Time Limits for Graduate Programs

Frequently Asked Questions (FAQ)

1. What should I do if I need to step away from my program for a short period due to personal reasons?

Students who must be away from their studies for one or more terms for personal, family, financial or other compelling reasons may apply for a <u>Leave of Absence policy</u>. Time away under an approved leave of absence will extend your program's time limits with the exception of the D.P.M. degree.

- 2. I took a Kent State graduate course a year before I started my master's degree program. Does the six-year time limit start with that course or when I started my master's degree? The time limit starts with the term of admittance to the master's degree.
- 3. I was admitted into a master's degree and plan to apply for the Ph.D. degree after that degree. Do I have six years to complete my masters, then another 10 years to complete my doctorate? Yes.
- 4. I was admitted as a post-baccalaureate student to a Ph.D. degree. How many years do I have for my time limits?

If you are admitted to only the Ph.D. degree, you will have 10 years to complete the program.

5. I deferred my admission. When does my time limits begin?

Your time limit begins with the most recent (deferred) admittance term. For example, if you were admitted to a Ph.D. degree for fall 2025 and deferred for one year, the clock starts fall 2026 and ends in December 2036.

6. Can you explain how time limits are calculated?

See the definitions section below for length of a calendar year. Below are some examples of time limits based on admittance term:

- Admitted to a master's degree for fall 2025: Must complete degree no later than December 2031.
- Admitted a doctoral degree for spring 2026: Must complete degree no later than December 2036.
- Admitted to a graduate certificate for summer 2026: Must complete certificate no later than December 2032.

7. I completed graduate courses at another university seven years ago that I would like to transfer to my Kent State master's degree. Will they be ineligible because of the time limits?

This policy pertains only to a student's time in the program. Some programs areas may have additional policies on time limits for specific courses. See the <u>Transfer of Graduate Credit</u> <u>policy</u> for the conditions to have transfer coursework approved and applied.

8. Are there time limits for completing an undergraduate program?

No, Kent State does not have time limits for completing an associate or bachelor's degree or an undergraduate certificate or minor.
