with a more streamlined process.

Therese replied that the majority of proposals go through the CCC and deans. Others are out of our control, because they must be approved at the state-level or the regional accreditor, higher learning commission. She asked if members would consider adding a meeting in December.

EPC members said they were in favor of an additional meeting in December.

An EPC member asked if the deadline for January would be the current deadline or the one proposed.

Therese replied that the deadline for the January meeting would be in December. The deadline for the December meeting would be in November.

An Exec EPC member asked for clarification why the December meeting had been turned down in the Exec EPC meeting.

Therese said that the concern was possibly keeping the January deadline and realizing that would not alleviate the issue. However, hearing from the colleges that they hold over a lot of proposals from November, that may help.

Jennifer Kellogg clarified that moving the January EPC deadline to December was to give Curriculum Services enough time before break to communicate any issues. By having the few days before break, we hope to eliminate those issue beforehand. Proposing a December meeting, the proposal deadline would be sometime in November and those proposals would be reviewed

and put on the December meeting. In the meantime, proposals for January will be coming in by the December 18th proposal submission deadline. The Curriculum Services office needs more time to review the proposals and discuss them. Having the December deadline, the day before break would not provide enough time to discuss the proposals with anyone.

Therese stated that she would change the recommendation to be one meeting in December (December 6th), deadline for January proposals would be Monday, December 13th and two meetings in January.

With no further questions, comments or concerns, the item was passed unanimously.

Therese said that every year, University College likes to reach out to English, Chemistry, Math and Languages just to ensure that the placement scores are still accurate and up-to-date. There are always minor changes. Math made small revisions on how they place their students. Chemistry has removed some placement assessment since creating the boost course. The boost course allows them to not have to do some of the ALEKS placement as they did before.

Chair Grimm asked if there are different standards for the Kent campus and the regional campus.

Therese replied that there are different standards for College Writing I and II put in place in 2012. This is for College Writing only.
