* Exceptions to this deadline are proposals to establish or inactivate a degree or major, or to offer a major fully online, in an accelerated delivery or at another campus or location — all of which require additional and external steps for approvals. Please work with the Office of Curriculum Services to determine a timeline for implementation for this type of proposals.

Implementation of Revisions to Program Admission Criteria

Because the admission window for a semester opens so far in advance of the start of that semester (e.g., admission for fall 2022 opens 1 July 2021, admission for spring 2023 opens 1 April 2022), the implementation date for revisions to a program's admission criteria cannot follow the same deadlines as other program revisions.

Therefore,

- A revision to a program's admission criteria will be implemented for the next admission window unless a later term is requested.
- Revisions will be implemented only after approval by the Educational Policies Council (EPC).
- Revised admission criteria will be noted in the next-published University Catalog after current admission criteria (e.g., Effective for spring 2023, admission criteria will be the following...).

Chair Pamela E. Grimm called the meeting to order at 3:20p.m., on Monday, 20 September 2021, via Microsoft Teams.

I. Approval of Minutes

A. Meeting on 11 May 2021

Associate Lecturer Shelley K. Marshall moved to approve the minutes, and Professor Edward Dauterich seconded the motion.

Without questions or comments, the item passed unanimously.

II. Presentations

A. Orientation for EPC members

Melody Tankersley, senior vice president and provost

Pamela Grimm, chair of EPC Office of Curriculum Services

Therese Tillett began the orientation explaining the Educational Policies Council (EPC). The Educational Policies Council is a committee of Faculty Senate that was established in 1967. There was a prior curriculum council, but it had a different charge. The charge of the EPC is the conceptual long-range academic planning and overall curriculum planning for the university. It includes an Executive EPC and seven subcommittees. The EPC oversees the establishment, inactivation and revision of academic programs, courses and policies. Additionally, standards for admission and graduation of students, library policies and facilities, issues affecting undergraduate and graduate education, arbitration of interdepartmental and intercollegial curricular disputes and conformity of collegial and departmental curricular programs to university-wide policies. EPC is the final approving or notifying body for the university and the gateway between academic colleges and the university-wide and external approving bodies.

EPC meets at 3:20pm, typically, on the third Monday of each month except for June and July. This year December will be included. Members receive the schedule in the spring. Outlook invitations are sent to members. Guests are more than welcome to join via the link posted on the EPC website. Agendas are sent out a week before the meeting. Membership includes a chair, secretary (Curriculum services), Provost Office senior administrator, two college deans, two Faculty Senate members, two full-time faculty members from each of the 11 degree-granting colleges, one undergraduate student and one graduate student. The Executive EPC membership comes from the EPC. Exec includes the chair, secretary, Provost Office senior administrator, two Faculty Senate members and two full-time faculty members.

All EPC members have voting privileges. The chair votes to break a tie and the secretary does not have a vote. A quorum is a simple majority and there is no voting by proxy. If a member cannot attend a meeting, let Therese know, read the agenda, submit any questions or comments and the secretary will ensure they are given to the full body. If a member misses three consecutive meetings, the member should let Therese know.

To prepare, members should review the materials prior to meeting. Proposals should align with the mission and goals of Kent State, support student success and enhance and contribute to the reputation and integrity of a KSU education. Members serve as a participating member and are responsible for contributing to the overall benefit of the students and the university. Proposals are expected to be discussed with colleagues to understand different perspectives and opinions. Members should have a basic understanding of Kent State's curriculum and academic policies. The policies can be viewed on the Curriculum Services website along with deadlines, archives, guidelines, training and EPC subcommittee sign-up.

EPC agenda items include action items, discussion items, information items and lesser action items. Action items are voted on and members can call for discussion items or lesser action items to be voted on. Lesser action items are not discussed unless a member requests a discussion. The expectations for the members are to review the items under action, discussion and information and to read the lesser items. Curriculum Services reviews every proposal individually before they are put on the agenda.

Jennifer S. Kellogg gave an overview of the agenda, the links included and how to read a CIM proposal. The agenda includes a link to join the meeting, *have a question about a proposal* form button, *view submitted questions* and view links to review proposals in CIM. Members can see the submitted questions at the bottom of the agenda. More questions can be submitted during the meeting as well.

Chair Pamela E. Grimm and Provost Melody J. Tankersley explained that the EPC is curriculum coming to life, asking questions, aligning and co-existing with other degree programs and working with other academic units in creating curriculum.

B. Development of an Equity Decision Making Tool for EPC policy subcommittees N.J. Akbar, associate vice president, Division of Diversity, Equity and Exclusion

Associate VP, N.J. Akbar, stated that the equity decision-making tool is one he hopes that everyone will consider using when making decisions that impact students, faculty and staff. The tool began with the DEEDS workgroup which focuses on diverse student success. Their desire was to use a decision-making tool with making academic policy related decisions that impact students. Contributors were Dr. Tina Bhargarva who helped in the design and research, Dr. Amoaba Gooden who provided consultation on resources and UDAC who reviewed the draft and provided feedback. The workgroup reviewed various equity-minded decision-making tools across different industries. A goal of the decision-making tool is to recognize biases and identify barriers. The uses of the tool are to think through how to make policy prior to the development, determining procedures ensuring assumptions are understood, ensuring all voices and experiences are considered, academic and student engagement and bracketing bias and barriers. The tool has been in development for a year. The workgroup is creating a training that will review decision making and bias, understanding terms and language, understanding the tool and an in-practice exercises. Training will begin October 1st.

An EPC member asked what the timeline will be for the final version and disseminated for use.

N.J. said they are hoping to have it finalized by the end September. They are waiting on one outstanding partner review and Dr. Gooden's final approval.

Chair Grimm asked if the tool was primarily to be applied to policies effecting students.

N.J. replied that the tool is to be applied to policies, academic programs and procedures.

Associate Provost, Manfred H. van Dulmen, asked who has approved the tool thus far.

N.J. stated that it has not been approved by anyone at this moment, but UDAC and DEEDs have worked on it. The tool will have final approval by Dr. Gooden.

Associate Provost van Dulmen suggested follow up meetings with other bodies that the tool will have implications.

III. Subcommittee Reports
A. Transfer Credit Committee

Edward Dauterich and Joanna Liedel, co-chairs

Co-chair, Joanna Liedel, stated that the charge of the Transfer Credit Committee is to review university-wide transfer policies and procedures, review credit requests for alternative learning credentials and applicability to college programs and/or university requirements through consultation with and approval from faculty effected by this credentialing towards their program and recommend new and revise policies on the transfer of credits and the awarding of Kent State credits/courses for special examinations and alternative learning credentials with an approval from faculty who apply those credit hours to their programs. The committee is not making any decisions on how courses transfer in and towards a specific department if they are equivalent to Kent State courses. That is the purview of the faculty and the content matter experts. The committee is looking to create a broad-based framework of what it means to bring in and give credit at Kent State. There are a lot more alternative ways of getting credit, such as new testing, ap credit and clep. The committee decides if the new testing can be accepted by Kent State on broad terms and then turns it over to faculty for review. The committee works closely with the credit transfer office. Learning is taking place in a lot of non-traditional ways. There are 18 committee members that are comprised of faculty, staff and two students. The committee is reviewing awarding general elective credit for CTAG (career and technical assurance guide). This is coursework taken in high school that is deemed to be college-level coursework by a faculty panel at the state level as well as KSU faculty. Another item under review is awarding of credit that comes on ACE transcripts. This includes Joint Service Transcript (military credit). Finally, the committee will be reviewing the alternative credit policy. It is needing updating and broader-based discussions about what is alternative learning, credentials coming from institutions that are not higher ed (i.e., IT certificates) and any recommendations will be sent to EPC for a vote in the form of a proposal. Anyone who would like to serve on the committee should let Joanna know.

B. Undergraduate Policies Council Charity Miller and E. Sue Wamsley, co-chairs

Co-chair Sue Wamsley stated that the policies the council will be discussing are automatically applying for graduation, academic forgiveness, pass/fail and leave of absence. The two priority policies to review will be academic forgiveness and automatically applying for graduation. The council will be reviewing both policies simultaneously. Co-chair Charity Miller said there are 25 members. Three are students that represent the Stark, Salem, Geauga and Kent campuses. The EPC Ad Hoc, which was the prior Undergraduate Policies Council (UPC), set the philosophy. UPC reviewed the philosophy and made revisions to reflect some additional important details related to reviewing policy and how it impacts students. The philosophy states that UPC will ensure a policy that is:

- 1. Upholding equity, integrity, quality and standards of a Kent State education
- 2. Aligned with the university's strategic priority of "Students First"
- 3. Consistent across all programs, colleges, and campuses for all students to the greatest extent possible.

The UPC has a list of 15 potential policies to review. The decision for choosing the policies to begin work were, because of biggest student impact and previous work already complete. The UPC will conduct another survey to faculty, advisors and other impacted groups regarding academic forgiveness. The council felt that since the data was collected a while ago and things

can/have changed, there was a need for updated feedback. When the equity training is approved, they hope to have N.J. come and talk to the council.

C. University Requirements Curriculum Committee Alison Smith, co-chair

Co-chair Alison Smith stated that URCC finished the pilot study, relative to the Kent Core, of the Association of American Colleges and Universities (AACU) rubrics that Faculty Senate had approved for the future use of the Kent Core. URCC developed a pilot study choosing two rubrics—critical thinking and communication. They worked with 15 faculty from seven colleges across Kent and Stark campuses who provided 200 assessment pieces from 14—40000 level courses. They were all compiled, sorted and uploaded to AACU. AACU will follow the assessment process and send back results in October. The URCC reviews Kent Core, Writing Intensive Courses, ELR or Diversity revisions, new courses or inactivated courses.

IV. Information Item

A. Establishment of an EPC subcommittee on student academic progress for financial aid eligibility

Pamela Grimm, chair of EPC

Manfred van Dulmen, associate provost for academic affairs

Chair Grimm explained that a copy of the charge will be sent out to members once the draft has been completed. Brenda Burke has been asked to take on the role of chair. Chair Grimm and Associate Provost van Dulmen are working with Brenda to obtain members for the committee.

V. Program Proposals Review

A. Action Item

I. Emerging Media and Technology - M.S.: Establishment of a new degree program to replace the Master of Digital Sciences degree (fall 2022 pending final approvals)

School Director Michael Beam stated that the interdisciplinary group met in 2019 to discuss an update of the School of Digital Sciences undergraduate and graduate programs. After the finalization of the B.S. program that launched in fall, attention was turned to the Master of Digital Science program. Research showed that the name *Digital Science* did not translate very well for employers, students and other academic institutions. It was a name unique to Kent State. The name of the school was changed to *Emerging Media and Technology*. The Master of Digital Sciences (MDS) is being replaced by the Master of Emerging Media and Technology (MEMAT). The same principals will be implemented from the MDS program. The PDP was presented last fall to EPC where members asked a lot of questions regarding the interdisciplinary job market. The follow-up research found the interdisciplinary CIP code in Human Computer Interaction. Job data was pulled from BLS using the CIP code. The MEMAT is ideal for undergraduate students who come from a specific field and want to bolster their interdisciplinary knowledge with a strong set of technology and interdisciplinary project skills, work in interdisciplinary groups and research or go onto doctoral programs. The program consists of three new courses along with courses from the MDS program that cover the foundations, theories and methods. Students will build an interdisciplinary program plan with faculty oversight. Students are asked, in the foundation of EMAT course, to work with their advisor build a program of study with courses from across Kent State in five-interdisciplinary areas: data analytics and coding, social sciences, applied communication and information strategy, applied

creative technology and training and development technology. The program was reviewed by chairs, directors, graduate coordinators from several different interdisciplinary partner units across campus. Those units include:

- Department of Computer science
- Department of Sociology
- College of Arts and Sciences
- School of Teaching, Learning and Curriculum Studies
- Center for educational technology
- Department of Management and Information Systems
- College of Aeronautics and Engineering
- School of Communication Studies
- School of Media and Journalism
- School of Information
- School of Visual Communication Design

The proposal includes letters of support from the units.

Executive EPC Committee Member Proposal Questions

- 1. How does the curriculum support the job titles listed in the labor market demand section of the proposal (e.g., sociologist, HR manager, video game designer)?
- A: Dr. Tang explained that students are prepared for jobs in multiple fields. The Human Computer Interaction CIP code links this degree to at least 20 traditional job titles. Due to the interdisciplinary nature of the degree, students are likely to get new career opportunities.
- 2. What experience/skills/knowledge will students earn with this program that they won't receive from a master's program in their discipline (e.g., public health)?
- A: Dr. Gandolfi said that this degree will help provide the needed skills and knowledge. Students will receive interdisciplinary and collaborative mindset.
- 3. Did the college verify that the new courses are not duplicating existing courses? A: Director Beam stated that this program spends about half of its coursework in interdisciplinary units. EMAT met with other units to describe their course of study and ensure there was no duplication and hear about what courses, based on the core and goals, those units had to bolster and add-on to the program. Slight changes were made based on discussions. The program provides what students will need in theory, background and methods.

With no questions or comments, Dean Mark S. Mistur motioned to approve, and Professor Gabriella Jakli seconded.

With no further comments or questions, Chair Pamela E. Grimm closed the meeting at 4:37pm.

Chair Pamela E. Grimm called the meeting to order at 3:20p.m., on Monday, 15 November 2021, via Microsoft Teams.

I. Approval of Minutes

A. Meeting on 20 September 2021

Professor Edward Dauterich moved to approve the minutes and Associate Professor Brian R. Barber seconded.

No questions, comments or corrections were requested. The item passed unanimously.

II. Presentations

A. Resubmission plan for all Ohio Transfer 36 courses Joanna Liedel, director of academic partnerships

Ashley Maher, assistant director of academic partnerships

Ashley stated that their office is a part of enrollment management, operations and administration. They primarily formalize domestic academic partnerships and ensure they remain up-to-date, year-to-year when curriculum changes at both institutions. The office works with a lot of different offices and with partner institutions. They oversee compliance with state-level transfer initiatives which include TAG, OGPT and OTM (now OT36). Last year, ODHE published the Ohio Transfer Promise which was signed by all Presidents and Provosts of the Ohio public institutions. This promise reaffirms the commitment to all Ohio's transfer policies. OT36 used to be known as OTM or Ohio Transfer Module. The total number of credit hours and the total structure of the OT36 (aka OTM) has not changed. The 24-hour minimums have remained intact with an additional 12 elective hours. ODHE has provided a lot more clarity around options for those completing the OT36 and then transferring to an institution. This is related to the Ohio Guaranteed Transfer Pathways and the Transfer Assurance Guide Courses. Those require greater course alignment among our institutions. Additionally, the OTM has been rebranded to the OT36 and the OTM grids housed on ODHE's website are now in a webpage format. There are two additional pieces that we require the assistance of our faculty. They are currently working on this process to resubmit OTM courses, so they align to the new OT36 learning outcomes as well as submission of DEI courses within the OT36.

Ashley said the most time-sensitive piece is the re-review of our OTM/OT36. The majority of our courses and courses across the state were last reviewed for the OTM in 2008. E-mails were sent to the course reviewers in early September. All recipients have sent confirmation and are currently working on the resubmission. Each course submission includes two templates and the relevant attachments. The first template is the course inventory template. That is information coming from the syllabus. The second template is where the majority of the submission work takes place. Faculty with review the course learning outcomes on the template which have been created by a panel of faculty representatives from across the state. Faculty will be required to illustrate how the learning outcomes are being met through those course assessments, assignments and any other learning activities in the course. Also, it must include a working syllabus and any other supporting documentation which may be assignment descriptions, rubrics or any other items that can help illustrate how the learning outcomes are being met. The state has included an area for diversity, equity and inclusion (DEI). This was identified as a commonality within all the Ohio public institutions. OT36 courses that are designated as domestic diversity or global diversity courses are strongly recommended to be submitted for the OT36 DEI category. This is a separate submission process and form. Faculty can choose to dually submit the course for their OT36 academic discipline and for DEI or they can choose to submit the course for DEI at a later semester. Ashley said their office has been holding working sessions throughout the semester that the submitters can choose to attend for submission guidance. After all the courses have been submitted, ODHE and the faculty panels will review the courses. The approvals or requests for revision will be sent back to KSU around April 15th-May 15th.

III. Subcommittee Reports

A. Fiscal Impact Statement Review Committee Eric Mintz and Dirk Remley, co-chairs

Eric stated that the fiscal impact statement is a form submitted with any type of degree change or proposal. What the subcommittee has been reviewing is how to take the information that is on the form, which is required by the state, and make it more uniformly applied across proposals from different units and colleges. Part of this is trying to understand how all the different audiences that review the form value certain parts. Eric and Dirk have talked to chairs and directors and academic leadership group. Eric and Dirk have constructed a survey that they are going to distribute to different groups on how they value and use the form. They have met with Mike Johnson from the budget office and Wayne Schneider from institutional research to get their perspectives. They are going to help the committee with a formula for estimating program revenue that will make it more consistently applied across all the different units. Quite a bit of variation has been found in how people are filling out the revenue portion of the form. There is not so much problem with the form, but with the fact that there is no documentation on how to fill out the form. After the minor adjustments have been made to the form, the subcommittee's focus will be on instructions on documentation and how to fill out the form. When the forms are submitted, they will all be filled out in the same way.

Chair Pamela E. Grimm asked if there is a standard place or resource where the information for the form comes from?

Eric said that the basics of the form are that the programs are required to estimate what enrollment is going to look like. From that, revenue and cost get estimated. Most of what is on the form is actually required by the state. We cannot alter the form too much. There is some extra stuff Kent State has put on there in response to feedback over many years. The form is often filled out as revenue from new students, but really it is from students moving to a different degree within the university. The interest mainly lies in marginal and revenue changes shown on the form. That will have to be changed on the form in terms of how it is calculated.

Chair Grimm asked if there is a place where departments are getting demand estimates and is there help provided somewhere to determine what is primary demand versus marginal demand for the program?

Eric said that there is not a place for demand estimates. One of the things they hope to include in the documentation is some comment on best practices and where to go for that information. There are a couple of subcommittee members who are reviewing a lot of past fiscal impact statements to look at how far off are departments when they do this. It is not as bad as it was thought to be. It is important that the college budget officers sign off or for them to review the form to ensure consistency in the process.

An EPC member asked that some of the discrepancy in revenue estimates comes from basing it on enrollment instead of seated students. Does this form account for enrollment in particular classes which might be distributed over multiple units or enrollment?

Eric said that is a problem and they have the dueling priorities of accuracy and complexity. The way that has been discussed is to make the form provide a simple estimate of the total cost and the total revenue from the university perspective. There will be a question that asks whether or not this proposal is going to have financial impacts on units other than the one that is making the proposal. We do not have a process for revenue estimates that span multiple units.

An EPC member asked if it would impact them on the expense and revenue side?

Eric replied, yes.

B. Graduate Policies Council

Brian Barber and Sean Broghammer, co-chairs

Brian stated that graduate policies council has met three times and only had an opportunity to work together twice. The subcommittee has re-established a philosophy statement that is more appropriate for the graduate policies council. They have identified 13 priority graduate-level policies to focus on over the course of this year and next. Three have been chosen to work on for this semester. Drafts will be created, reviewed and submitted to EPC for approval. Specifics of those policies are student grievances, leave of absence and leave of absence—pregnancy and parenting. The subgroups of the council have been working on those three areas and so far, have made great headway in research and looking at existing policies within the university and other universities. Most of the subgroups are in the research phase. The pregnancy and parenting subgroup have moved forward to initiate a draft. All of the subgroups will be working throughout the semester to finalize their drafts.

C. Internationalization Advisory Committee Sarah Malcolm and Marianne Martens, co-chairs

Sarah said that the subcommittee has met four times starting last spring until now. The first three meetings were used for learning to help committee members to understand some of the major international partnerships processes, terminology and other general things going on in the office of global education. The last meeting was used to separate into three working groups. The groups consist of curriculum review, identifying strategic partnerships and opportunities and proposal and review process.

Valerie Reed stated that the curriculum review group just started discussing the process for some of the larger or more complex international partnerships that are typically 2 + 2. The subgroup is looking to standardize the process rather than taking an ad hoc approach. They have discussed going through each college's curriculum committee or establishing other points of contact within the colleges.

Marianne said that identifying strategic partnerships subgroup is looking for better ways to disseminate information around the university about partnership available opportunities.

Sarah explained that the proposal and review process was for faculty and staff who wish to create an international partnership. There is currently a paper process that must be signed by a school director or department chair and the dean. The subgroup is reviewing the process and seeing if what is being requested is still relevant and if anything needs changed. They would like it to be

an online process so that people do not have to worry about the paper forms anymore. The subgroup is only looking at the review process for when it is time to renew the process. This will include establishing criteria that should be evaluated to determine if a partnership should be renewed or discontinued.

IV. Structure Proposals Review

A. Information Item

College of Business Administration

1. College of Business Administration—Renaming the college to College Business and Entrepreneurship; approved by Executive EPC on 29 September 2021 Chair Grimm stated that there was a request for this name change to be expedited. The Executive EPC was meeting prior to the Faculty Senate meeting and was able to review and forward a recommendation onto Faculty Senate Exec and the main Faculty Senate meeting.

V. Program Proposals Review

A. Action Items

College of the Arts

1. Acting-Intended for the Returning Professional – M.F.A.—Renaming the major to Acting per accreditor's approval (fall 2022)

School Director Eric van Baars explained that a new name was submitted when the program was previously revised two years ago. The current name was suggested by the National Accreditation Staff Members and was prior to the commissions meeting last spring. Upon final review, the commission decided to not recommend the current name. Due to the timeline, we submitted this ahead of time anticipating it would be submitted. The commission NAST is fine with supporting the use of the intended returning professional as a descriptor, but not as the official program title. This change is conform the name of the program with the national accreditation bodies' most recent review of the program per recommendation from the program's accreditation body. The "intended for the returning professional" is a clause we can still use as a clarifier, but not as the official title of the degree.

Associate Lecturer Shelley K. Marshall moved to approve the item, and Professor Edward Dauterich seconded.

With no questions, comments or concerns, the item passed unanimously.

College of Arts and Sciences

2. Department of Computer Science: Game Programming-Minor—Establishing 20-credit undergraduate minor (fall 2022)

Therese stated that Computer Science worked with CATS which offers a similar minor called "Game Design." They also put something into their program description that shows the difference between the Game Programming minor and the Game Design minor. Curriculum Services will be asking CATS to do the same with their Game Design minor.

Associate Professor Vanessa J. Earp moved to approve the item, and Associate Lecturer Shelley K. Marshall seconded the motion.

Without any questions, comments or concerns, the item passed unanimously.

B. Discussion Items

College of Applied and Technical Studies

1. Respiratory Therapy Technology- A.A.S.: Revising program delivery from inperson to hybrid online/in-person and adding a new location at the Cleveland Clinic (fall 2022)

Chair Grimm stated that this program is going from a fully in-person to a hybrid delivery. This was motivated by the addition of the Cleveland Clinic as a new location for the program.

Academic Program Director Yvonne George followed that this is in relation to the demand for new respiratory therapists. There is a big shortage in the field and hospitals are scrambling to try to fill those openings. The nursing department was approached by the Cleveland Clinic. They are hoping to promote this program to their current staff who are looking to change their career and to the surrounding community. They are working with Cleveland Public Schools to try to recruit more students into health careers and they have created an office for that.

Chair Grimm asked if the Cleveland Clinic would be reimbursing or partially reimbursing students enrolling in the program?

Yvonne responded that the Cleveland Clinic is working with a funder to provide tuition for students. She is unsure if that is finalized yet.

With no further questions, comments or concerns, the item passed unanimously.

College of Communication and information

2. School of Communication Studies: Communication Studies – B.A.— Revising program delivery from in-person to in-person and fully online for the Communication Studies—General concentration (fall 2022)

Therese asked if students who declare the applied communication concentration, can their program be a hybrid (i.e.—more than 50% online)?

School Director Paul Haridakis said they wanted to do this with the general concentration as it is the most flexible. Students can take any electives that they want. Students in applied communication can take courses online as well. However, it is not anticipated to be part of this. The program is still, primarily, on-ground. This change was seeing that many of the regional campus students were regionally bound. They were not coming to Kent State to finish the associates. This also allows students from other universities to take these classes who are also geographically bound as they have been added to the OTM. He said it could be something they could do in the future to add the applied communication concentration.

Therese asked if coming fall 2022, could the school add the applied communication concentration as a hybrid or mostly online?

Paul replied that they could.

Therese asked if Curriculum Services could amend the proposal before sending it to the state to add the applied communication concentration as hybrid?

Paul said applied communication could be added as fully online if there is time to do that.

An EPC member asked if the school would need the courses setup to be able to be taught in-person, hybrid and fully online?

Therese explained that all the requirements must be offered online. All of the courses do not have to be offered online, but there must be enough for a choice. This would give students the ability to complete all their requirements online.

Chair Grimm asked if the hybrid program implies that it is primarily online with some in-person components.

Therese replied, yes. More than 50% can be taken online.

College of Education, Health and Human Services

3. School of Teaching, Learning and Curriculum Studies: Sport, Exercise and Performance Psychology – B.S.— Initial inquiry to establish a new degree program; full proposal will come to EPC for a vote at a later date Program Coordinator Insook Kim stated that this program will be a 4-year, online program with 120-credits to graduate. The primary targeted students are part- and full-time students interested in exercise, coaching and sports exercise psychology.

No questions, comments or concerns were raised. A question and answer document is included on the agenda.

With no further comments or questions, Chair Pamela E. Grimm closed the meeting at 4:30pm.

Chair Pamela E. Grimm called the meeting to order at 3:20p.m., on Monday, 15 November 2021, via Microsoft Teams.

I. Approval of Minutes

A. Meeting on 18 October 2021

Professor Edward Dauterich motioned to approve, and Professor Denise McEnroe-Petitte seconded the motion.

With no questions, comments or concerns, the item passed unanimously.

II. Subcommittee Reports

A. Undergraduate Policies Council

Charity Miller and Sue Wamsley, co-chairs

Due to technical difficulties, Sue and Charity will present at another meeting.

B. Transfer Credit Committee

Edward Dauterich and Joanna Liedel, co-chairs

Joanna stated that they submitted changes to the alternative credit policy and will be presenting at next month's EPC. The changes come from updates to state initiatives and standards and small language adjustments for refresh. There are non-catalog policy issues that arose during the meetings. The transfer credit committee will be bringing a handbook to EPC for those issues.

Ed explained that the committee would like to create a set of guidelines/philosophy for the group when looking at credit transfer or other related things. The guidelines would include why are we doing this, how are we paying attention to equity and inclusion, etcetera. It is currently being developed by the committee.

Therese asked where they see the guidelines being located for faculty and staff.

Joanna said once they are created, that is something the committee would like to decide with EPC.

III. Structure Proposals Review

A. Action Item

College of Arts and Sciences

1. Department of Geology: Renaming unit to Department of Earth Sciences

Chair Grimm explained that the renaming is to remain consistent with national trends.

With no questions, comments or concerns, the item passed unanimously.

IV. Policy Proposals Review

A. Lesser Action Item

College of Applied and Technical Studies

1. Retroactive Credit – Adding IT 12000 to the list for retroactive credit for students who complete IT 21010 with minimum C grade

Chair Pamela E. Grimm asked what decides if something is retroactive credit if a student has achieved in a course level above or taken a test.

Therese explained that is depends on what the student wants to do. It is what pathway makes the most sense for the student.

Associate Lecturer Shelley K. Marshall said that the experience in IT is that many of the students are already working full-time in IT. It does not make sense for them to take entry level coursework. The next level up allows them to show what they know, but also build upon their baseline skills. It gives them the opportunity to take a couple of credits out of their degree, but still getting the learning outcomes to keep the integrity of the degree.

IV. Program Proposals Review

A. Action Item

College of Education, Health and Human Services School of Teaching, Learning and Curriculum Studies

1. Sport, Exercise and Performance Psychology: Establish undergraduate major (fall 2022 pending final approvals)

Associate Professor Insook Kim stated that it is a 4-year program starting fall 2022 with 120-credit-hours for completion of the program. This major prepares students with psychology aspects of sports performance and athletic practice to work in a wide range of sports related field. These include coaching, conditioning, sports specialist or sports performance consultant. Students can continue their education in a master's program or certification. The research for this program began with looking at existing, online undergraduate programs both nationally and regionally. The recent Eduventures data said there are only two similar programs in the nation. The degree is showing promise and consistently increase in enrollment in this area nationally and regionally. The labor market research was also reviewed using Burning Glass Technologies. It showed a growth of job postings in the last 10 years. The labor market shows that it accepts a bachelor's degree with a master's degree preferred. The proposal shows a possible pathway to the master's as well as minimally preparing students for the master's at Kent State University. Giving the growing demands and challenges in university enrollment, there is a clear need for more creative and flexible programs that would meet the demographics without compromising educational quality and rigor. For high quality distance learning, they will closely work with two staff members from EHHS. The current two faculty members will be sufficient for the first two years. Additionally, an interdisciplinary curriculum will be offered. Existing faculty members that teach major or non-major courses from other programs will support the 78-credits. Approval was granted from all programs to use their courses for this major. With growth, they will use staff support and hire more faculty members.

With no questions, comments or concerns, the item passed unanimously.

B. Lesser Action Item

College of Arts and Sciences

Department of Biological Sciences and Department of Psychological Sciences

9. Neuroscience-B.S.—Establishing 40-credit-hour optional concentration, Pre-Medicine/Pre-Podiatry; revising learning outcomes and course requirements (*fall 2022*)
Associate Professor Wilson C. Chung explained that the major does not have a home department, but is within the College of Arts and Sciences. Three years ago, discussion began about a neuroscience major. There are currently 87 students. The last three years, they have encountered multiple students who are telling the faculty that teach the neuroscience courses that they are going on to medical school. The students are focused on getting into medical school. The current barrier is that they do not have any guidelines, in the form of GPS, on how to get into medical schools and which kind of courses to take. To remove this barrier, College of Arts and Sciences created a pre-med concentration for neuroscience. This will remove the issues with enrollment, which courses to take and any other anxieties. Additionally, the students a roadmap to follow to be prepared for medical school. The motivation is to help the students be more successful by providing them with a

clear pathway to medical school and get the career options they want. Students who take the pre-med track will be able to find work somewhere else, such as research or food scientist or academic educator. At the bachelor's level, students who take neuroscience with the pre-med concentration will be able to go into pharmaceutical sales, medical technician, science writer, health educator and forensic science technician. Students will be well-versed in neuroscience. They will have, at least, a year of core neuroscience course and four to five additional elective courses with neuroscience focus. That is almost two years of neuroscience preparation in addition with chemistry, physics and microbiology.

Therese asked if there will be a difference in learning outcomes for those in the concentration and those not in the concentration.

Associate Professor Chung replied, yes. The concentration adheres to the 50% minimum of the overall curriculum. It will not surpass that number. The neuroscience pre-med curriculum is not different from the biology or psychology pre-med curriculum. That is what the concentration was based on. The pre-med student's goal is to go into medicine. Neuroscience student's goal is to go towards neurology and psychiatry medical school. It will fit their needs with the concentration.

Chair Grimm asked what differentiates the neuroscience pre-med from the other pre-med programs.

Associate Professor Chung said that the students will be neuroscientists with a focus of becoming a doctor. They are training neuroscientists and the pre-med helps the students get into medical school.

Therese stated that the curriculum prepares the students to go into another program. She she asked what happens with students who graduate from the program in the pre-med concentration and they either do not go or cannot get into medical school. Do the students have all the outcomes, knowledge and content to become a neuroscientist?

Associate Professor Chung replied, yes. Students will be very well prepared.

Therese asked if other students in the program have the same curriculum.

Associate Professor Chung said, no. Not all students want to go to medical school. This program is designed to help students who want to go to medical school with a focus on neuroscience. The student's targets and goals are different, but they all will be neuroscientists. If students in the pre-med program decide for whatever reason they do not want to go to medical school, they can switch over to become a neuroscience researcher or any other related job.

Therese asked if there is anything that a student taking the pre-med concentration would not be able to do in comparison with a student not in pre-med.

Associate Professor Chung explained that students not in the pre-med concentration will be

able have all the same job opportunities as a student in the pre-med concentration. The students not in pre-med will be less prepared for medical school.

Chair Grimm asked about the mix of upper and lower division classes.

Associate Professor Chung confirmed that there are a mix. The upper division are more difficult. The students take a lot of research credit. The pre-med students need to be prepared to take the MCAT. If the students do not do well on the MCAT, they will not get into medical school causing a huge barrier. Another reason for creating this concentration is that the students are already preparing for medical school. Not all students are choosing path, but many want to go to medical school.

Chair Grimm asked if Therese if she was asking about consideration of a pre-med minor.

Therese said that the Arts and Sciences has so many pre-med concentrations, she had asked if it is beneficial to have another pre-med concentration.

Associate Dean Dee Warren said that they have been looking at this. A meeting has been setup with advisors to discuss pre-med concentrations. There is not a pre-med major. The concentrations are courses that medical schools have identified as being skills that students need to be successful for entrance into medical school and continued success.

Associate Lecturer Shelley K. Marshall asked if this is to meet current or new student needs.

Associate Professor Chung explained that he foresees both happening. This creates a concentration for the current students and is attractive for new students. The program has grown quite a bit and hoping to grow from 87 students to over 100 next year. One of the tools is to create diversity in education.

V. Closing comments

Chair Grimm suggested using CIM to address any issues with encroachment. She said many times, it is that a department chair is not aware of the fine details within another department's curricula and not understanding ways encroachment might happen.

Associate Professor Rowan explained that Geology consulted with Geography during the summer to have enough time to prepare the proposal. More consultation took place at the beginning of the semester after the go-ahead from Geography.

With no further comments or questions, Chair Pamela E. Grimm closed the meeting at 3:45pm.

Chair Pamela E. Grimm called the meeting to order at 3:20p.m., on Monday, 6 December 2021, via Microsoft Teams.

I. Approval of Minutes

A. Meeting on 15 November 2021

Associate Lecturer Shelley K. Marshall moved to approve, and Professor Edward Dauterich seconded the motion.

Without questions or comments, the item passed unanimously.

II. Subcommittee Reports

A. Ad Hoc Academic Standard Subcommittee—Brenda Burke, chair

Brenda stated that after reviewing the financial aid progress standards, there was some inconsistent information across university sites (catalog, academic sites, registrar's office and financial aid). This includes information about what it means for student to be matriculating in their program successfully towards a degree in a timely manner. After conversations with people

across the university, it was sent to Provost Tankersley to get a sub-charge for the committee to review academic standards for students matriculating towards a degree. The charge for the committee is to review the standards and how the information is given to students on matriculating towards degree completion—i.e., university catalog, college websites, materials and financial aid websites. The goal is to ensure that the information is consistent across all channels. The subcommittee will be making a recommendation on what those standards and process should be, a process for going forward for information to be updated, a communication strategy to be shared with the campus partners—i.e., students, faculty and staff and when it will be put into effect. Updates will be provided to EPC and the Provost as the committee works. The committee will begin review in January.

B. Undergraduate Policies Council—Charity Miller and Sue Wamsley, co-chairs

Sue stated that the current Academic Forgiveness policy removes all grades C- and below. In terms of honors and students applying for graduate school, all grades show on the transcript. The purpose of revising Academic Forgiveness is to give an alternative to the Course Repeat policy. Students may have changed their major and do not need to repeat the course or course elective. Academic Forgiveness allows for students to make progress toward degree completion. Another reason the policy is being reviewed is to make it clearer and more understandable. It provides a flexibility for unforeseen circumstances.

The committee is working on reviewing the current parameters that require students to be away for a year, not have a current degree, complete 12-24 graded credit hours with a minimum of 3.0 GPA, all C- grades and below removed and only use the policy once.

Chair Grimm asked how common it is for students to use academic forgiveness.

Therese said that, prior to the pandemic, there were approximately 700 students within 10 years with average 70 a year.

Chair Grimm asked if the committee expected a large increase in requests with the policy change.

Sue replied that it has not been discussed yet. Students who were not able to take advantage of it prior now would be able. She does not believe there would be a large increase.

Charity added that it is hard to say for sure, but it would allow for more students to use the policy.

Charity stated that the other policy being review is the Auto-Applying for Graduation. The motivation of the review is to get more students graduated in a timely manner. The data showed that there were 167 students that should have been cleared and applied for graduation but did not. Another task is to ensure awarded aid is being done appropriately for students who have completed their degrees and ensure that the information is reported accurately to ODHE. Currently, a subgroup from the subcommittee is reviewing the auto-awarding process. This includes IT and a group of representation from all college campuses. A template was created to look at the current timeline of graduation and what it looks like now. The subgroup will be

working on defining the problem and look at the current process issues and auto-awarding. Additionally, the subgroup will be getting student feedback. The metrics of the process will also be reviewed to see if there are any issues. The committee will either create a proposal with the solution being auto-award graduation or identifying steps that would improve the process without auto-awarding.

C. Academic Calendar Advisory Committee—Deborah Knapp and Therese Tillett, co-chairs Therese stated that the committee has been working on understanding the semester structure—i.e., instructional days, breaks and holidays. The work includes comparing structure to Ohio and benchmark universities and ensuring compliance. Currently, the committee is reviewing the start day of the fall semester and if a Thursday start is still working. Additionally, the committee is reviewing spring break and when it is scheduled. The goal is to give recommendations in January. There are many different bodies to go to for feedback include the academic leadership group, chairs and directors, advising, student services, residence services, student affairs, etcetera. The proposal will go to EPC, Faculty Senate, Provost and President for final approval. The goal is to have the calendar reviewed and approved by May.

Chair Grimm suggested including Faculty Senate or Faculty Senate Exec in feedback.

An EPC member stated that the spring break is very late in the semester and students could use a day off in February.

Therese explained that the committee has to work with a tight semester schedule ensuring no instructional days are lost, but that an earlier spring break would be beneficial.

An EPC member said it was difficult for fall classes on Thursday's with how many days off there were.

III. Policy Proposals Review

A. Action Items

Transfer Credit Committee

- 1. Advanced Placement (AP): Revise policy to align with current practices (fall 2022)
- 2. College Level Examination Program (CLEP): Revise policy to align with state mandates on what scores are accepted (*fall 2022*)
- 3. College Tech Prep (CTP): Revise policy to align with state changes that expanded the timeframe for students to request credit from coursework they took in an approved tech prep program (fall 2022)
- 4. Correspondence: Inactivate the policy as it is unnecessary and antiquated (fall 2022)
- 5. Industry-Recognized Certifications and Examinations: Revise policy to include professional training; rename policy to Industry-Recognized Certifications, Examinations and Professional Training (fall 2022)

6. Military Training: Revise policy to remove "advanced standing credit" to avoid confusion with upper-division credit (fall 2022)

Joanna said that the alternative testing needed updated as the language was outdated. When rewriting these, the committee tried to remove specific scores of the policy and putting links to the guide where information is more consistently updated by KSU or the state. The state sets what the minimums must be, but KSU can give more.

Associate Lecturer Shelley K. Marshall expressed concern for a blanket statement that says that "if the credit is accepted by the Ohio Department of Higher Education, that it has been accepted."

Joanna explained that it is written so that it is okay to ask questions, but that credit is not necessarily going to be given. How credit is accepted is rapidly changing. KSU looks to ODHE as they are conservative in what they accept. The state of Ohio is coming out with ITAG (Industry Transfer Insurance Guide).

Ed added that faculty will get the final decision in determining credit given.

Professor Edward Dauterich moved to approve, and Assistant Professor Jo A. Dowell seconded.

Without further questions, the item passed unanimously.

IV. Program Proposals Review

1. Technical Modeling Design - A.A.S.: Revise delivery mode to be offered fully online in addition to existing in-person at Tuscarawas Campus; revise program requirements in the elective options (fall 2022)

Lori Bears said that the option of online delivery of the courses started in 2006. This was done, because of the desire from people outside of Tuscarawas that wanted to take the courses. They wanted students outside of the area to be able to enroll in this program. A lot of support was received from the industry. This will broaden interest and enrollment. Students may also easily transfer into the bachelor's degree after completing the associates in they desire.

An EPC member asked if there is a cost difference.

Therese said she checked with the bursar's office and courses not exclusive to the associate degree on regionals do get a DL fee. A student taking a gen ed course online through any campus would be charged the same amount.

Lori explained that there will still be courses offered on the campus, so that should help if students can take some courses on campus.

Associate Professor Vanessa J. Earp motioned to approve, and Associate Professor Gabriella Paar-Jakli seconded the motion.

Without any further questions, the item passed unanimously.

With no further comments or questions, Chair Pamela E. Grimm closed the meeting at 4:35pm.

Chair Pamela E. Grimm called the meeting to order at 3:20p.m., on Monday, 24 January 2022, via Microsoft Teams.

I. Approval of Minutes

A. Meeting on 6 December 2021

Assistant Professor Dowell made a motion to approve, and Associate Lecturer Marshall seconded the motion.

Without questions or comments, the item passed unanimously.

II. Academic Unit Proposal Review

A. Action Item

College of Arts and Sciences

Department of Sociology

1. Revise name to Department of Sociology and Criminology

III. Policy Proposal Review

Dean Warren stated that the proposal is changing the name of the Department of Sociology to the Department of Sociology and Criminology. The change is much more inclusive of the programs, faculty, faculty research and the students within the department. It will also be more apparent for students looking for criminology degrees.

Associate Professor McEnroe-Petitte motioned to approve, and Assistant Professor Eric S. Kildow seconded.

With no questions, the item passed unanimously.

A. Action Item

Office of Admissions

1. Admission of Graduate Students: Revise policy to align with policies at other Ohio public institutions, emphasize holistic review of applications and expand access to graduate programs

Interim VP of Enrollment, Lana Whitehead, explained that the changes are to update name changes from the division of graduate studies to the admissions office. The admission section has been adjusted slightly to align with other Ohio university's minimum GPA requirement of a 2.75. The transcript section required an official transcript from any institution where eight or more hours were attempted. This will be changed to degree conferral transcripts. The policy has been adjusted to a holistic review since so many programs are waving their GRE, GMAT requirement due to the pandemic. The policy also emphasizes we are an access institution and play an important role in making sure graduate programs are open to applicants who desire to pursue them. Statements have been added about holistic review and offer graduate assistantships to applicants that may not have had a great UG GPA, but have earned a graduate degree from an accredited institution. The graduate degree would make them eligible for regular admission, an assistantship or have earned nine or more graduate credits at Kent State with a 3.0 GPA. If a test score is required by the program, students have other options, such as:

- Scored in the 50%
- Earned a 3.0 overall GPA in their undergraduate major or courses related to the academic program to which the applicant has applied
- Earned a 3.0 overall GPA in the last 60 credit hours of complete undergraduate courses
- Other compelling evidence as determined by the academic program (i.e., outstanding performance in their field)

A statement was added about test scores not being required, but that graduate programs may require a score as part of its admissions criteria. Additional changes include cleaning up and updating language.

Therese asked what the effective date will be for the admission changes.

Lana stated that they would like it to begin and reflect in the catalog in spring 2023.

Therese stated that Curriculum Services would contact every graduate program area to ensure they want to change their minimum GPA from a 3.0 to a 2.75. Once they have agreed, the catalog will be updated.

Senior Associate Provost van Dulmen explained that the changes proposed reflect national trends. Kent's requirements are less flexible than some big 10 schools, so some students cannot be admitted unconditionally. This effects a number of applicants.

Professor Dauterich motioned to approve, and Associate Lecturer Marshall seconded the motion.

Dean Mistur asked if it is possible to admit students unconditionally and to change their plan of study to reflect the courses they need to better prepare for the program.

Lana said that the way conditionally admission is currently is to reflect the need to complete courses in this order. She believes it would be welcomed to admit the student unconditionally and add those courses to the plan of study. If it is a different circumstance where good academic performance is needing to be proved, the students should be admitted with a condition. That is a condition into the academic program and not just in their plan of study.

Senior Associate Provost van Dulmen added that this is where institutions like Ohio State have developed a bridge program where they can admit students fully into a program until they are ready to go into their program of study.

Chair Grimm asked if Kent is working on something like Ohio State's bridge program.

Senior Associate Provost van Dulmen said that is something that will be discussed.

An EPC member asked if there any other data driven reasons (relative to enrollment) that are in support of the change in GPA requirements from 3.0 to 2.75.

Lana explained that the individual colleges/programs were asked to review their predictive measures. Test scores were reviewed to see if they were predictive. The GPA requirement being among those things, there was no evidence suggesting that the 3.0 should be maintained. Also, they did not want to lose students to other institutions. They also wanted the ability to award the assistantships to students that would be exceptional in the program, but may not have had a good undergraduate career. There is a lot of evidence nationally that this is where academic programs are going to review students holistically. The restrictive measures were not necessarily predictors of success.

Without further questions, comments or concerns, the item passed unanimously.

IV. Program Proposal Review

A. Action Items

College of Education, Health and Human Services

School of Health Sciences

1. Speech Pathology and Audiology - Minor: Establish minor on Kent Campus

Associate Professor Burgess stated that the pathology and audiology fields are growing. The minor has six core courses. Students who complete the minor and are interested in pursuing a masters in speech pathology they would be well prepared. They would have two more classes to take to meet the prerequisites for graduate school. Two of the courses that are included in the

minor require students being admitted to the professional phase. For those to courses, the requirement would be waved.

Dean Mistur asked about prerequisites for the minor that students in other disciplines need for the minor.

Associate Professor Burgess said the stumbling block appears, because students cannot get practice as a speech pathologist unless they have a master's degree. They also cannot get a master's degree unless they have this core course curriculum in speech pathology and audiology. The minor that was proposed would not move them in the direction of the significant portion of the required course work. The department realizes it is a heavy minor and do not expect a ton of students to take it initially.

Associate Lecturer Marshall made a motion to approve, and Assistant Professor Dowell seconded.

With no further questions, comments or concerns, the item passed unanimously.

College of Public Health

1. Health Technologies and Informatics - Minor: Establish minor fully online and on Kent Campus

Professor Jefferis said that this was proposed in 2021, but was withdrawn to collaborate more with the regional campuses. They have gathered feedback from Dr. Shadduck, regional deans and faculty. The proposal was revised based on the feedback. The minor will be 100% online and available to all Kent State students. There is a need for health informatics entry workers in Ohio hospitals and they are hoping to address that. It is a 15-credit hour minor with existing courses. Public Health is collaborating with four other divisions—CCI, EHHS, EMAT and ATS.

Assistant Professor Gandolfi added that there are students with technology experience, but need the public health knowledge. Also, students with public health experience that need technology knowledge.

Professor Cheruvu motioned to approve the item, and Associate Lecturer Marshall seconded.

The item passed unanimously.

B. Discussion Items

College of Communication and Information School of Journalism and Media

1. Journalism Education - M.A.: Program development plan to establish new major

Director of the school, Emily Metzgar, stated that the proposal is to elevate a master's concentration into a standalone master's degree. This concentration has been offered for 14 years and helps teachers teach high school journalism and advising student media. This will be the only degree of its kind in the country. Confidence in American institutions continues to decline, but high school students still demonstrate interest. The current students in the minor are high school journalism teachers, English teachers, media advisers, media professionals and others.

Potential students are teachers with schools that have some kind of student media and professional journalists seeking to transition to teaching in a post-secondary space. The program is entirely online, so most of the students are not local. The learning outcomes are very specific to helping teachers apply information, understand professional ethical principles and standards, understand the contemporary media environment, advise about audience needs and interests and plan and implement research-based instruction. The department does not anticipate additional costs.

An EPC member asked if social media and privacy information was embedded in the program.

Emily explained that social media and privacy are part of all of the curriculum. There is a limited amount of security-based courses offered online, but they have worked to include related courses from across campus.

Therese asked if this concentration is replacing the Media and Journalism program.

Emily said yes, but they are planning to inactivate the current M.A. in Media and Journalism at the School of Media and Journalism. This degree will be one of the two that replaces it. The other one is a proposal that is being worked on with the School of Communication that is not quite ready. They are planning to combine the two M.A. programs. When that combination has been approved and propagated, then the Media and Journalism M.A. will be inactivated.

Chair Grimm asked if the faculty teaching in the current program would transition into the new program.

Emily said, yes.

V. Course Proposal Review

A. University Requirements Curriculum Committee – Action Items

Diversity—Global Requirement

- 1. ARTH 22020 Art of Africa, Oceania and the Americas
- 2. ARTH 22021 Art History: African Art

Dean Smith stated that URCC received from Art History the 22020 course for revision. It is a Global Diversity course and a Kent Core course. The proposal is to turn the course into "Art of Africa" only and keep it as diversity and Kent Core status. The reason for removing "Oceania and the Americas" is that it is an old school view of art history. Africa, Oceania and Americas art history must be taught separately due to the specifics of each. The number also needed to change to make it distinctive and keep it clear from a similar course in Africana Studies. The course remains as Global Diversity and Kent Core.

Professor Swoboda motioned to approve, and Assistant Professor Kildow seconded the motion.

Without any further questions, the item passed unanimously.

With no further comments or questions, Chair Pamela E. Grimm closed the meeting at 4:06pm.

Chair Pamela E. Grimm called the meeting to order at 3:20p.m., on Monday, 31 January 2022, via Microsoft Teams.

I. Approval of Minutes

A. Meeting on 24 January 2022

Associate Lecturer Marshall made a motion to approve, and Assistant Professor Dowell seconded the motion.

Without questions or comments, the item passed unanimously.

II. Academic Unit Proposal Review

A. Action Item

Division of Graduate Studies

1. Restructure and renaming of the Division of Graduate Studies - New name is the Graduate College

Senior Associate Provost van Dulmen stated that the renaming of Graduate Studies is part of the Strategic Plan. Graduate Studies is proposing to develop a brand identity for the division and transforming the division into a college. KSU is currently the only public university in the state where Graduate Studies is not a college or school. Kent does not have independent schools, so that is why the division went with college. This opens up the opportunity for the Graduate College to offer academic programs, academic coursework and develop interdisciplinary programs. The Graduate College will not house faculty. The proposal is supported by all the academic colleges that house graduate programs and the Provost.

Associate Lecturer Marshall motioned to approve, and Professor Piontkivska seconded.

With no questions, comments or concerns, the item passed unanimously.

III. Policy Proposal Review

A. Action Items

Division of Research and Sponsored Programs

- 4. University Policy Regarding the Establishment or Revision of Academic Administrative Structures (3342-2-03) Revise policy to refer to new policies 3342-2-03.2 and 3342-2-03.3 (fall 2022)

Doug Delahanty, Interim VP of Research and Sponsored Programs, said the proposal is to update policies. These policies have been drafted with the input from faculty and staff including general council. There was feedback and consultation from the institute directors and several center directors. Additionally, they were reviewed and approved by RASP and the Provost. When reviewing the policies, they found many factual errors and discrepancies between the policy and how the centers and institutes operate. The changes are predominately in the creation of the two policies between the institutes and centers. They clarified the respective roles of those entities, established clear reporting lines, defined the general admission and purpose and present the processes that exist more with regards to establishing, reviewing and sunsetting of those entities.

Assistant Professor Dowell motioned to approve, and Associate Lecturer Marshall seconded the motion.

An EPC member asked for clarification if institutes are administered through the Provost's Office and centers administered through dean's offices. Additionally, if the institutes are inter/multi-disciplinary and the centers are broader/deeper focus in one discipline. Dough replied that the reporting structures are correct, but the institutes would be through the research office.

Therese asked if the approving body could change per institute or center due to the language about approvals.

Doug said that he does not see either going through without going to EPC first for approval.

Chair Grimm added that there is no foreseeable instance when a center or institute would not go through EPC before going to Faculty Senate. She asked if the language should be revised or amended.

Therese explained that people ask her about whether to go to EPC for different proposals. The language on process appears to have been changed to allow more fluidity. If the intent is that academic centers and institutes will always go through EPC and Faculty Senate, it would be better to have that written in the policy.

Chair Grimm said that she does not see the proposal process being fluid, but rather always going through EPC and Faculty Senate.

Additionally, Therese asked for more clarification on the types of changes that would need to go through EPC. Some are smaller changes than others and may not need to go to EPC.

Michael Kavulic said proposals should be reviewed and deemed for an appropriate governance body. This is case-by-case basis. Every revision will be unique and will need to be reviewed. This allows for the process of approving revisions to be decided by reviewers and not held strict to one process. Not every modification needs to go to EPC.

Doug added that they are requesting flexibility and will come to Therese to discuss, but not opposed to making a more concrete process for proposal approval.

Chair Grimm said that substantial modifications should go to EPC. Substantial modifications need to be defined. Separating out creation of or shutting down an institute/center from revisions might be helpful. Keep language that involves a consultation process. Consulting bodies are the Provost's office, RASP, EPC and Faculty Senate. The committee will hold on the first policy item. Chair Grimm asked Doug and Michael to amend the first policy and share it later in the meeting to be voted on.

After the BSW presentation, Doug and Michael returned after making the changes and reviewed them with EPC.

With no further questions, comments or concerns, the items passed unanimously.

IV. Program Proposals Review

A. Action Items

College of Applied and Technical Studies

1. Mammography - Undergraduate Certificate - Establish certificate fully online (fall 2022) Tammy McClish, Academic Program Director, stated that they have been running a medical assisting program for years at the Ashtabula campus. They are looking to take the original course and pull three classes together to make one short-term certificate. The Mammography certificate program will primarily target second year radiography students and registered radiographers. This course will consist of eight credit hours and will be completed in three semesters. The courses will consist of web-based lectures followed by 40-contact-hours of training specific to Mammography including breast anatomy and physiology and positioning. Having a short-term certificate will make it attractive to x-ray technologists and students that are in the Cleveland area.

Associate Lecturer Marshall motioned to approve, and Assistant Professor Dowell seconded.

Without questions, concerns or comments, the item passed unanimously.

2. Social Work - B.S.W - Establish degree hybrid online/on-ground on Ashtabula, Salem and Tuscarawas campus (fall 2022)

Matt Butler stated that the committee for this program began work in December 2019. Spring 2020 started with the gathering of curricula from other universities, examining accreditation requirements, first drafts of the course requirements and student learning outcomes. First drafts were completed in April and brought to EPC for an initial review. A survey was sent in 2020 to 209 leaders in a variety of social service agencies across Ashtabula, Lake, Geauga, Mahoning, Columbiana and Tuscarawas counties. The survey asked about interest in supporting a BSW program and their desire to hire BSW graduates. An initial Burning Glass survey was also completed. The unanimous response was positive and enthusiastic about the need for the program. There was a strong desire to support the program with internship opportunities as well as hiring BSW graduates when the time was appropriate. The beginning of 2021, timelines were clarified and did a lot more research and extensive work on the curriculum and completed new drafts of the documents and executive summary. This also included financial breakdowns for the programs so that the business side of things could begin. Fall of 2021 included gathering letters of support from agencies across northeast Ohio and completed course and program submissions in CIM, met with deans from Tuscarawas, Salem and Ashtabula and the VP of Regional campuses, obtained support from other departments within KSU, obtained internal approver prior to EPC and obtained a second updated report from Burning Glass.

An EPC member asked how the program moved through ODHE with a BSW at YSU.

Johanna Slivinske explained that part of the reason it was able to pass is there are some unique elements to the program. It is a hybrid and YSU is not. Additionally, it has a rural focus.

Matt added it is meeting a niche market and there were no existing programs that were online or hybrid in this region. The Burning Glass report showed that only one program in the region had an online component.

Matt said prior to the pandemic, rural communities in northeast Ohio and western Pennsylvania were already struggling to find a workforce sufficient to meet needs. Social workers are qualified to work with mental health, substance abuse, older adults, family and children, hospitals, child welfare settings and other social service agencies. The opiate epidemic has hit this region of the country hard. Northeast Ohio needs a trained, qualified workforce.

Johanna added that the Burning Glass report showed that from 2010-2020, job postings have increased 165% in northeast Ohio and 373% in western Pennsylvania. The letter of support from Ohio Jobs and Family Services states that social work is considered by them to be an in-demand career. Their letter notes that social work is considered a bright outlook occupation on O*net OnLine. This indicates that this occupation is projected to have a nation-wide increase of 10% or more over the period of 2020-2030. Taking the pandemic into consideration, agencies are hurting for qualified candidates and a BSW program would meet the need.

Matt said that Burning Glass data showed that 50% of job postings were for BSW's and 50% were for MSW's. With a bachelor's degree, employers can fill 50% of those positions instead of predominately needing a master's degree. With this degree, non-traditional students would be in a program that has the flexibility to let them stay in their community and give back. Several rural agencies said that individuals who did not come from their community or similar, do not have a sense of appreciation for the rural clients they are working with. No current BSW programs exist in the region that offer a hybrid or online component. Offering this program in the rural settings and allowing students to stay in their communities will help the students and the communities.

Johanna explained more about why they chose a BSW rather than an MSW. Burning Glass data showed that 46% of jobs in the region only require a BSW and 48% require an MSW. This means that the program can prepare students for half of the existing jobs while helping them progress towards and MSW if they choose.

Matt stated that another reason they chose a BSW was that the counsel on social work education, accrediting body for social work schools, required two full time faculty to start a BSW program. An MSW program requires six. This would have caused struggle for KSU to try to find more faculty in the area to teach when there is already a lack of people at the agencies.

Johanna added that the benefit of having a BSW is that graduates of an accredited program have the option of enrolling in MSW programs with advanced-standing status. This decreases their program length by half or one year.

Matt explained that graduates of an accredited program are also eligible in Ohio to become LSW. No other program in the state allows mental health or social services counseling that can be billed to insurance or Medicaid under supervision of an independent licensed social worker. Counseling requires a master's degree and Psychology requires a doctorate. This would allow someone to get into the field, agency permitting, and start counseling if they only have a bachelors and license.

An EPC member asked how soon a student could pay off student loans as that may also be attractive to prospective students.

Matt said that there is public service loan forgiveness applies to social work and other fields. Working for a non-profit or other specified positions for 10 years, those loans do get forgiven.

An EPC guest suggested a 4 + 1 pathway into a master's in counseling.

Matt agreed that is an option and additionally a master's in social work. Much of the social work initial education is done in the bachelor's degree and would advance the student in an MSW degree.

Johanna added that it could be a pathway for a master's in counseling for certain students. Some will go with the route of a master's in social work and others will go into counseling.

Therese asked if they had any insight as to why YSU, UA and CSU had a decrease in BSW graduates and an increase in MSW degrees.

Matt replied that his best guess would be that students looked into online programs that fit better with their life. For MSW degree increase, students are getting a bachelor's degree in either social work or something similar and taking longer to get the MSW. The BSW program puts students ahead for the MSW and ends up costing less.

Therese asked how they plan on marketing the BSW to students who can go to YSU, UA or CSU and get both BSW and an MSW.

Johanna explained that there will be a niche market for this because it will be marketed for rural settings and a hybrid program. Those universities offer on-ground and it is harder and less-appealing for students to travel to those locations.

Therese asked if they see enrollment coming from new or current students.

Johanna said both. She believes there will be a number of students that have the desire to have a bachelor's in social work. This degree will touch upon a non-traditional market of people who are returning to the university. There are many KSU students already asking about a BSW. It is a marketable degree in that you get a degree and can get hired.

Matt added that social work agencies have been requesting a degree from KSU at regional campuses that would allow them to hire people.

Senior Associate Provost van Dulmen asked what is the evidence showing students will attend this program.

Matt said that people have been approaching admissions counselors and advisors asking about the BSW program for the past two years. No formal survey of the student body was taken. They believe that the way to gauge community need was to reach out to mental health and recovery services board, executive directors, social service agencies and community people. Those groups know what is needed in the communities.

An EPC guest asked how this program compares to the undergraduate certificate program in addictions counseling offered at the Kent and Trumbull campuses.

Matt said that the UG addictions counseling certificate allows for the lowest level certification (CDCA). Students must work up three levels to achieve independent level. The benefit of a CDCA is that one can get a job doing low-level chemical dependency counseling in Ohio. However, there are a lot of support to be put in place from a supervisory standpoint. A supervisor must meet with CDCA's once a week forever. This causes a barrier for wanting CDCA's on staff. Medicaid changed billing rates to fit level of licensure. CDCA's make approximately \$40 less for the agency than someone who has a higher-level license. Higher-level licensed individuals would be able to do more and at a higher rate.

Johanna followed up with that CDCA's are going to have a lower scope of practice whereas social work is very broad.

An EPC guest asked if the Human Services Associate degree students at KSU Salem be good candidates for this and be able to move into it easily.

Matt explained that it is a great preparatory degree, but most employers are looking for students with a bachelor's degree. Jobs are extremely limited to individuals without a bachelor's degree.

Johanna stated that the plan is to offer non-traditional students in the areas surrounding Ashtabula, Tuscarawas and Salem regional campuses the ability to balance home life, work and the program. To achieve this, requires leveraging technology to minimize the need for students to travel.

Matt added that they may expand to other campuses in time with program growth consideration.

Johanna explained that the program will begin with higher amount of hybrid course sections. When staffing and course offerings stabilize, they would like to offer in-person course sections at all three regional campuses synchronously held in a hybrid format across the other campuses. This will allow them to develop a more cohesive program regardless of which campus they attend while still addressing the transportation barrier inherent to a program that extends such a large portion of the region.

Therese asked if at the beginning hybrid courses will be taught in-person and online at each campus or taught in-person at one campus while also streamed at another campus.

Matt said yes that the hybrid courses would begin to be offered in-person at one campus while streamed to another campus. This is due to only having two faculty members at the moment.

Therese asked if the cost, since it is hybrid, going to be for regionals or Kent campus.

Associate Lecturer Marshall explained that since it is offered via zoom, it is not considered a course that has a distance learning (DL) fee.

VP Shadduck confirmed that the courses using zoom do not carry a DL fee. It is only for the fully online courses.

Associate Lecturer Marshall made a motion to approve, and Associate Professor McEnroe-Petitte seconded the motion.

The item passed unanimously.

Arts and Sciences Chair, Keiran Dunne, stated that MCLS began offering the MA in Translation online in fall 2018. This started the discussion of the proposal. The onsite program is scheduled to be run parallel. A given course is offered simultaneously in different rooms for the six different languages in which the MA in Translation is offered. Recent inquiries from students show they are interested in multiple concentrations. The students are proficient in English and two other languages. The minors allow people to earn a formal credential in a second language without doing the full concentration. This would also be a way for people outside of the program to earn a credential in translation regardless if they are pursuing the translation degree or not. There is no impact on staffing or scheduling. The main objective is to give students more flexibility.

Associate Lecturer Marshall motioned to approve, and Assistant Professor Dowell seconded the motion.

An EPC member asked if the courses listed are already being offered therefore would not affect the need for more faculty.

Chair Dunne said these courses are already offered and being taught currently. There are two searches for faculty going on currently.

An EPC member asked for clarification on that even though there are only two faculty in some of these areas, there is no issue with staffing and delivering the classes.

Chair Dunne replied, correct. The MA program is basically the same in both modalities. There are a certain number of non-language specific courses that are offered, such as Theory Translation and technology intensive courses. Those courses tend to have larger enrollments. The language courses have smaller enrollments.

With no further questions, the items passed unanimously.

College of Business and Entrepreneurship

Department of Management and Information Systems

9. Human Resource Management - Graduate Certificate - Establish certificate fully online and on-ground at Kent campuses (fall 2022)

Dean Dubois explained that the certificate was proposed to satisfy the request for microcredentials and gives the opportunity to offer a program that is not so lengthy and expensive. The certificate includes a targeted set of courses for people working in the human resources management field. Many people in human resources management do not have degrees and are picking up credentials as they go. The certificate will be very attractive to human resource professionals. If students want to continue, they may use this certificate as a stackable degree toward the MBA program. This would cover the concentration then would require completion of the completer courses for the degree. Some may come just for the certificate and end up taking the MBA or some may be in the MBA and need some time away and could complete the certificate first. The certificate contains a two-credit course and four, three-credit courses with a total of 14-credit hours. The department went to professionals and asked if the certificate would increase employability. The professionals said yes because it is a credential from an accredited institution and employers would have confidence in the knowledge gained. The document also shows support from articles and websites about the growing popularity of graduate certificate programs.

Professor Levashina added that Bureau of Labor Studies (BLS) believes 51.9% of employees with advanced degrees also have a certificate. Additionally, BLS says they are valuable on their own and consider them a stepping-stone pathway to earn a greater degree. The certificate would benefit employees and increase their chances of being employed.

Dean Dubois said that the courses are already offered, and no additional faculty requirements needed. The department will be marketing this certificate and others to the MBA. There is a Business Analytics certificate that will cover the MBA concentration. This certificate will not be by itself as it will be marketed along with other certificate programs.

Professor Levashina followed by saying that they see an increase in HR course enrollment at the graduate level. Therefore, creating a demand.

Associate Lecturer Marshall motioned to approve, and Assistant Professor Dowell seconded.

The item passed unanimously.

College of Education, Health and Human Services School of Teaching, Learning and Curriculum Studies

10. Teaching and Learning with Technology - Minor - Establish minor fully online and hybrid online/on-ground on Kent Campus (fall 2022)

11. Teaching and Learning with Technology - Undergraduate Certificate - Establish certificate fully online and hybrid online/on-ground on Kent Campus (fall 2022)

Assistant Professor Gandolfi said that the creation of the minor and undergraduate certificate are in response to the increasing need for expertise in teaching and delivering instruction in a number of environments. It is not just K-12 or higher education, it is also important for Public Health, Communication and IET. This was already a trend before covid, but now is more important than ever. Students need more exposure to educational technology and more applied knowledge. Collaboration took place between EHHS, PH, CCI and CATS. Both degrees rely on a core educational technology courses and electives on different fields. The minor is 15-credit hours and is designed for KSU students. The certificate is 16-credit hours and is designed for addressing international students. Collaboration also took place with OCDE to offer a competitive certificate. All of the courses are already offered and no need for additional resources.

Associate Professor Piontkivska motioned to approve, and Associate Lecturer Marshall seconded.

With no further comments or questions, Chair Pamela E. Grimm closed the meeting at 4:53pm.

Chair Pamela E. Grimm called the meeting to order at 3:20p.m., on Monday, 21 March 2022, via Microsoft Teams.

I. Approval of Minutes

A. Meeting on 31 January 2022

Associate Lecturer Marshall made a motion to approve, and Professor Dauterich seconded the motion.

With no comments, concerns or corrections, the minutes were approved unanimously.

II. Subcommittee Reports

A. Committee on Communicating Academic Standards Brenda Burke and Holly Slocum, co-chairs

Brenda stated that the members include Kent Campus and Regionals. The committee came from a financial aid program review which is performed every six to seven years. The Ohio Department of Education (ODE) has to re-approve Kent State University to participate in the federal financial aid program. Financial Aid must look at all the programs, campus policies, how admission is determined, academic standards and matriculation and how students are able to receive financial aid. With the review on academic progress, ODE noted that the financial aid office was not as strict on GPA as the university policy. That lead ODE to do some spot checking on GPA's that they saw on academic pages, and they questioned the inconsistencies. This committee was then formed to review the GPA inconsistencies and how they are being shared to students. The committee has found some misconceptions on acceptability and the process for updating a major GPA. The source of truth will come from the catalog. A defined process has been created by the committee for updates to major GPA will go through Curriculum Information Management (CIM), college/school/department curriculum committee, deans, Provost and EPC. Some pages link to the catalog and others have hard coded GPA information. They believe this is where the inconsistencies were found by ODE. Financial Aid will modify their policy based on the decision of EPC. The committee's recommendation includes Curriculum Services sending a reminder of the current process to colleges and programs to ensure major GPA requirements are changed through the formal process. Brenda will be hiring a federal work-study student. The student will research all the college and program pages that are not linked to the catalog. The webmaster will be contacted for the names that run the college pages whose pages show hard-coded GPA information and ask them to link to the catalog. Brenda will follow-up and note when the changes are complete. An option will be given to use the delivered API from CourseLeaf which will alleviate the need to manually update the college websites. This will require Curriculum Services to work with UCM to make the API easily available to the programs that prefer to keep the information on their websites.

Chair Grimm asked what the delivered API from CourseLeaf means.

Therese explained that the API allows integration coding from CourseLeaf, the vendor for catalog, into Drupal. It is a matter of embedding the API in Drupal. When it is updated in the catalog, it will also be updated on the Drupal page. It will depend on how the college wants to display their page. They may either link to the catalog or use the API in Drupal.

Brenda said that another part of this would be tying it into GPS. The idea is for all academic programs be put into GPS. This impacts the students' understanding of the requirements they need to complete their program and provides the opportunity to create a plan.

Chair Grimm asked why not all programs are in GPS and to what extent GPS is not being used for programs.

Therese said that the degree audit is required for all undergraduate programs. It is optional for graduate programs and standalone certificates to be put into GPS.

Dean Mistur said that there has been discussion at GDAC about requiring graduate programs be put into GPS. Right now, it is highly encouraged. The College of Architecture and Environmental Design will be putting all programs in GPS. People have realized there are many great benefits for everyone to put in all programs.

Chair Grimm asked if there is anyone with a better understanding of the current issues with GPS.

Therese said that there was a recent update, and a bug was discovered. The Registrar's office is working with the vendor to resolve the issue.

Lynette explained that the issue is with sharing. Courses that could have met requirements weren't necessarily sharing between the requirements. Some requirements were left unmet.

Professor Dauterich motioned to approve, and Associate Lecturer seconded.

With no further questions, comments or concerns, the item was passed unanimously.

C. Internationalization Advisory Committee

Sarah Malcom, co-chair

Sarah stated that Kent State is a recipient of the 2022 Senator Paul Simon award for Comprehensive Internationalization. The committee has three working groups. The curriculum integration working group has been working with Jennifer Kellogg in developing a procedure to help get requests into CIM including 2+2 programs and transfer credit articulation. The partnerships proposal process working group is looking to moving the documentation into DocuSign. The identifying strategic partnerships working group is looking at how to make sure faculty are aware of partnerships when they are occurring and activities that they can participate in for grants, study abroad or recruitment. The curriculum group will be combined with the partnership group to assess international partnerships and developing a plan for those.

Chair Grimm asked if it was the same process for international partnerships as domestic partnerships.

Sarah replied, yes. It is the same process.

III. Policy Proposals Review

A. Action Items

Office of Global Education/English as a Second Language Center

1. International Pathway Program Admission—New Policy to provide pathway for international students who fall slightly short of minimum English proficiency but are otherwise admissible to the university (fall 2022)

Sarah stated that an ESL pathway is a special designation from Student Exchange Visitors Program (SEVP). The majority of international students are F1 students, and they fall into the

SEVP category which is overseen by the Department of Homeland Security. When a student is admitted to Kent State, they are issued an I20. All of the academic programs have to be approved by SEVP before an I20 can be issued. The ESL pathway is an admissions option for international students on the threshold of meeting full English proficiency. This is designed for students who are academically fully admissible except for their English proficiency. This allows for concurrent enrollment in ESL and academic courses and helps students make progress towards degree completion. Students do this currently, but a special immigration document cannot be issued.

Debbie said that there is an undergraduate and graduate option. For undergraduates, this would be a two-semester program. Both semesters, students would be enrolled in 15 credit-hours. The first semester includes students taking ESL courses to bring them up to the English requirement. The second semester, they continue with ESL coursework. There is also an option for concurrent enrollment with select students. Graduate students have a one-semester pathway. It is only for select programs. The programs where the English requirement is at the undergraduate level or just one step above. In this one semester, students would be taking one academic course in their major and the rest of their coursework would be in writing, reading and spoken communication. The four undergraduate programs approved for this pathway are Arts and Sciences general, Fashion, Business and Aeronautics and Engineering. ESL graduate pathway programs are TESL, Computer Science, EHHS, Music, Math and Data Science.

Sarah explained this helps to meet students where they are in their English proficiency by giving them a bridge from ESL to academic courses. It does not penalize them and gives them a clear roadmap of how they will transition. This pathway makes enrollment more competitive internationally. Three peers in the state have pathway programs—University of Cincinnati, Ohio University and Cleveland State University. The hope is that it will keeps students interested at KSY instead of going elsewhere. The next steps include OGE application through I-17 renewal process and wait for approval from the Student and Exchange Visitors Program.

Therese asked for clarification that students would be able to a hybrid of ESL and program courses.

Sarah said, that is correct.

Therese asked how many students are in the range of close eligibility.

Sarah said it is hard to say, because a student close to the IELTS requirement would go to a school with a pathway or a lower English proficiency. KSU is not typically getting those students but hopes to with this pathway.

Dean Mistur asked about I20 paperwork status for the students going through this pathway.

Sarah explained that with the new pathway, the students will have an F1. They will also get a special I20 that indicates they are in the pathway and allows for full admission into their academic program.

Dean Mistur asked if this will limit student's ability to work or have an internship.

Sarah replied, no. They will have full F1 benefits.

Chair Grimm asked if there is a plan for follow-up on how the students are doing in the program courses.

Debbie added that would be a good idea to be added to make sure that there is no academic slippage in the first few years of the program. The ESL courses will support the program courses. Having a number of academic courses that are supported through the program courses, activities and tutoring will give them a great boost into their degree programs.

Chair Grimm asked if the tutoring available for current students is available for students going through this pathway (i.e., math)

Debbie said that subject-specific tutoring is available for the students. Students are guided to these resources by OCDE. Anything related to English tutoring will go through OCDE.

Chair Grimm asked that if this pathway is successful, could this be marketed to other schools that do not have those pathways.

Sarah said that is a possibility. There has been some interest from local private schools of KSU doing ESL for some of their students. The only issue would be that KSU is issuing immigration documents. They would have to go through a different process to transition to their other school.

Associate Lecturer Kutchin asked if this pathway is something that Nursing can collaborate on with OCDE in the future.

Sarah explained that once the approval comes from SEVP, any program can be added.

Professor Dauterich moved to approve the item, and Associate Lecturer Kutchin seconded.

Without further questions or comments, the item passed unanimously.

IV. Program Proposals Review

A. Action Items

College of Communication and Information

School of Information

1. Applied Data and Information – Undergraduate Minor—Establish minor on Kent Campus (fall 2022)

Professor Zhang stated that they started with a broad data science landscape study. Data science is a multi-disciplinary and interdisciplinary subject for the leading players in data science. This was identified from an institutional review and from a systematic survey from data science programs. Some of the leaders identified are business, computer science, information science, iSchools, mathematics and statistics. The iSchool Organization established a data science curriculum committee to make core recommendations to highlight some of the curriculum that iSchools make unique contributions. After research, the committee identified some gaps in data science education at KSU. The iSchool made sure to distinguish the minor from other data

science programs on campus. iSchool created curriculum that would focus in targeted areas. The committee worked with related areas on campus to develop a name that was easy to understand and explain. Units across campus have given their support.

Associate Lecturer Marshall motioned to approve, and Professor McEnroe-Petitte seconded the motion.

Without questions, comments or concerns, the item passed unanimously.

B. Discussion Items

College of Communication and Information

School of Communication Studies/School of Media and Journalism

1. Communication, Media and Advocacy – M.A.—Program development plan to establish a new degree program; full proposal to come to EPC for a vote at later date

Emily stated that the program is to prepare students to use communication effectively and to advocate on behalf of their personal, social and political goals. The structure of the degree is an integration of two M.A. programs in Communication studies and Media and Journalism. This program will blend the two capitalizing on faculty expertise and existing collaborations, reducing redundancy and allowing for focus on interdisciplinary issues. This will meet the demands of growing expertise in media advocacy. The program will appeal to graduating undergraduate students and professionals seeking further education. A recent search on indeed and LinkedIn shows hundreds of job opportunities. The learning outcomes focus on making sure students are able to effectively use digital and personal intercommunication tools in an advocacy context, do their work with a deep understanding about discipline theories of communication, ability to identify intervention strategies and the capability to apply methodology for the assessment of the effectiveness of their work in research of audiences. Requirements include a nine-credit core, three-credit methods course, multidisciplinary electives courses at 12-15 hours and culminating experience. There are no anticipated additional costs for implementing the program with the integration of existing communication studies and media journalism degrees. This should reduce costs. They will be phasing out both degrees with replacement of the Communication, Media and Advocacy degree.

Therese asked how if there will be a specific committee for admissions, curriculum review and updates that include both schools.

Paul said that there will still be a Graduate Studies committee. The committee will be made up of faculty from both schools. There will be a graduate coordinator that comes from each of the schools. It is not anticipated that it will be any bigger than it is now.

With no further questions or comments, Chair Grimm concluded the meeting at 4:20pm.

Chair Pamela E. Grimm called the meeting to order at 3:20p.m., on Monday, 18 April 2022, via Microsoft Teams.

I. Approval of Minutes

A. Meeting on 21 March 2022

Associate Lecturer Marshall made a motion to approve, and Professor Dauterich seconded the motion.

Without question, comments or changes, the item passed unanimously.

II. Presentation

A. Curriculum Recoding Project

Therese Tillett, associate vice president for curriculum planning and administration

Therese stated that, in terms of programming, Kent State was very different when Banner was implemented in 2007. The Kent Campus offered bachelor's, master's and doctoral degrees. Regional campuses owned and offered associate degrees. There were few long-term, non-campus locations that fully offered degree programs. In 2010, the chancellor encouraged regional campuses to offer bachelor's programs. The Regional College was established in 2011, and in 2019 renamed College of Applied and Technical Studies. This helps to differentiate the regional campuses as academic colleges. The non-campus locations now include Brazil, Cleveland, Columbus, Independence and Twinsburg. Some degrees

are only offered at a non-campus location, such as Doctor of Podiatric Medicine. The coding in Banner has never been updated to reflect the changes. The plan for the recoding project is to recode academic programs in Banner to add the College of Applied and Technical Studies and bring consistency to the coding. Academic programs will be connected to the campus and non-campus locations where they have been approved to be fully offered. The changes will also include recoding online programs in Banner. Currently, the campus is coded as the college. The new format will be to code the college as the college. The degree, campus and major will not change. The campus section will include the campus at which the student applied and admitted for the program. The same will be done for location. Currently, there are no non-campus offerings in Banner, but they will now be coded. Online offerings will be coded in the campus field. The campus field will be redefined to include the online and non-campus locations. The admitting campus for online programs will be identified in the campus field. Summer of 2022, Curriculum Services will be adding the new codes into Banner. Admissions will update Slate and IT will prep. Then the Registrar's office will update records for current and new students along with other functional areas. Finally, Curriculum Services will update KSU Programs (Manage My program), and any legacy data in Banner will inactivate. A curriculum moratorium will be put in place starting November 2022 on revising the name of an existing program. This includes major, degree, concentration, certificate or non-degree program. Also, any name changes or inactivation of a college, department or school or restructuring administration of a major or certificate. A proposal for any of these types of changes may be submitted from now until October 2022. Those proposals will be effective for fall 2023. Proposals for these changes submitted between November 2022 and December 2024, will be effective fall 2025. Everything else may continue as normal. There will be a website that will provide updates and Therese will also update EPC.

Chair Grimm asked if Slate is an admission systems software.

Therese replied, yes.

Chair Grimm asked if there must be a revision to Alumni's transcripts who are re-admitted.

Therese said that if someone has re-enrolled, their record is already updated no matter what. Coding will only affect current and new students. No effects will happen with diplomas.

An EPC guest asked for confirmation on if colleges request changes to the items that are part of the moratorium, may proposals still be submitted to Curriculum Services or hold them at the college level in CIM.

Therese said that more information will be provided on this later.

An EPC guest asked if the new coding would reflect the attending campus.

Therese explained that the campus with which the student applies is where they will be coded. For example, if a student applies to Stark, they will be coded for the Stark campus.

III. Subcommittee Reports

A. Graduate Policies Council

Brian Barber and Sean Broghammer, co-chairs

Brian stated that the subcommittee broke into two subgroups to work on each of the policies. The policies have been reviewed with GDAC and Senior Associate Provost van Dulmen. The Graduate Student Leave of Absence policy is granted for degree-seeking, graduate students who have active status and need to be away for personal, family, financial or other reasons. The committee has worked on including medical and pregnancy and parenting. The committee worked on establishing defined

time periods of leave of absence. There is short-term (under 5 days), intermediate-term (5 days-remainder of the semester) and long-term (longer than a semester). The requirement for students to have a full-time enrollment before a leave may be taken was eliminated. Good academic standing and reasonable progress in the degree requirements were also eliminated. The thought was to allow students to use the leave of absence policy for whatever reason they needed. Unless stated by accreditation, leave would not affect students' time to complete the degree. The leave of absence form should be submitted prior to the term requested for intermediate and long-term leave. For short-term leaves, that would not be necessary. Graduate assistantships held prior to a leave would be re-offered pending available funds. Students on any type of leave will maintain university health services. Student's rights, privileges, stipends, subsidized health insurance would continue for short-term and intermediate-term leaves (1-semester or less).

Chair Grimm asked if there is a time-limit on funding.

Brian explained that graduate assistantships would be re-offered contingent on available funds at the time of return. There is currently no wording in the policy referring to the time limit between leave, return and assistantships. The committee will continue to discuss this issue to decide on parameters.

Sean stated that the Student Grievances subgroup of GPC worked on the Student Academic Complaints policy. The goal was to figure out how it applies, how graduate students can follow along in how it pertains to their specific situation. The subgroup found out that the policy had already been through significant changes made by the professional standards committee. It was just approved by Faculty Senate. The subgroup will be pausing to review the changes. The focus will need to shift to helping graduate student awareness of the policy and who to contact.

B. Transfer Credit Committee

Edward Dauterich and Joanna Liedel, co-chairs

Joanna said that this year was focused on revising the policies and cleaning them up. Those went through EPC earlier this semester and were approved for the 2022-2023 catalog. The committee has been working on exploring other forms of alternative credit. The committee looked at emerging fields and Prior Learning Assessment. This will help to put recommendations forward and/or address new requests as they come forward. The committee is working on a handbook that will include business practices, interpretations and more. The handbook will be brought to EPC at the beginning of the fall semester.

Chair Grimm suggested retitling it to something other than "handbook" to eliminate confusion.

C. Academic Calendar Advisory Committee

Debbie Knapp and Therese Tillett, co-chairs

Therese explained that the Academic Calendar Advisory Committee has been meeting since fall 2021. The charge of the committee was the review the feasibility of starting fall semester on earlier in the week, scheduling final exams to be a continuous Monday-Sunday, moving spring break earlier in the semester and brining Kent State into compliance with the state requirement for class time equated to semester credit hour. The goal is to maintain or increase the instructional days in the fall and spring, ensure that the faculty contract remains for 9 months and retain 5 business days between the end of one term and beginning of another. This month and next month, the options will be presented across the university to various constituencies, including EPC, and request feedback. The recommendations will go to Faculty Senate for a vote on May 9th, the provost will present the recommendations to the president for final approval and implementation will begin for academic years 2023 onward following the president's approval.

An EPC member asked if the committee looked at extending the fall semester a little closer to December 25th or into that week.

Therese said it would end up making final exams on the 25th at least one year.

An EPC member asked if going to a Monday-Wednesday or Tuesday-Thursday class and lab schedule would help with the time needed to be in compliance.

An EPC guest asked if other Ohio institutions have a three-week winter break and how that works for offices like registrars, bursars, admissions and financial aid.

Therese explained that Bowling Green, Ohio State, Ohio University and Youngstown State have a three-week break. The question of how they were able to function with a three-week break was brought up often during the committee meetings and will be further explored. Most of the universities that were reviewed have a holiday schedule, but not all.

An EPC guest asked for clarification on compliancy of minutes per credit hour.

Therese explained that Kent State currently does 150 minutes/week x 14 weeks. It should be 150 minutes/week x 15 weeks to be compliant.

An EPC member stated that making the winter break shorter would eliminate or hinder the ability for experiential learning.

Therese said that most students enrolled in spring are enrolled for the full semester. The courses scheduled for the first and second 7 weeks are utilized. There are also first, second and third 5-week courses. These are not utilized as much. Currently, 2/3 of the course is complete when spring break begins (11th week). If going with the 9th week, it would be more in the middle of the semester. Middle of the second 5-weeks, in between the two, 7-week courses and middle of the full-term courses. The 8th week of spring break would be about the same.

Chair Grimm added that nursing has 7.5-week clinicals, so they would work best with the 8th week spring break.

IV. Policy Proposals Review

A. Action Items

EPC Undergraduate Policies Council

1. Academic Forgiveness—Revise policy to provide opportunities to current students for grade forgiveness within limitations; revise policy name to "Grade Adjustment" (fall 2022)

Sue stated that the Undergraduate Policies Council (UPC) recommends a revision to the Academic Forgiveness Policy. The goal of the revision is to simplify the process and remove unintended barriers for students to receive a second chance at pursuing their academic goals. In the current policy, there are many cumbersome issues impeding students from using this policy. The request to review this policy came from advisors across all eight campuses at Kent State. Most advisors found the policy to be confusing and complex. The biggest concern was the policy restrictions made many worthwhile candidates ineligible from the start. The review of policy originally started by the EPC Ad Hoc committee and was handed to the predecessor, UPC. Data, articles, surveys and discussions were used by EPC Ad Hoc to review the policy. UPC reviewed the previously gathered information and furthered discussion. The Grade Adjustment Policy (formerly Academic Forgiveness Policy) allows for students to select the maximum of six courses with the grade of C- or lower to be removed from the calculation of the GPA and overall credit hours.

Charity explained that students will most likely use the Course Repeat Policy more often as they will be staying in their majors and need those courses. The Grade Adjustment Policy (GAP) allows students to forgive courses with low grades that they no longer need. The proposed GAP would allow eligible returning and current students who are actively enrolled to request grade adjustment. The previous policy forced students to be away one year or more for it to be used. Students who were awarded a Kent State associate degree or certificate were prohibited from using the policy. Under the new policy, students with a previous degree are eligible with stipulations of failed grades and only passing grades of courses not used towards the previous degree and previous non-Kent State degrees all failed grade courses and only passing grades for courses earned after the non-Kent State degree. Students need to meet with an academic advisor and complete an application. They are required to have a rationale explaining how they will be successful moving forward. Students must complete an online module to ensure they understand the policy and the available resources. A process for the modules is being worked on. The committee has met with Ben Hollis to create a process in Canvas. Students are restricted to six courses or less with a grade of C- or less to be removed. The previous policy removed all grades C- or less. This limit makes it necessary for students to meet with an academic advisor to decide on which grades to remove and/or if this the correct policy for them. Students may have multiple GAP requests as they may choose one course one semester and two or more the next semester. The previous policy, students could only use once.

An EPC member asked if the student could use the Course Repeat Policy and then the Grade Adjustment Policy.

Therese explained that the Grade Adjustment Policy removes the grade and credit hours. If students choose to use the GAP for a course that is required to graduate in their program, it will not forgive the course as a requirement. Students still must take that course. If students use up their attempts for repeat, the GAP will not solve their problems.

An EPC member asked if there is a reason for the six-course limit rather than 18 credit hours.

Therese explained that it is cleaner as there are many scenarios with differing course credit hours. For example, a student may need 19 credit hours removed, but six courses.

An EPC member asked how students are prioritized to register a second and third time for a course versus a priority student who needs the course for graduation or program entry. Is there a process to prioritize registration?

Chair Grimm explained that there are different deadlines for open registration. Those who are closest to graduation register first. Those who are furthest, register last.

Associate Lecturer Marshall moved to approve the item, and Assistant Professor Earp seconded.

Without further questions, comments or concerns, the item passed unanimously.

Office of Admissions

- 2. Admission of Home-School Students—Revise policy to reflect current practices (fall 2022)
- **3.** Admission of Undergraduate Students—Revise policy to reflect current practices (fall 2022) Lana explained that the revisions include reformatting and a holistic review. Test optional is now in the policy. Preadmissions review, referred to regional campus and appealing an admissions decision are categories that are added to the policy to reflect what the department has been doing.

Associate Lecturer Marshall made a motion to approve the items together, and Associate Professor Piontkivska seconded.

With no questions, comments or concerns, the items passed.

Office of Global Education

4. A Level—Revise policy to provide more information on what academic departments have approved for courses/credits awarded for specific A- and AS-level exams; revise policy name to "A and AS Levels" (fall 2022)

Salma stated that the proposal is to streamline the current advanced level and advanced subsidiary levels policy. Those are Credit By Examination, international bachelorette exams, AP credits and other alternative credits. They have been accepted for a while on a case-by-case basis. The department would like to develop transfer concordance tables for all the A-level and AS-level examinations and streamline this process. Various departments have been consulted to review the exams. The department would like to publish them on their website. Most of the Ohio schools and others around the U.S. have a well-established website with a concordance table or a chart that outlines all the credits upfront. Anytime there are new exams published by Cambridge or other A-level examination bodies, they will be taken back to the faculty to be reviewed. The main goal is to do everything upfront so that it is not on a case-by-case basis.

Chair Grimm requested clearer communication on whether credits apply is a decision made at the program level.

Selma explained that faculty will already have reviewed the examinations prior to OGE posting information about what is accepted.

An EPC member asked how the information is kept current.

Selma said that the exam bodies will let OGE know that they have new exams. Once the department knows what the exams are, they are taken to faculty for evaluations. With the new exams, it takes longer for a student to come in with one of those, so it provides more time for the new exams to be reviewed.

Associate Lecturer Marshall motioned to approve, and Professor Piontkivska seconded the motion.

The item passed without further questions, comments or concerns.

V. Program Proposals Review

A. Discussion Items

College of Communication and Information

School of Visual Communication Design

User Experience Design - B.A.—Initial inquiry to establish a new degree program; full proposal to come to EPC for a vote at later date

Daniel stated that two programs with the same name (BA and BFA) have been a problem for the department. They started reviewing the BA in VCD and started reviewing options for a BA in UXD. A minor in UXD was established in 2016 in collaboration with the School of Information. From 2016 to now, the minor went from 0 students to 60. Market research has shown there are approximately 50 UXD programs in the U.S. 18 of those are bachelor's degrees, 28 Ph.D. and 6 certificate programs. Kent State is currently offering two programs in UXD (M.S. and minor). Kent State does not currently offer a bachelors in UXD. Available courses and staffing are sufficient to add to a BA in UXD. Courses will come from VCD, iSchool and EMAT. The full proposal will be brought back to EPC at a later date.

Chair Grimm expressed concerns that this subject touches a lot of areas around campus and not just CCI. Computer Science, regional campuses and others may be of help with the rest of the full proposal.

Without further questions, comments or concerns, Chair Grimm concluded the meeting at 5:25pm.
